Kudos, Kicks & Karats

THE UPTOWN GARDENER by Ruth Herring

The rains we have received has certainly helped the good earth. Can't believe how much my poor sick tomato plant has

grown, it has actually started ripening, kinda small but they are tasty. The flowers in the planter in front of house is really looking good.

Last spring I planted some caladium bulbs in the planter thinking I would move them to where ever I wanted them in the flower beds, well I actually forgot about them and they all popped up but not where I had planted them.

They are slow growers so I put them in the back so I could plant other in front. Well I had forgotten about them and every one came up but not where I had put them. Evidently the friendly squirrels decided to rearrange them and thought I may as well leave them, they did such a good job of spacing them very evenly. Now they are crowding out some of the annuals I had put in but they do look good and very healthy. I guess that is the payback of them digging up the tulip bulbs which I am not happy about. Those are the ones my brother in Texas sent to me for my 80th birthday and I am hoping he doesn't feel sorry having lost so many and decides to send me 82 for my birthday which is in a few days. I think if so I would be tempted to send them back and let the copper heads feast on them.

Last time I had a recipe of my mom's butterscotch pie which I had a lot of kind remarks from readers relating to the days their moms made it the same way with the old heavy iron skillet. Here is the modern day version of how I make it not quite as good as I remember it but it passed at our house.

Take 1/4 cup cornstarch and 1 cup brown sugar, 1/4 teaspoon salt and blend it together well, add 2 cups milk gradually mixing it in well and cook until it thickens almost to boiling point. Remove from heat, beat 3 egg yolks and add a small portion of the hot mixture to the eggs and stir in well then slowly add rest of the hot mixture. Add 3 tablespoons butter, 1/2 teaspoon vanilla and 1/4 teaspoon lemon extract, return this to cook on medium heat about 1 minute longer. Pour into baked pie shell, top with egg meringue and brown in oven till lightly browned. Or take the easy way and top with whipped cream or cool whip. Not as good as moms knowing she made it with rich fresh cows milk and home churned butter and eggs fresh from the chicken house, but it's still pretty good.

Citing the threat to Hoosier forests, Gov. Mike Pence has proclaimed the week of Aug. 14-20 Pest as **Forest Awareness** Week. purpose is to put the state's residents on high alert during a time when signs of such threats tend to appear.
