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Thought for the Week: *Have you started building a scarecrow for the Scarecrow Festival? See Denny's Hardware for scarecrow bodies!*

CREATING SCARECROWS!

Sponsored by the Warren Area Chamber of Commerce, the 7th annual Scarecrow Festival will provide an opportunity for local residents, businesses, schools, and non-profit groups to compete for cash prizes and the chance to boast about creating the town's best scarecrow.

A scarecrow is basically a crossed figure that has been dressed and stuffed to add volume. Feel free to improvise on this basic design, based on what you have on hand. For example, while we suggest strips of lumber, lengths of pipe or sticks will work just as well for the cross. Straw, leaves, wadded up fabric, shopping bags or even newspapers will do for stuffing.

Materials Needed:

- Two pieces of 2"x1" lumber, one longer than the other
- A nail and some twine or string
- Old nylon stockings or a pillowcase
- Needle and Thread or a stapler
- Straw or any type of stuffing material

**Denny's Hardware will have Frames for sale or the lumber available

Attach the two pieces of lumber together to form a cross. For the head, if you are using old stockings, split them, piece them together lengthwise and sew or staple the seams and stuff it in the shape of a head. Tie the head loosely at the neck end. Paint a wistful face on with acrylic paint or permanent marker or stitch it on with wool or cord or embroidery thread. Slide the head onto the short end of the vertical pole. Then attach the head to the body by tying tightly with twine around the open end. Pumpkins, twig balls, gourds, latex masks or wooden disks may also be used for heads.

From here, use your creativity. Drape any clothing onto the poles, stuff and tie off at the wrist, ankles, and waist. Stuff long strands of yarn under hats and scarves. Tie gloves to the outstretched ends of the crossbar. Then experiment with any silly, pretty or earthy materials you can come up with. Fancy lace or tattered cloth-it's up to you. Pound the scarecrow into the earth (locate gas/power lines 1st) or place your scarecrow in a prop to delight crowds and amuse passers by.

Registration forms will be at local banks and Town Hall by October 2nd. You must register to be entered - Entry forms will be due by October 23rd. Display your Scarecrow in your front yard if you are within the city limits. Entries from outside the town limits will need props to tie their Scarecrow to for displaying downtown. All entries will be on display throughout Warren's city limits 9am Thursday, October 29th, for judging! Watch for more details in the Warren Weekly. If any questions, please call 375-3010. A GOOD DESTINY IS OPPORTUNITY WITH A SMILE ON IT'S FACE

In the year 1880, a homeless little Chinese boy wandered the docks of Shanghai. When no one was looking he smuggled himself aboard an American vessel loading cargo. For days he hid in a drain where garbage and rubbish were daily dumped. For days he fought the rats for the stinking scraps that were thrown through the opening above him.

Finally, however, it became too much even for his determination so he climbed out of his hiding place and was discovered. It was the custom in those days to throw stowaways overboard with neither sympathy nor ceremony. But the captain of the ship, a man by the name of Charles Jones, was strangely drawn to this indomitable spirit.

So he kept the boy with him for the remainder of the voyage and fed him back to some semblance of health. When the boat docked at Wilmington, North Carolina, he turned the boy over to the minister of the church he attended when in port.

The minister befriended this tiny package of humanity and named him Charlie, after the captain who had saved him. Raised in the minister's home, when Charlie grew older he went away to Trinity College (now Duke University). Then he entered a theological seminary from which he graduated and was ordained.

Returning to China, he married a Chinese girl and set up a home out of which came six children. One daughter became the wife of the Minister of Finance; another daughter became the wife of Sun Yat-sen, founder of the Chinese Republic; and the third daughter became the wife of Chiang Kai-shek. One son became the founder of the Bank of China; another son became the Collector of customs of Chinese ports; and the third son became the manager of the export-import business of China. So the Soong dynasty was founded.

If there is a lesson here it can be learned from a sea captain who when he first went to sea never knew how a simple act of love and kindness would change the world. And, yes what opportunity awaits each of us around the next bend in the road. And will we take it or pass it by, never to know what might have been.

In October 1958, the Exchange Bank celebrated 75 years of continuous operations. In that year the banking furniture and fixtures, which had been there since the beginning, were replaced with new modern ones. The original two buildings were remodeled into one modern banking room and the outside was resurfaced with rose orange Norman brick and Indiana limestone.

The old fixtures with the bullet proof glass was replaced with friendly unobstructed metal counters, vault space was increased doubling the number of safe deposit boxes, and the teller and customer areas were doubled in space.

Upon the death of Joseph P. Good in 1968, J. Ben Good was elected president. In 1975, rooms to the west of the bank were torn down and a modern drive up banking facility was added along with more office space and a new director's room. In 1982, the former Gambles store building to the north of the bank was purchased for future expansion.

In 1983, the bank celebrated 100 years of continuous service without interruption. Throughout the Exchange Bank's 100 plus years history, the bank was considered a family bank. It had been owned and operated by the family of Samuel L. Good. The bank had touched the lives of practically every member of the community.

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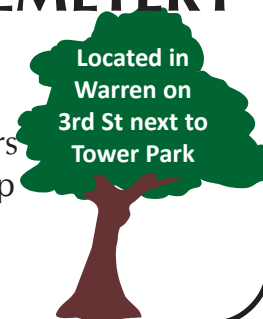
