WARREN RECEIVES WATER 2000 FUNDING

The Town of Warren received good news on July 10, 2000, when USDA Rural Development officials formally announced that the town would be receiving "WATER 2000" funding to help finance an important infrastructure project. "WA-TER 2000" is the Clinton-Gore Administration initiative designed to support efforts to bring safe. abundant drinking water to rural areas that lack it and to protect the quality of ground water through wastewater Systems.

On July 10th, at the Warren Town Hall, Enzley Mitchell III, USDA Area Manager, presented a check representing the \$2,720,000 low interest loan and the \$1,280,000 grant from USDA Rural Development to Chod Boxell, President of the Warren Town Council.

This major infrastructure project in Warren includes expanding the wastewater treatment facilities and replacing the existing combined sewers with new sanitary Sewers. This project will enable the town to grow and accept new users as the Indiana Department of Environmental Management sewer connection ban will then be

Mitchell said, "Congratulations to the Town of Warren for receiving "WATER 2000" funding. You have made an important investment in the future of your town with this infrastructure improvement project. We are proud to be your partners.

President Boxell added, "We are relieved and very excited that this special day has arrived. Thanks to all of those people who have worked so hard for nearly seven years to make this project finally become a reality."

At least 2.2 million non-metropolitan residents in the U.S. have crucial drinking water availability, quality or dependability problems. Since 1995, "WATER 2000" has resulted in over \$2 billion in USDA loans and grants being distributed to rural communities to address serious water problems.

COMPOSTING CAN BE EASY

Getting rid of grass clippings, leaves, and dead plants can be quite a problem. Yard waste is not allowed at all in some landfills.

The answer could be that old standby: the compost bin. You can create a simple one with a section of wire fencing, says Ralph Snodsmith, gardening editor for Good Morning America Extra.

Dump a layer of chopped grass and leaves to a depth of6 to 12 inches Pack down the waste and create a dished center in the pile. Cover this area with a few inches of garden soil. The soil provides bacteria for breaking down the organic matter. If you don't have enough garden soil use compost starter

If it hasn't rained by the time you add the next layer, wet the pile. Moisture is necessary in the composting process. Continue building the compost sandwich, layer by layer, until the bin is full.




