HELPING YOUR KIDS SURVIVE END OF YEAR TESTING

from the American Counseling Association

Today's students are facing more tests than ever. While taking course exams, or state-mandated standardized tests, may never be fun, there are many things every student can do to minimize the stress and maximize test performance. The following advice can help any student:

- Plan ahead: Last minute cramming seldom improves test grades, but does raise test anxiety. Instead, start your studying early and spread it over a number of days.

- Anticipate: No test covers everything about a subject. Look for areas that are most important and most likely to be covered on a test as you review your notes or text book. Think about what the teacher has emphasized. If you've been given a study guide, use it. Pay attention when a teacher reviews material – those are the things most likely to be tested.

- Be rested. It's just common sense. Getting enough rest lets you feel better and will help your mind do a much better job of pulling up those obscure facts you forgot were even there.

- Eat healthy. Your brain requires good nutrition to do its job. Skipping breakfast impairs brain function. Eating a healthy breakfast improves it. Avoid junk food and foods loaded with sugar. Crashing from a sugar high during a test won't help your grades. And limit caffeine. Coffee, caffeinated soda and energy drinks may make you feel alert, but can also leave you jittery and nervous, and make concentrating more difficult.

- Stay focused. Taking a test is rarely enjoyable. Your mind wants to wander. Don't let it. Keep your eyes on your paper, ignore classroom distractions and pay attention to the test material.

- Relax. In the days before a test, practice relaxing by closing your eyes, taking a deep breath and thinking positive thoughts about how well you're going to do. Do the same thing at test time. If you get nervous during the test, take a few deep breaths and actually think about that air flowing into and out of your lungs. Then focus calmly back on the test. Remind yourself it's only a test, not life or death.

Doing well on tests isn't magic. It takes planning, studying and relaxing. But if doing all that doesn't help, the student may suffer from severe text anxiety. In such cases, the school counselor, or an outside professional counselor, can provide help in overcoming the problem.

FREE GROUND WATER TESTING

The Indiana Department of Environmental Management (IDEM) is conducting its 2016 Ground Water Assessment Survey and is looking for Hoosiers whose property contains a private drinking

water well that they would like to have tested free of charge.

Using the data collected from those who invite IDEM to test their wells, the agency will be able to "build a story" about ground water quality in the state. The goal of this project is to be able to evaluate ground water quality in different regions based on factors such as geology, depth to water, depth of the well, and land use.

By scientifically evaluating baseline ground water quality conditions in the state, IDEM will be better able to protect the ground water resource, determine how ground water may affect the quality of surface water, and evaluate changes in ground water over time.

The more residents who participate, the more information will be available on water quality in Indiana. By having their well sampled, residents will learn exactly what is in their water. If a concern is found, IDEM will provide the resident with information on how they can reduce their exposure to potential harmful chemicals.

CLARIFICATION

The Department of Natural Resources has received numerous questions regarding recent legislation that legalizes certain rifles for deer hunting beginning later this year. Most questions have to do with calibers and cartridges allowed under the new law.

House Enrolled Act 1231 that was passed earlier this year by the Indiana General Assembly allows some additional rifle cartridges to be used only on private land during the firearms season.

The new legal cartridges include, but are not limited to, the .243 Winchester, .30-30 Winchester, .300 AAC Blackout, and .30-06 Springfield. Additional requirements are:

The rifle must have a barrel length of at least 16 inches

The rifle cartridges must have a cartridge case length of least 1.16 inches

The rifle cartridge must fire a bullet with a diameter that is .243 inches (or 6 mm); or .308 inches (or 7.62 mm)

No cartridges with a bullet diameter between .243 and .308 are legal (such as the .270 Winchester)

A hunter may not possess more than 10 such cartridges while in the field

Rifles with pistol cartridges that have been allowed in previous years may still be used to hunt deer on both private and public land.

Additional cartridges that are legal under HEA 1231 include, but are not limited to, the following: 6mm-06; 6mm BR Remington; 6mm PPC; 6mm Remington; .240 Weatherby; .243 Winchester; .243 Winchester Super Short Magnum; .30 Carbine; .30 Herrett; .30 Remington AR; .30-06 Springfield; .30-30 Winchester; .30-40 Krag; .300 AAC Blackout (.300 Whisper); .300 H&H Magnum; .300 Remington Short Action Ultra Magnum; .300 Savage; .300 Weatherby Magnum; .300 Winchester Magnum; .300 Winchester Short Magnum; .300 Remington Ultra Magnum; .308 Marlin; .308 Winchester; 7.62x39mm; 7.62x54mmR

There are other cartridges that meet the law's specifications, and there are others that do not. A partial list of cartridges that are not allowed under HEA 1231

includes the .270 Winchester, .38-55 Winchester, .444 Marlin, and .45-70 Government.

HEA 1231 is scheduled to expire after the 2020 deer season, at which time the DNR will submit an impact report to the Governor and the General Assembly.

MOBILE FRIENDLY IN THE FIELD

Farmers can now access the first installment in a series of mobile-friendly Purdue Extension publications related to soil and water right from their smartphones, thanks to the efforts of Purdue University.
