GRANT AWARDED

National 4-H Council awarded a \$2,500 grant to the Huntington County 4-H robotics team. This funding will support the team as they work together throughout the year to learn how to build robots and participate in robotics competitions across the country.

To support 4-H's expanded robotics programming, and in anticipation of the upcoming 2010 launch of 4-H's comprehensive robotics movements, which create a curriculum, National 4-H dynamic, exciting, and effective Council raised grants that were awarded to forty-three 4-H

Robotics Teams in twenty states nation-wide. These 4-H teams will participate in at least one FIRST Robotics Competition (FRC), FIRST Tech Challenge (FTC), or FIRST LEGO League (FLL) event.

FIRST (For Inspiration and Recognition of Science and Technology) and National 4-H Council formed an alliance earlier this year to expand robotics clubs programming among new youth across the nation. Through these grants, twenty-seven of the forty-three grants awarded are helping to establish brand new 4-H Robotics Teams in several states.

Huntington County 4-H Robotics Team #1501 will participate in the FIRST Kick-off event on Saturday, January 9, 2010, held locally at Huntington University Science Building. 4-H members and adult mentors will begin the planning and design stages for building this year's robot to compete in the Boilermaker Regional, scheduled at Purdue University March 18-20.

The Earned Income Tax Credit or EITC, provides tax credits to working adults and families with low or moderate incomes. Money can be used to pay down debts, buy things families need, or can be saved for the future. The maximum EITC for 2009 is: \$457 for families with NO

Families may qualify for the Earned Income Tax Credit if they meet the following guidelines:



- * If the family has 1 child and made under \$35,463 (\$17.04/ hr.) in 2009, or if the family has 1 child and made under \$40,463 (\$19.45/hr.) if married filing jointly.
- * If the family has 2 children and made under \$40,245 (\$19.37/hr.) in 2009, or has 2 children and made under \$45,245 (\$21.77/hr.) if married filing jointly.
- * If the family has 3 or more children and made under \$43,279 (\$20.50/hr.) in 2009, or has 3 or more children and made under \$48,279 (\$23.21/ hr.) if married filing jointly.

BEEF ID DAY

Huntington County will hold its 4-H Beef Identification Day on Saturday, January 9, 2010 at the cattle barns, Hier's Park, Huntington. 4-H members planning to exhibit beef steers and/or non-registered breeding heifers must bring their animals for weighing, identification and ear-tagging between the hours of 9:00 am - 12:00 noon on January 9.

Animal enrollment forms were mailed in mid-December to all 4-H Beef members who were enrolled in the 4-H beef project for the previous year. The County Extension Office has additional copies of the necessary paperwork for any interested youth who has not yet received the forms. All paperwork must be completed

Is It SAFE?

There has been a lot of press in farm publications recently about feeding moldy corn to farm animals including hogs, chickens and cattle. concern is that some corn being harvested has either Gibberella or Diplodia mold with harmful mycotoxins. As you may be aware, the highest level of concern is for hogs and chickens. This is because they digest food differently than cattle. Prior research has shown performance issues in hogs and chickens from feeding moldy

Reports have circulated that hogs simply won't eat corn which has the Gibberella mold variety. In many situations, consultants and veterinarians are recommending testing new corn, so hog producers will know the mycotoxin levels in the grain. A plant pathologist from Ohio State University, Pierce Paul, mentioned that moldy corn should not be more than 20% of a hog's diet. He also said that corn containing vomitoxin at a level greater than 5 parts per million (ppm) should

not be fed to hogs. Note that Gibberella ear rot fungus produces three types of mycotoxins that are harmful to animals. These include deoxynivalenol (DON, also known vomitoxin), as zearalenone and T-2 toxin.

The situation is a bit different for farmers raising ruminant animals like cattle, sheep and goats. Purdue Extension beef and dairy specialists have even recommended that growers consider opportunities available to buy corn damaged by mold, as they may find a bargain price. Ron Lemenager, Purdue Extension management specialist, explained that the rumen is an organ that allows beef and dairy cattle to detoxify anything they might eat. However, he cautioned growers because the rumen does have its limitations.

"The concern that I have, as a nutritionist, in feeding moldy corn is for the replacement heifer," Lemenager said. "We know the toxin zearalenone has the potential to cause negative effects on conception rates and fertility in these breeding females."

Recently folks have contacted the Huntington County Extension office to see if moldy corn is safe for sheep and goats. There is much less research available for the effects of including moldy corn in the diet of sheep and goats. However, a concern exists for breeding ewes and does that reproductive performance may be impacted. A new publication is available which includes information specific mycotoxin concerns in feeding sheep and goats. It can be found at the following web address: h t t p : / /

If there is any question on mycotoxin levels in corn, livestock producers have resources available to them for testing the grain. The USDA Risk Management Agency has compiled a list of approved testing facilities, which can be at http:// www.rma.usda.gov/fields/ il rso/2009/mycotoxin.pdf.

The Animal Disease Diagnostic Lab (ADDL) at Purdue will also test corn for toxins. The mycotoxin screen 1 test costs \$25 and results can be obtained in approximately two weeks. Producers can send a small sample (approx. 1 lb.) in a sealed plastic bag. The Web site for ADDL is http:// www.addl.purdue.edu/Users/ TOX/Tests.asp.

BUZZED IS DRUNK

The winter holiday season brings with it the tradition of celebrating with family and friends. In many instances, these celebrations will involve alcohol. That is why the Governor's Council on Impaired & Dangerous Driving and the Indiana Criminal Justice Institute (ICJI) is once again urging Hoosiers to celebrate responsibly by planning ahead if they plan to drink.

This final reminder to deter impaired driving in 2009 comes on the heels of the Safe Family Travel initiative conducted by more than 250 Indiana law enforcement agencies last month to prevent impaired driving and enforce seat belt

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use. This Thanksgiving holiday mobilization resulted in more than 11,000 citations for seat belt, DUI and other traffic related offences.

In an effort to reduce the number of deaths and injuries on Indiana roadways this holiday season, the Indiana State Police, in conjunction with 125 local law enforcement agencies, will continue through December conduct to saturation patrols and sobriety checkpoints in 33 counties throughout the Participating counties have been identified as high alcohol crash areas and are part of the DUI Task Force enforcement program.

"Driving drunk or buzzed may potentially spiral into an unforeseen tragedy. That is why we want all motorists to reconsider the myths about drinking and driving," said ICJI Executive Director, T. Neil Moore. "Buzzed driving is drunk driving and driving while intoxicated just isn't worth the risk," Moore added.

In December 2008, 20 people lost their lives in alcohol-related crashes statewide. During the 2008 winter holiday period (6 p.m. December 24, 2008 through 6 a.m. January 5, 2009), 147 collisions involved alcohol. Furthermore, one out of every four fatal collisions during the
