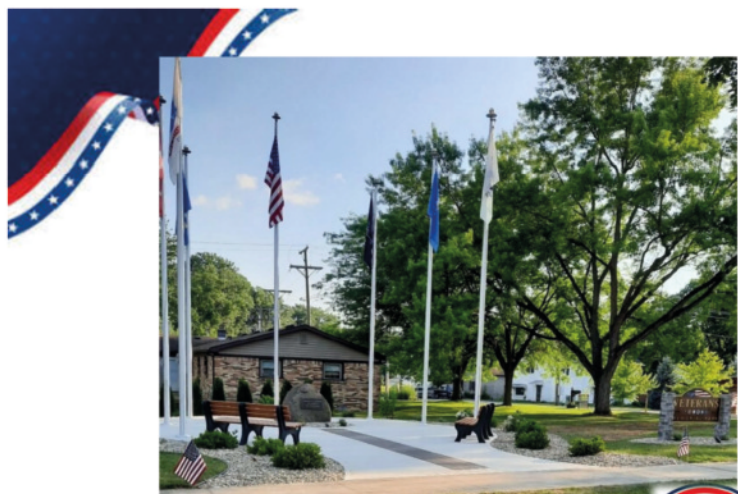

With the holidays around the corner I will start sharing some of the good candy and cookies that get made at our house. Every year I promise myself that I won't make so much and then before I know it I have eight different kinds of cookies and eight different candies. I always make sure my employer gets a tray and John takes Kevin and the guys some good stuff. I take some to moms and if I go to any carry-ins I try to get rid of some there, but it seems that I still have a lot to get rid of, so waste not want not, we eat it.

We really like the caramel puff corn so I figured I would give this a try. I haven't tried it yet but I'm sure it is equally as good without a test run.

CHRISTMAS PUFF CORN MUNCH

9 squares of vanilla almond bark

1 -9 oz bag of Puff Corn

Christmas sprinkles

Pour Puff corn in a large bowl. Break up the almond bark squares and put in a large glass measure cup. Microwave it at 30 second increments, stirring each time after until fully melted. Place a large piece of parchment paper on a baking sheet. With a spatula pour half of the melted bark over the puff corn. Gently stir till all the puff corn is covered making sure you get the bottom of the bowl. Finish adding the remaining melted bark. Stir to coat well. Pour out on to the parchment paper and sprinkle with the Christmas sprinkles. Let it harden for 1 to 2 hours. Put in baggies or enjoy.

VETERAN SNAP BENEFITS

The Indiana Department of Veterans Affairs (IDVA) is proud to announce the launch of a new short-term initiative designed to provide critical food assistance to veterans and their families in Indiana. This program, Operation Emergency Food, is an extension of the Military Family Relief Fund (MFRF) and aims to address the immediate needs of those affected by the recent changes in Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) benefits. Operation Emergency Food will remain in place for the duration of the current SNAP circumstances.

Recognizing the challenges faced by the veterans and their families who depend on SNAP, the IDVA has crafted this emergency food assistance program to ensure that no MFRF eligible veteran families go hungry. Eligible participants will receive support ensuring they have access to essential food resources.

"Indiana stands with our Hoosier veterans, especially in times of uncertainty as federal changes to SNAP and furloughs impact families across our state," said Jake Adams, IDVA

Director. "Our commitment remains firm: no veteran should face these changes and challenges alone. Indiana is here, ready to support those who have served us with the same dedication they have shown to our nation."

To qualify for this emergency food assistance, applicants must be eligible for the MFRF program and directly affected by the changes of SNAP benefits. Interested veterans and their families can apply by visiting the MFRF Application Webpage, contacting IDVA by phone (317) 232-3910, or contacting their local County Veteran Service Officer (CVSO) for more information.

The IDVA encourages all veterans facing food insecurity to reach out for support from the MFRF Program. Veterans and their families who are not currently receiving SNAP benefits who face food insecurity are encouraged to apply to the MFRF Standard Application for food assistance. The Standard MFRF program can provide financial assistance for Housing (Rent/Mortgage), Utilities, Food, Current Medical

Expenses, Basic Transportation, Education, and Childcare. To learn more about all MFRF eligibility criteria, required documents, types of assistance, and FAQ, please visit the MFRF Webpage: <https://www.in.gov/dva/about-idva/links/military-family-relief-fund/>.

“We are so thrilled to expand the America 250! Scholarship in its final year of being awarded in order to be able to offer ten \$25,000 scholarships to students,” said Ginnie Sebastian Storage, DAR President General. “We see no better way to celebrate America’s 250th anniversary than with these transformative and life-changing scholarships investing in the development of the next generation of American historians who will study our past and help us understand new aspects of the great American story.”

The DAR gives more than 30 scholarships annually awarding close to a total of \$250,000 a year to students across the country, but the organization has never provided a singular scholarship of this size. The significant amount of the America 250! Scholarship, and that it will be awarded to ten separate students, is a testament of the importance of American history education that DAR places emphasis on and in honor of the special celebrations taking place throughout 2026 in honor of the 250th anniversary of the nation.

Applicants should apply through the DAR online scholarship portal, DAR Academic Works: <https://dar.academicworks.com/>

Closed for Veterans Day

The U.S. Postal Service will observe Veterans Day on Tuesday, Nov. 11. All Post Office locations will be closed in recognition of the federal holiday. Only Priority Mail Express will be delivered. Regular mail delivery and retail services will resume on Wednesday, Nov. 12.

“On this important day we honor the military veterans who have served our nation,” said Postmaster General and CEO David Steiner. “The Postal Service is proud to be one of the largest civilian employers of America’s veterans. Their dedication, discipline and commitment to service enrich our organization and strengthen our connection to the communities we serve.”

While Post Offices will be closed, customers can access many postal products and services through the Postal Service’s network of more than 2,600 self-service kiosks, available in select Post Office lobbies nationwide. These kiosks feature:

Postage printing for Priority Mail, Priority Mail Express and international shipping;

* Stamps for purchase;
* Ability to weigh and mail packages; and
* Package tracking information.

As USPS modernizes its retail locations, more self-service options are becoming available at more locations and include:

* Rapid Dropoff Stations for customers who have already created and printed labels online;
* An option for customers to print shipping labels from a merchant-provided QR code; and
* Smart lockers that allow customers to both drop off and pick up packages, often with 24/7 access available.

Many self-service kiosks are available 24/7, offering customers flexibility and convenience even when Post Offices are closed for the holiday.

FREE FAFSA HELP

Financial aid professionals from across Indiana will be at 34 sites helping collegebound students and their families with the most important form for financial aid during College Goal Sunday. The event is set for 2 PM (local time), November 9th, 2025.

This free program assists Indiana students with filing the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA). The FAFSA is required for students to be considered for federal and state grants, many scholarships, and even federal student loans at most colleges, universities, and vocational/technical

schools nationwide. Filing must occur by the State of Indiana priority deadline of April 15th to guarantee state aid for those that qualify. Many families perceive the form to be too complicated and time consuming to complete and often leads to students missing out on financial aid they would receive. This is one of many reasons College Goal Sunday is so important. In less than one afternoon during the event, students and their families get free help from the expert volunteers and file the form.

Now in its 37th year, College Goal Sunday has helped more than 98,000 Indiana students and families complete the FAFSA properly and on time. College Goal Sunday is a charitable program of the Indiana Student Financial Aid Association (ISFAA).

College Goal Sunday Returns to the fall

“We are pleased to announce there will be a College Goal Sunday this fall. The last two years, due to delays in the launch of the form, we were not able to hold an event at this time of year. With many families anxious about getting the form filed, and meeting various deadlines, this is very good news” said Bill Wozniak, cochair of College Goal Sunday. “We hope all Hoosiers take advantage of College Goal Sunday, file the FAFSA, and get one step closer to fulfilling their educational goals.”

Visitation was on Friday, Oct. 31, 2025, at Applegate Chapel - Heritage Pointe, 801 Huntington Ave., Warren.

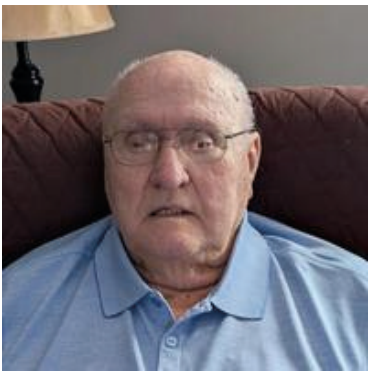
A funeral service followed with Pastor Gerald Moreland and Pastor Mickey Strong officiating.

BE ALERT TO SCAMMERS WHILE TRAVELING FOR THE HOLIDAYS

(StatePoint) Holiday season travelers are a key target for scammers, and criminals are looking to cash in on you being distracted. Visa has observed an uptick in 2025 of sophisticated, travel-related scams where well-known travel providers are convincingly impersonated, and, according to a McAfee Travel Report, one in five

Americans has fallen victim to a travel scam.

Artificial intelligence has made it easier to be duped by fake websites, calls, email and texts. Even just ordering car service can open you up to being scammed by impersonators that may contact you directly through an otherwise trusted app.

Here are scams to watch for while traveling:

Fake QR Codes. Scammers will replace real QR codes with fake ones to redirect your phone to a malicious website.

Juice Jacking. If you plug a phone or laptop into a public charging station, hackers can potentially compromise the outlet to transfer malware to or steal data from a connected device.

Hacked Luggage. Smart luggage with built-in USB chargers, GPS tracking and digital locks can be hacked. Scammers can locate your bags and unlock them remotely.

Maintaining vigilance is the best way to avoid trouble while traveling, but here are some additional preventative measures you can take:

- **Apply Scrutiny.** Be suspicious of anyone emailing, calling, messaging or approaching you in person, possibly in a company uniform, claiming to need your personal information.

- **Take Control.** Keep your personal information, payment cards and devices with you under your control.

- **Verify Contact.** Before responding to an email, call, text or voice message, disconnect and research contact information to verify legitimacy.

- **Look for Tampering.** Be leery of QR codes that appear to be affixed by a sticker. Also watch for skimming devices on gas

pumps by jiggling them. If there is any movement, don't insert your card.

- **Check Websites.** If you scan a QR code, a web link will appear. Review it carefully for anomalies and type in a legitimate website address rather than clicking the link.

- **Charge Cautiously.** Use your own charging adapter and cable instead of public USB ports.

- **Secure Devices.** Keep Bluetooth and Wi-Fi turned off on all devices – even smart luggage – when not in use. When using the internet, opt to connect through data roaming rather than public Wi-Fi and use a VPN whenever possible.

- **Wait to Post.** Don't post your travel photos showing you are away from home until you return.

HOW PRECISE DIAGNOSTIC TOOLS

SUPPORT PERSONALIZED BLADDER CANCER CARE

(StatePoint) Every bladder cancer journey is different, and no single treatment or diagnostic path fits everyone. According to patients who have experienced bladder cancer, the best care for you will depend on your personal situation.

"After experiencing recurring bladder cancer, I learned that understanding my path forward meant looking beyond general statistics and seeking out more precise care based on my individual case," says Michael F.

A More Complete Picture

Because doctors often tailor treatment decisions, it's best that the diagnostic procedures they use give them the most complete picture possible. One option your doctor may offer is Blue Light Cystoscopy (BLC), a diagnostic procedure designed to help your urologic surgeon better visualize tumors in your bladder.

BLC involves placing a special imaging agent into the bladder at least one hour before the procedure. During the procedure, the surgeon will examine the bladder lining using regular white light, then switch on a special blue light. The imaging agent causes the tumors to glow bright pink in the special blue light. The enhanced visibility helps define the edges of visible tumors and reveals a certain type of flat, cancerous lesion that can otherwise be difficult to detect.

BLC is currently used during TURBT (transurethral resection of bladder tumor) procedures and can also be used during cystoscopies to monitor progress during surveillance visits. Your doctor might recommend BLC to provide a more detailed view of your bladder and to help gather tissue samples that can provide information that aids in diagnosis and treatment planning. Having a better understanding of the characteristics of your bladder cancer can help your doctor determine or adjust your treatment plan, and choose an appropriate follow-up approach for you.

"Once my doctors began using blue light, it became a standard part of my cystoscopies, allowing them to identify areas of concern that had not been visible before," says Michael F.

Michael F's recurring bladder cancer required multiple rounds of treatment, including immunotherapy, chemotherapy and eventually gene therapy. Over the course of his treatments, he underwent 10–11 cystoscopies — most of which utilized BLC to identify suspicious cells that were otherwise undetectable. "With my robust form of cancer, the enhanced cystoscopies were able to reveal suspicious cells that turned out to be pre-cancerous. This helped my care team respond faster and more efficiently," he says.

Asking About Your Options

Your urologist will consider many factors when recommending diagnostics, and not every tool is right for every bladder cancer case. When discussing your care with your urologic surgeon, here are a few questions you might ask:

1. "Would Blue Light Cystoscopy be helpful in my case?"

2. "What are the options for getting an enhanced view of my bladder?"

3. "How do you personalize care plans for someone with my diagnosis?"

Michael F. often reminds others that statistics are general, not personal, and encourages speaking up when something doesn't seem right. "Staying informed of your care options, as well as being honest, open and proactive with your care team throughout your bladder cancer journey can help you get precise, personalized care," he says.
