## FESTIVAL CANCELLED

Following discussion between the Warren Town Council and Officers of the Salamonie Summer Festival Committee, it was determined that the 2020 Festival be cancelled including the Fireworks and Parade. While it was not an easy decision, due to the uncertainty of the current COVID situation and related issues, and after checking with over twenty five other communities, and after requesting input from some local citizens, and after checking with Town consultants among other issues, it was decided that it was not in the best interest of Warren Area Citizens to hold events in which social distancing would or could not be possible or be able to be controlled. Town Officials applaud the committee for their work in planning the annual event and are encouraged about some alternate planning that might be put in place by the committee later in the year. Again, please realize it was not an easy decision to make and disappointment is being felt by all. The Miss Warren pageant will continue as it is being held in a private setting and since those chosen represent the community in many other ways than just during the Festival. The Samuel Jones Pioneer Event has also been canceled.

We all hope that with the announcement being made now, you will have time to plan a July 4th Celebration Weekend.

### PRIMARY ELECTION

Indiana's primary election is just two weeks way -- June 2. And with important races up and down the ballot determining nominees in November, we want to make sure you have all the information you need to vote -- including one big deadline this Thursday.

Voting Absentee By Mail: If you choose to vote absentee by mail, you must make sure your local county clerk or Board of Elections has received your absentee ballot request by this Thursday.

Voting Early In Person: If you'd prefer to vote early in person, you can do so starting this Tuesday, with early voting running through June 1. Check IndianaVoters.in.gov for your polling location and hours.

If you choose to request an absentee ballot, here's how to make that request online right now:

Go to IndianaVoters.in.gov and click "Vote By Mail or Traveling Board."

Click "Visit My Voter Portal," and securely log in with your name, date of birth and county.

On the left navigation bar, select "Absentee Voting," and then click "Vote By Mail."

Complete the "Application for Absentee Ballot by Mail Only For 2020 Primary Election" form.

Check that you authorize your signature to be added to the application, and the click "Submit Application."

You will get your absentee ballot in the mail.

Fill out the ballot and return it to your county election division.

But regardless of whether you vote absentee, early or on Primary Day -- it's most important that your voice is heard!

### P-EBT

The Indiana Family and Social Services Administration announced today that families whose children receive free or reduced-cost meals at school will receive "Pandemic Electronic Benefit Transfer" benefits beginning this week. These benefits are intended to reimburse the families of about 600,000 Hoosier children for the cost of meals that their children were unable to receive due to COVID-19-related school closures.

Families who do not currently receive SNAP will receive an electronic benefits transfer card in the mail by the end of May, along with instructions on how to activate and use their card. Families do not have to apply for Pandemic EBT, also called "P-EBT." The P-EBT card works like a bank debit card and can be used at any store in the United States that accepts SNAP, but cannot be used for cash withdrawals at ATM machines. FSSA worked with the Indiana Department of Education to identify these families based upon their child already receiving free and reduced-cost meals at school.

Families who already receive SNAP benefits will have the additional benefits applied to their SNAP accounts on their Hoosier Works EBT card by the end of May.

For P-EBT, each household will receive an amount equal to the value of the daily allotment for breakfast and lunch multiplied by the average number of school days missed since school was cancelled. Families will receive this amount for each eligible child in the household for the number of days the child was eligible for free and reduced lunch. The value of the school meals per day is equal to the federal reimbursement rate for breakfast and lunch at the free rate, which is \$5.70, as specified by the United States Department of Agriculture.

The Indiana Department of Education calculated an average of 56 missed days of school through the end of the school year (including spring break) for Indiana students, counting all weekdays from March 13, 2020, through May 29, 2020. The first date was the day following Governor Eric Holcomb's executive order closing schools for the remainder of the 2019-2020 school year. The second date represents the average last day of school for schools in this school year.



### WARREN 1840

Warren, in the year 1840, was just beginning to grow. At that time there were only

seven or eight houses built. That year John W. Priddy built a residence and storeroom combined on the Southwest corner of Main and Second street. Samuel Jones' house had already been built in 1833 at the Southwest corner of Wayne and First street. The second house was built in 1833 by Fleming Mitchell, south of the river and was a suburb to what was later to be Warren.

In 1840 there was a blacksmith by the name of Jacob McPherson located on the southwest corner of Main and Second street. John Shaffer, a cabinet maker, had located his business on the southeast corner of Main and First street. A storekeeper was located, in a two story house, on the northeast corner of Main and First street. His name was Luke R. Allison and to the west of Mr. Jones was a house occupied by Noah McGrew.

We boarded the bus at 9 am. and made our first stop at the former Pearl Beer Company property. The business was founded in 1883 and stopped brewing its product some years later. The buildings remained as an eyesore for San Antonio for several years since it was close to the downtown area. Finally in 2001, the campus was revitalized with a hotel and restaurants utilizing some of the original structures. This plaza area contained umbrella-covered tables and many vendors.

Today was a Saturday Market Day there with several booths selling vegetables, pastries, chocolates, omelettes, flowers, and beef. Yes, beef! Well, it is Texas. Another vendor was taking orders for lamb meat. I told that lady that my family had spent 17 years raising sheep and I had plans to grill lamb patties the next Saturday at a festival. She was not overjoyed that I was speaking and not spending. We did purchase 5 Texas peaches. They probably came from

Fredericksburg! I also inquired about a fruit vendor's unusual melon. It was slightly green on the inside and was told that it was an Israeli Cantaloupe.

Afterwards, the bus driver drove northeast on I-410 to I-35 through New Braunfels, TX to nearby Gruene (Green), TX.

Story has it that a German prince founded the former town, but his bride refused to move to an uncivilized country!

The latter town dates back to 1845 when German immigrant Ernst Gruene arrived in New Braunfels. Land was scarce so he and his sons purchased land down the Guadalupe River and established the town of Gruene. He planted cotton and the river powered the cotton gin. The town thrived until a fire destroyed the gin in 1922, the boll weevil infestation, and the Depression. All businesses closed except for the Gruene "Town Hall." The community became a ghost town for years. In 1974-75, the Gruene estate was sold and the town was placed on the National Register of Historic Places. Better times followed.

We walked into Mozie's corner bar to gain some reprieve from the heat and were surprised to suddenly be viewing the I.U. vs. Ohio State football game on the wall TV set. We joined another tour couple and watched for thirty minutes

while the score was still close.

Our lunch that day was at the nearby, "Old Timers Cooper's Pit BBQ." The meal of beef brisket, BBQ Chicken and all the fixin's was certainly Texas style. Yum! Yum!

The next stop was near downtown San Antonio at a reclaimed old stone quarry that was developed into Breckenridge Park in 1917.

With prison labor a "Japanese Tea Garden" or "Japanese Sunken Garden" emerged. There were pools of water with a waterfall and goldfish, principally. Various flowers and bushes adorned the rest of the landscape. Of course there was an abundance of rocks, concrete steps, and photo ops.

My wife and I skipped the hotel meal and had dinner at the elusive "Bubba Gump's Shrimp Company Restaurant."

This time I scouted out the most direct route before taking my wife! In three blocks and one descending set of steps, we were "River Walk" level and beside the restaurant. I felt a real sense of accomplishment! No "lost" situation tonight!

While dining, the movie, "Forrest Gump" was playing on a nearby TV screen. In addition, the T-shirts worn by the waiters and waitresses had movie phrases painted on them. The table tops also

### FROM L.A.C.E.

Alcohol is the most frequently used substance in Indiana and the United States. Excessive alcohol consumption contributes to a number of health and economic consequences. Prolonged and compulsive use of alcohol can also lead to alcohol use disorder.

The Indiana Epidemiological Profile for 2019 was recently released. Notable statistics are as follows:

Over half of the population ages 12 and older consumed alcohol within the past month.

The rate of underage drinking in Indiana among 12- to 17-year-olds was 9.3%.

In 2018, nearly one-fourth of Indiana residents ages 12 or older reported binge drinking. The highest rate was among 18- to 25-year-olds. Health officials define binge drinking as having enough alcohol to bring your blood-alcohol content up to the legal limit for driving, about five drinks for men or four drinks for women in less than 2 hours.

The Indiana Youth Survey indicates that in 2018, 29.5% of Indiana 12th grade students reported using alcohol at least once during the past 30 days. Overall, alcohol consumption patterns seemed to progress with age; i.e., 8th grade

students showed lower prevalence rates than 10th and 12th grade students. However, Northeast Indiana had the highest rate of binge drinking among 8th graders, at 15.7%.

From 2000 through 2018, a total of 8,760 Hoosiers died from alcohol-induced causes, and mortality rates attributable to alcohol have climbed gradually in both Indiana and the United States.

There was a decrease in alcohol-related collisions from 13,911 in 2003 to 7,213 in 2018, a 48% drop. The number of fatal crashes with alcohol involvement also decreased, from 242 to 128, representing a 47% drop.

During State Fiscal Year 2019, there were a total of 8,738 removals of children from their homes. In 831 cases (9.5%), parental alcohol use was indicated as a reason for removal.

In Indiana, students can be suspended or expelled from school for using alcohol, tobacco, and/or drugs on school property. Data from the Indiana Department of Education indicate that during the academic year 2018, a total of 1,006 suspensions/expulsions were recorded in Indiana schools related to alcohol.

There are many conditions that are directly attributable to alcohol. Those conditions that may not be as obvious include: homicide 47%; fire injuries 42%; hypothermia 42%; portal hypertension 40%; drowning 34%; fall injuries 32%; poisoning (not alcohol) 29%; acute pancreatitis 24%; and suicide 23%.

These numbers suggest that problematic alcohol use continues to plague various age groups in our society. Unfortunately, denial is a common trait among those struggling with alcohol use disorders. They often underestimate the amount they drink, the duration of their drinking problem, and the impact it has on their life, or overestimate their ability to control their drinking or to quit. Denial is also common

among friends and family members who are uncomfortable

acknowledging the reality of the situation. Awareness about addiction and its harmful effects on our lives is necessary in order to protect our loved ones and ourselves.

### HOMELAND FOUNDATION SCHOLARSHIPS OPEN

Indiana college students who volunteer with a public safety organization can now apply for the FY 2021 round of the Indiana Homeland Security Foundation scholarship.

The Indiana Homeland Security Foundation scholarship offers higher education financial assistance for Indiana students who wish to pursue a degree.

A full-time student with at least 12 credit hours per semester is eligible for a \$2,000 scholarship and a part-time student with at least six hours per semester is eligible for a \$1,000 scholarship. The scholarship must be used during the awarded school year, and the funds are intended solely to reimburse eligible student educational expenses.

Eligible applicants include Indiana residents who are an incoming or continuing student who:

Attends or will be attending an accredited Indiana college. Must have a grade point average of 2.8 or higher on a 4.0 scale.

Volunteers at a public safety organization such as fire, law enforcement, emergency management or emergency medical services (validated by chief executive). The Indiana Homeland Security Foundation board will determine compliance eligibility. For more information on the compliance of an organization contact grants@dhs.in.gov.

### TEACHER OF THE YEAR

### KEEP WILDLIFE WILD THIS SPRING

This is the time of the year when you may start to notice nests and dens occupied by young wildlife around your home. If you do, help keep wildlife wild by remembering the following if you encounter a young animal alone:

Adult animals rarely abandon their young. Parents often

leave young unattended for long periods of time to gather food and may only return a few times a day. A nest or den without a parent present does not necessarily mean that the young have been abandoned.

Do not hover to see if a parent has come back to its young. An adult animal will not return if people or pets are close to the nest or den. Give the young space and only check back periodically. If you can't tell if a parent has checked on a nest, place straw or grass over the nest and return later to see if it has been disturbed.

Young wildlife should not be handled. Human scent is unlikely to cause parents to abandon their young; however, handling young wildlife and disturbance of a nest can alert predators to the young animal's presence. Young may also carry disease or parasites they can transfer to people or pets, and are capable of biting or scratching.

Rescuing young wildlife is legal, keeping them is not. Rescued wildlife must be given to a permitted wildlife rehabilitator within 24 hours. ### VOLUNTEER PADDLERS NEEDED

The DNR is asking paddlers to report their wildlife observations while paddling Indiana waterways from June 1 to July 31.

Paddling is a great way to enjoy Indiana's natural beauty, observe wildlife, and connect with nature, and

DNR is hoping to collect more information about the wildlife that frequents Indiana's waterways. Hoosiers who paddle can collect information that will help Indiana manage wildlife for future generations.

The Indiana Paddlecraft Wildlife Index compiles wildlife observations from people who use canoes, kayaks, or other non-motorized paddlecraft around the Hoosier state. Volunteer paddlers can help by signing up to complete paddling trip postcards documenting the wildlife they observe while on the water.

The collected information will allow wildlife managers to estimate changes in key wildlife populations over time. With paddlers' help, DNR may also gain insight into new locations where these species live.

In addition to feeling sad and being in a depressed mood, major depression will often affect sleep patterns, making sleeping difficult or having someone sleep too much. Some people have little energy and feel fatigued

most of the time. They may have no appetite or are eating too much. Depression can make it difficult to think clearly, to concentrate and to make decisions. In the most severe cases there may be frequent thoughts of death or suicide, or even suicide attempts.

Clinical depression can also cause or aggravate serious health issues. It has been linked to heart issues, the worsening of chronic health conditions, experiencing headaches and other unexplained aches and pains. But the good news is that depression is a treatable illness.

Depression will not just heal itself, but today there are a variety of therapies and medications which can provide real help.
