BLOOD DRIVE

Time flies. And the start of a New Year reminds us there's no time better than now to start a tradition or renew old acquaintances.

In the case of blood donation, that one little act of rolling up your sleeve through your American Red Cross can make a big difference to someone in need. About one in 10 people entering the hospital needs blood. And that need for blood is constant, every minute of every day.

"While the need for blood is always there, blood donors sometimes aren't," said Sharyn Whitman, CEO for the Indiana-Ohio Blood Services Region of the American Red Cross. "Every day life can get in the way of making and keeping appointments, and before you know it, a donor might find it's been a while since they last came to donate "

The Red Cross is asking blood donors to leverage the power

of the New Year and make a resolution to make and keep appointments to donate blood.

"We have blood drives on a variety of days, during a range of times, in and near many communities," said Whitman. "Lots of donors find it helpful to set up two, even three appointments in advance as a way to plan and get organized."

First-time donors are also encouraged make to appointments, too, and to donate with a friend, family member or co-worker who may or may not have given blood before. Red Cross officials say more than 30 percent of people who give through the Red Cross are donating for the first time, with many resolving to come back again to join a lifesaving cause.

"Blood donors help provide the gift of life for patients undergoing surgeries, battling with cancer, or fighting to survive a life-threatening accident," said Whitman. "You can be there to help by simply resolving to give blood once, twice or up to six times a year." Come to donate from Dec. 1 -Jan. 31 and be entered into a region-wide drawing for a \$1,000 Visa gift card.

Today after all the gift wrap and boxes are carried to the basement I decided it was time to get some work done in the sunroom and transplant the cuttings I had taken off the plants last fall, which were much over due to be planted. When I finished I had a lunch of Christmas dinner leftovers and took in the nice warm sunroom and Wayne and I both soaked up some nice warm sun. We surely do enjoy those sunny days when we can spend time out there. I think we all can be grateful for the nice weather we have had this fall and into winter. For our Christmas dinner Gayle made a casserole which was real tasty which I will pass on to you.

Santa Fe Chicken and Vegetables with Couscous (which is very much like rice)

14 ounce can chicken broth, 1/4 cup water, 2 cups dry couscous, 1 cup chopped red sweet pepper, 1/2 cup onion chopped, 2 teaspoon olive oil, 1 cup frozen or fresh broccoli florets, 1 cup frozen corn, 2 cups cubed cooked chicken, 1 15 ounce can black beans rinsed, 1 can 15 ounce diced tomatoes undrained, 1 teaspoon ground cumin, 1 cup shredded Monteray jack cheese. In medium sauce pan bring water and broth to boil stir in the

couscous remove from heat cover and let stand 5 minutes.

In large skillet add olive oil, cook pepper and onion for about 5 minutes, add corn and broccoli, cook about 3 minutes then add chicken, black beans, tomatoes and cumin cook 3-5 minutes. Place couscous in 9 x13 casserole add the chicken and vegetable mixture over it and sprinkle on the cheese and place in 300 degree oven long enough to melt the cheese.

The new theatre opened September 13, 1940. The theatre was located where the north half of the PNC bank is now. Jesse and Clair Stucky, who had operated the Savory theatre across the street for several years, built the new theatre. The entire structure covered two business lots and had a front of forty-eight and a depth of 135 feet. It was two stories in height. The front section of the building contained two small business rooms, besides the ticket

office and outer lobby of the theatre.

Behind the business rooms was a spacious fover, carpeted and furnished with leather covered chairs and divans. At either end of the foyer were two arched entrances into the auditorium. The auditorium, with its carpeted aisles and leathered upholstered chairs, 450 of them, was the last word in luxurv.

The building was equipped with the latest type of heating and air-conditioning plant. For cooling the auditorium. in the summer, the air was blown through a fine spray of water and then forced through large ducts. One of the Warren signs that were on top of the marguee is hanging above the stage in the civic center.

The first show, in the new theatre was "Rhythm on the River" starring Bing Crosby and Mary Martin. The Warren Theatre closed for good because of small crowds on September 21, 1957.


Different areas across the United States can be more prone to flu outbreaks than others. Check the CDC's "FluView" to see the current flu activity level in your area. The map is updated weekly and can help you decide whether or not you and your family need to hurry up to the doctors for your flu shots.

Even though common colds are more prevalent this time of year, the flu can sneak up on you with no warning. Read up on how to tell the flu from a cold, the types of flu vaccines available to you, and find out who is most at risk for complications from the flu. Having a pamphlet on hand at the house can never hurt, and it's a great go-to guide in case something comes up unexpectedly.

If you're traveling over then next few weeks or months, make sure to check the areas you're visiting, especially if you're going outside the country. Flu.gov offers tips for travelers, including items you should include in a travel health kit and why you should look into what your insurance covers while you travel.
