Opens at the Pulse  
December 1

The Pulse Opera House kicks off the Christmas season with Elf, Jr. The story of Buddy the Elf is now a musical! **POOL REPORT**

**CHAUTAUQUA**

President Suellen Jones opened the November 3, 2017, Chautauqua meeting welcoming the 27 members, and then leading the repeating of the Collect. Roll Call was answered with "Thanksgiving Memories" followed by the business meeting.

Betsy Finley then presented a very timely and interesting program, "The 2 First Thanksgivings."

The first took place in the time of King James I of England about 1609. The town of Berkley in England was a clothing manufacturing center that was plagued with overpopulation and poverty. So many people turned to agriculture growing tobacco and other crops. However, the King and the Virginia Company were afraid that if England was successful with tobacco, it would have an adverse financial impact on the Colonies in the New World. King James I prohibited growing tobacco for 5 years. Unemployment escalated, and many people came to Virginia seeking religious freedom, better lives, and to escape the King's imposed taxes. Soon the 1st permanent English settlement in the New World, Jamestown, was settled. They endured many hardships—devastating storms in the Atlantic in 1609-1610 that prevented supplies to be sent to them. 60 of 490 settlers remained 3 years later.

In 1618 four Englishmen formed a company to start

Berkley, then a town of sorts that was better suited for agriculture. The King granted 8,000 acres to them which included 3 miles of waterfront.

John Woodlief, himself a survivor of the Jamestown storms, was chosen Captain to lead the expedition to the New World. He was later named the 1st Governor. On September 16, 1619, he leased the "Good Ship Margaret," a 35 foot ship, chose carpenters and skilled workers who would be able to set up the colony, and 35 settlers, plus himself. They sailed for 2 ½ months and arrived at the Chesapeake Bay on November 3, 1619.

However, the storms delayed their landing until November 30th,, and were not able to build up the King James Berkley Plantation until later. When they all came ashore, John Woodlief and all knelt and prayed a grateful prayer of Thanksgiving for their lives and safety. His prayer:

"We ordain that this day, at our ship's arrival, at the place assigned for Plantacion, in the land of Virginia, shall be yearly and perpetually kept holy as a day of Thanksgiving to Almighty God."

These celebrations of Thanksgiving were strictly religious, and not a festival of food. Thus, the first official English speaking Thanksgiving occurred

almost 2 years before Pilgrims landed in Massachusetts at Plymouth Rock.

John Smyth of Nibley, England, Historian of the Berkley family, documented the settlement of Virginia from 1602\_\_ 1622. It's records became known as The Nibley Papers. They were published in the New York Public Library in 1899, and the Library of Congress in 1906. In the late 19th century they were researched by President John Tyler's son, Dr. Lyon Tyler. He wrote an article April 3, 1931, about the research, and it was possibly the 1st time Virginians learned about Berkley's FIRST Thanksgiving.

November, 1621, is the date we commonly refer to as the First Thanksgiving Feast which was held in Plymouth, Mass., including both Pilgrims and the Wampanoag Indians. This came after a successful corn harvest, and was organized by Gov. William Bradford. Wampanoag Chief Massasoit attended the 3 day feast. The rest of the story showed friendly sharing and cooperation. Thanksgiving was not celebrated nationally until a year after 1621.

In 1789 George Washington issued a Proclamation of Thanksgiving—a day of Public Thanksgiving and

Prayer. But there were no Presidential Proclamations from 1815 –1863 when President Lincoln declared Thanksgiving an official holiday Nov. 26, 1863. The 4th Thursday remained a day of Thanksgiving until 1939 when Pres. Roosevelt changed it to the 3rd Thursday, but returned it to the 4th in 1941. On Nov. 5th, 1963, President Kennedy acknowledged both States—Va. And Mass.--in his Proclamation.

Thanksgiving is a Special Day that we can all give Thanks for our Blessings in Prayer.

Delicious refreshments were served to 27 members. December's meeting will be held at 1:30 in the Heritage Pointe Boardroom.

**SAFE HOLIDAY DECORATING**

While decking the halls this holiday season, the Indiana State Fire Marshal, part of the Indiana Department of Homeland Security, encourages Hoosiers to keep fire safety in mind. A large portion of home fires during the holiday season are a result of outdated holiday lights and unattended candles.

Holiday lights and decorations should be carefully examined each year before they are hung outside or on a tree. Common fire hazards to look for on holiday lights are frayed or broken strands and missing bulbs.

If possible, older styles of lights should be replaced with newer, cool-to-touch lights that are less likely to ignite nearby materials. There should never be more than three strands of lights attached together. Always verify that lights, power strips and extension cords are rated for the location where they'll be used, particularly for outdoor decorations.

When leaving the house or going to bed, lights should be turned off and all candles should be extinguished. Candles should never be placed in an unattended holiday display, on a Christmas tree or below any ignitable holiday decorations. If candles must burn completely as part of a holiday celebration, make sure they are attended to at all times.

#### Decorating Safely

Each year, thousands of people make trips to the emergency room from falls due to unsafe ladder use while hanging holiday lights or decorations. Here are a few ladder-related tips to keep in mind this holiday season:

- Stay clear of power or feeder lines when hanging lights outdoors.
- Always have a buddy system when up on a ladder or roof.

- Make sure the ladder is on a secure and level footing before climbing.

- Space the base of the ladder one foot away from the wall for every four feet it reaches up.

- Never stand on the top two rungs of an extension ladder or on the very top of a step ladder.

- Carry a cell phone at all times in the event of an accident.

When decorating outside during extremely cold weather, Hoosiers should try to limit the amount of time they are outside. Exposure to cold temperatures for an extended amount of time puts extra strain on the heart and can increase the risk of frostbite. Adults and children should wear the following while decorating outside:

- A hat
- A scarf or knit mask to cover face and mouth
- Sleeves that are snug at the wrist
- Insulated and waterproof mittens or gloves
- Several layers of loose-fitting, thermal wear or material that wicks moisture off the skin
- A water-resistant or tightly woven coat
- Two layers of socks with boots or shoes that are waterproof and have a flexible sole

The app promotes early prenatal care and education about pregnancy. It includes information about nutrition, an interactive calendar, a journal feature and more than 100 articles, checklists and how-to's based on best medical practices. It also includes links to other resources, including contacts for doctors, hospitals, food banks, Women, Infants and Children (WIC) clinics and birthing centers. Users can sign up to receive messages and alerts appropriate to their stage of pregnancy.

"Having a healthy baby starts long before a woman becomes pregnant," said State Health Commissioner Kris Box, MD, FACOG. "The new Liv app will help women learn what steps they can

take to improve their health before and during pregnancy and give their babies the best possible start to life."

The Liv app was created by Indianapolis-based technology solutions company eimagine using funds appropriated by the Indiana General Assembly. The app is part of ISDH's efforts to reduce infant mortality, which is defined as the death of a child before his or her first birthday. In 2015, the last year for which data are available, 613 Indiana babies died before the age of 1. 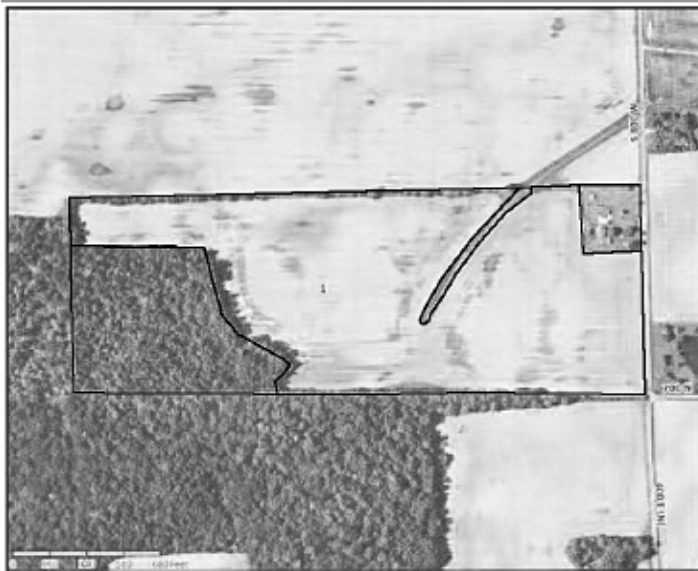

#### Leftover Turkey Taco

##### Crescent Ring

Prep time: 25 minutes

Cook time: 25 minutes

Servings: 10

In medium saucepan over medium heat, melt butter. Add onion; cook and stir 3 minutes, or until tender. Add turkey, corn, tomatoes, garlic and remaining seasoning mix. Cook and stir 5 minutes. Remove from heat. Stir in cream cheese and 1 cup shredded cheese.

Unroll crescent roll dough on greased or parchment paper-lined baking pan. Separate into triangles. Arrange triangles to resemble sun with center open. Press dough where bottoms of triangles overlap. Spoon turkey mixture in ring where dough overlaps. Fold triangle points over filling, tucking into bottom layer to secure. Continue until entire ring is enclosed.

Bake 15 minutes, or until golden brown.

In bowl, stir remaining shredded cheese into reserved seasoning mix. Remove ring from oven. Sprinkle with cheese mixture.

Bake 5 minutes longer, or until cheese is melted.

Serve with desired toppings, such as shredded lettuce, sour cream or guacamole.

#### Slow Cooker Red Wine Hot Chocolate

Prep time: 5 minutes

Cook time: 1 hour

Servings: 14

1 bottle (750 milliliters) red wine

8 cups whole milk

1 can (14 ounces) sweetened condensed milk

1 package (12 ounces) dark chocolate chips

1 teaspoon McCormick

### Pecan Pie Brie

Prep time: 5 minutes

Cook time: 12 minutes

Servings: 12

1/2 cup firmly packed brown sugar

1/2 teaspoon McCormick
