

The first recipe was a vinegar and oil dressing that was served in the tea room at Wolfe and Dessauer. Remember that popular store in Fort Wayne? I sure do.

Vinegar and Oil Dressing 1 cup oil, 1 cup white vinegar, 1 cup sugar, 1 medium size onion finely dices, 1/2 tablespoon white pepper, 1/3 cup finely diced green pepper, 1/3 cup diced pimento or red pepper. Put vinegar, sugar and pepper and onion and green pepper in blender on high speed blend for about 1 minute reduce speed and slowly add oil. Add pimento last without blending. Keeps good for several days. Happy Spring!





 Monitor your credit report. Order a free copy of your report from one of the three credit reporting agencies at annualcreditreport.com

 Use online banking to protect yourself. Monitor your financial accounts regularly for fraudulent transactions.

 Protect your computer. Virus protection should be active and up to date. Look for an "s" after the "http" to be sure the website you are using is secure.

 Protect your mobile device. Use the passcode lock on your smartphone and other devices




