"CLICK IT OR TICKET"

INDIANAPOLIS—The Governor's Council on Impaired & Dangerous Driving, a division of the Indiana Criminal Justice Institute, is preparing to launch its annual "Click It or Ticket" campaign this month.

The campaign, funded by the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration, is Indiana's most aggressive, lifesaving traffic safety effort. It uses high visibility enforcement in combination with aggressive public information, education and intense media coverage to send the message to motorists that if they do not comply with Indiana's seat belt and child restraint laws, they will receive a ticket.

The 2004 enforcement period will run from May 23 to June 6. More than 500 law enforcement agencies and 14,000 officers will participate in increased seat belt enforcement across the state during that time frame. Hoosiers will begin to see this year's media message in their communities starting this week.

"Our goal is a 100 percent seat belt usage rate in Indiana. With campaigns like this one, we absolutely believe that goal is attainable," said Jerry McCarty, director of the Governor's Council on Impaired & Dangerous Driving.

After last year's "Click It or Ticket" campaign, the Center for the Advancement of Transportation Safety at Purdue University reported that 88 percent of those in cars were wearing seat belts — up from 57 percent in 1999. Even pickup truck drivers and passengers, who are not required by Indiana law to buckle up, have increased their seat belt usage from 33 percent in 1999 to 56 percent in 2003.

Despite increasing seat belt us-

age rates, 832 motorists were killed in statewide traffic crashes last year, and many of those fatalities could have been prevented if those involved had been properly restrained.

"It's not about writing tickets," McCarty said. "It's about saving lives on Indiana's roadways."

CAPTAIN'S BOOK AT WPL

Run Silent, Run Deep by Commander Edward L. Beach is available at the Warren Public Library. This gripping, best selling novel of submarine warfare inspired a well-known Hollywood film starring Burt Lancaster and Clark Gable. Set in the aftermath of the attack on Pearl Harbor, this tension-filled story focuses on an American submarine captain given orders to destroy Japanese shipping in the Pacific. From the training of the crew until the exciting conclusion, the novel is authentic. The book is based on true events experienced by the author during World War II.

Captain Beach was a famous submarine captain and the USS Salamonie was his only surface command. Two sets of his white uniforms including ribbons and medals were recently donated to the USS Salamonie Museum in Warren.

LIVESTOCK ENTRIES DUE

Families interested in showing Beef, Dairy Cattle, Sheep, and Swine in 4-H at the Indiana State Fair, August 11 - 22 must complete an entry form and mail by June 1st. The entry date is early so that forms can be processed for the livestock shows.

An entry fee of \$15 (per specie) must accompany the entry. A fee of \$50 must accompany entries postmarked June 2 - July 31. Only hand delivered entries will be accepted from August 1 until check-in time and must be accompanied by a \$50 late fee plus an additional fee of \$50 per animal.

The July 1st entry deadline remains the same for 4-H Boer Goats, Dairy Goats, Meat Goats, Dogs, Cat, Llamas, Pigeons, Pygmy Goats, Poultry, Rabbits, and Waterfowl. 4-H Horse & Pony entries are due July 31st or three days after the county fair.

How OLD Is GRANDMA?

One evening a grandson was talking to his grandmother about current events. The grandson asked his grandmother what she thought about the shootings at the schools, the computer age, and just things in general. The grandma replied, "Well, let me think a minute; I was born before television, penicillin, polio shots, frozen foods, Xerox, contact lenses, Frisbees, and the pill. There was no radar, credit cards, laser beams or ballpoint pens. Man had not invented pantyhose, air conditioners, dishwashers, clothes dryers, and the clothes were hung out to dry in the fresh air and man hadn't yet walked on the moon.

Your Grandfather and I got married first - and then lived together. Every family had a father and a mother. Until I was 25, I called every man older than I, "sir", and after I turned 25, I still called policemen and every man with a title, "sir." We were before gay-rights, computer-dating, dual careers, daycare centers, and group therapy. Our lives were governed by the Ten Commandments, good judgment, and common sense. We were taught to know the difference between right and wrong and to stand up and take responsibility for our actions. Serving your country was a privilege; living in this country was a bigger privilege. We thought fast food was what people ate during Lent. Having a meaningful relationship meant getting along with your cousins. Draft dodgers were people who closed their front doors when the evening breeze started. Time-sharing meant time the family spent together in the evenings and weekends - not purchasing condominiums.

We never heard of FM radios, tape decks, CD's electric typewriters, yogurt or guys wearing earrings. We listened to the big bands, Jack Benny, and the President's speeches on our radios. And I don't ever remember any kid blowing his brains out listening to Tommy Dorsey.

If you saw anything with "made in Japan" on it, it was junk. The term "making out" referred to how you did on your school exam. Pizza Hut, McDonald's, and instant coffee were unheard of. We had 5 & 10 cent stores where you could actually buy things for 5 and 10 cents. Ice cream cones, phone calls, rides on a streetcar, and a Pepsi were all a nickel. And if you didn't want to splurge, you could spend your nickel on enough stamps to mail one letter and two postcards.

You could buy a new Chevy Coupe for \$600 but who could afford one? Too bad, because gas was 11 cents a gallon. In my day, "grass" was mowed, "coke" was a cold drink, "pot" was something your mother cooked in, and "rock music" was your grandmother's lullaby. "Aids" were helpers in the principal's office, "chip" meant a piece of wood, "hardware" was found in a hardware store, and "software" wasn't even a word. And we were the last generation to actually believe that a lady needed a husband to have a baby. No wonder people call us "old and confused" and say there is a generation gap.

And how old do you think I am??

It's actually pretty scary if you think about it and pretty sad at the same time.

I'm only 58 years 'old!

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

RESPECT FOR LAW CAMP

TOOTH TIPS

Q. WHAT IS A SEALANT?

A. Sealants are a white or clear resin like material that helps prevent harmful bacteria from attacking the chewing surfaces of back teeth. This treatment is recommended for a Childs baby molar between the ages of 3 and 5. Also, when the permanent 1st molars (6 yr molars) appear and 2nd molars (12 yr molars).

The premolars are also considered for treatment. The depth of the grooves, brushing habits and diet takes into account for the dentist recommending sealants.

Sealants are applied very easily with no discomfort. The tooth enamel in the grooves is prepared with a mild acidic solution called etchant. Then the tooth is washed and dried thoroughly and the sealant is placed and hardened with a curing light (like a hair dryer). The dentist will then check to see if you are biting down properly.

Your sealant can last for a number of years and will be checked at recall appointments to check for wear and general maintenance of the sealants.

Along with regular brushing and flossing, good diet, and regular dental visits, sealants are a great preventative service for the patient.

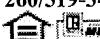

who defended our nation," said Postmaster General John Potter, who will dedicate the stamp. "This stamp will recognize and pay tribute to the men and women—from the front lines to the home front—who worked to preserve the freedom of our great nation during World War II."

Scheduled to join Potter at this national first-day-of-issue stamp dedication ceremony is World War II veteran and Vice Chairman of the U.S. Postal Service Board of Governors John Walsh.

The stamp image features a computer-generated design by stamp artist Tom Engeman depicting the National World War II Memorial in Washington, DC. The memorial itself was designed by Providence, RI, architect Friedrich St. Florian. The stamp image highlights one of two 43-foot memorial arches and shows a section of a curving row of 56 pillars, each representing one of the states, territories and District of Columbia that comprised the U.S. in the World War II era.

"This commemorative stamp, like the memorial itself, is a beautiful tribute to the service and sacrifice of America's World War II generation," said ABMC Secretary Maj. Gen. John Herrling, USA (ret). "We all are looking forward

CPR FOR THE PRO CLASS

The Huntington County Chapter of the American Red Cross will be having a CPR for the Professional Rescuer class on May 26th & 27th from 6:00 - 10:00 p.m. at 354 N. Jefferson Street (2nd floor of the Courthouse Annex in the meeting room).

Participants will learn how to check a victim for consciousness, how to perform rescue breathing, conscious and unconscious obstructed airway procedures, and cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR) on an adult, child and infant for one rescuer and two rescuer.

This course is specifically designed for people whose employment requires them to respond in the event of an emergency (allied health care professionals, firemen, EMT's, law enforcement, park rangers, physicians, nurses, security personnel, lifeguards, athletic trainers, Camp Leaders, First Aid Teams, first responders, and etc). The Red Cross provides visual, auditory, and manual learning tools to increase your learning process. The training is standardized and recognized by many national, state and local authorities. Sending your employees to the American Red Cross training sessions communicates commitment to your employees' health and well-being.

Children under the age of 17 do not need a fishing license at any time.

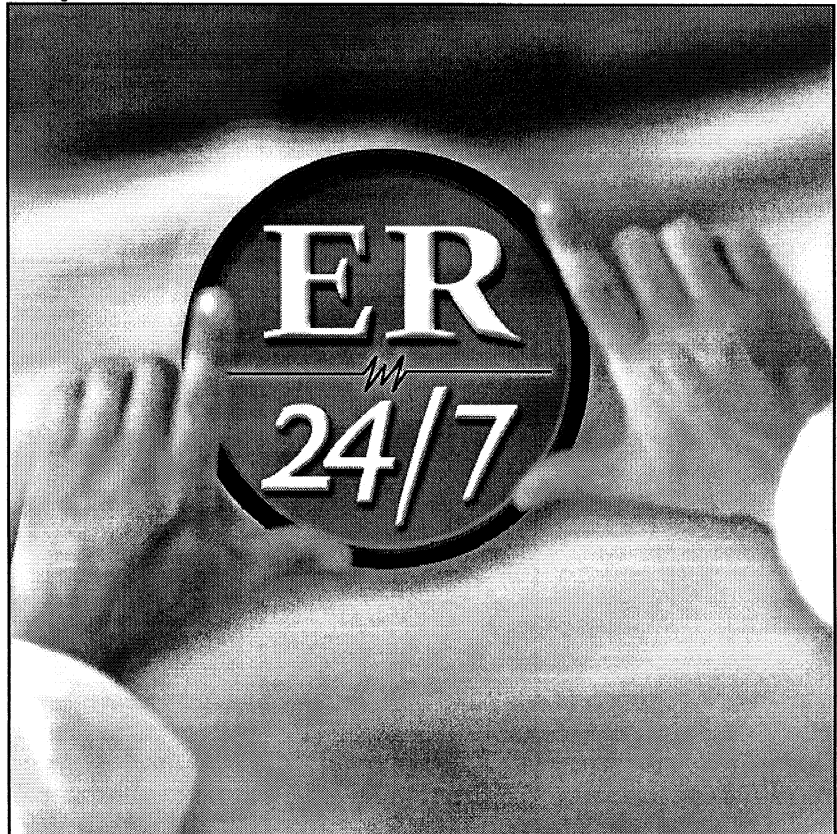
