

John Frev, Montgomery County Commissioner stated that will be a great spokesperson for their association and is very dedicated to improving local government."

SHOULD I BE WORRIED ABOUT THAT **CONDENSATION ON MY** WINDOWS?

(StatePoint) If you take a look at your home's windows and doors in winter, you may notice condensation. temperatures drop, it often appears on the inside and outside of these surfaces.

Here's what you need to about condensation occurs, when it matters and what you can do about it:

Interior Condensation

When the heat is on inside the home in wintertime, a certain amount of humidity feels good -- we breathe easier, our skin is less dry and there's less static in the air. This is fine usually, but when temperatures outside get extremely low, problems can arise. Under these circumstances, humidity can generate condensation on your windows -- whether they're old or new -- and this should be managed.
