BMV TO CLOSE 12

To increase efficiency and enhance customer service, the Indiana Bureau of Motor Vehicles will be closing twelve license branches in June.

The 12 license branches to close include full-service branches in Garrett, North Manchester, Elwood, Bloomfield, Berne and Butler; and satellite branches in Warren, Montpelier, Cayuga, Knightstown, Summitville and Hope. These 12 branches will cease operations at the close of business, Saturday, June 4th, 2005.

"To improve service, the BMV must increase efficiency, investing limited resources to serve the entire state as quickly and conveniently as possible," BMV Commissioner Joel Silverman said.

"To do this, the BMV must close some of its smallest branches to enhance service in every branch. This will also help us expand our services available outside of the branch through Internet, mail and dealers."

These closures will affect 25 employees from the full-service branches and every effort will be made to offer them similar positions within the agency.

"All of the associates who are affected by this decision have been notified," Silverman added. "We are working with these associates on job placement opportunities within the Commission as well as the BMV home office."

Branch changes are part of the BMV's comprehensive plan that includes a new, statewide computer system, more convenient hours, improved online and mail options and upgrades to existing branches.

"Branch realignment has been recommended numerous times in the last decade to increase efficiency," Silverman said. "All of these steps will dramatically improve service to Hoosiers."

LUTHERAN AIR SCHEDULED TO VISIT

Everyone attending the Warren Arts Festival on Saturday, May 14 will have a special opportunity to get a close-up look at Lutheran Air. The helicopter and flight crew are currently scheduled to arrive in Warren at the United Methodist Memorial Home, 801 North Huntington, Ave., between 10:30 and 11:00 a.m. The public is invited to meet the crew and peek inside the aircraft up until 2:00 p.m. This latest addition to Lutheran's critical care transport fleet made its first run on May 12, 2004. To date, Lutheran Air has transported over 310 patients throughout the region - a reflection of all the referring hospitals, physicians, EMTs, paramedics, firefighters and police officers who have entrusted the flight crew with the care of their medical and trauma patients.

The first year of service has been a whirlwind for the entire flight crew. The Lutheran Air program is truly blessed to have such a dedicated group of medical professionals. They have worked very hard and spent many hours attending outside classes beyond their daily flight duties. Areas of additional training have included Transport Nurse Advanced Trauma, Advanced Burn Life Support, Pediatric Advanced Life Support, Advanced/Basic Trauma Life Support, Neonatal Resuscitation, Advanced Cardiac Life Support, as well as many FAA and AAMS required flight crew safety courses. The crew also spends three hours a month in an intensive Grand Rounds setting where all patient care transports are reviewed by the medical director and team members receive updates from various physicians on current medication and treatment protocols.

Quoted in the Wall Street Journal, Gloria Elliot is a consultant who helps companied deal with obnoxious employees through her "Jerk Training" seminars. She says jerks don't admit their actions and are devious or conniving. They plow through the workplace, focusing only on their own careers.

Jerks tend to be narcissistic, manipulative, and goal-oriented. They trust no one and lack empathy, but they are skilled at politics. They disregard how they treat others, but are very good at sweet talking the boss. Elliot estimates that 10 percent of people in the work force are full-time jerks.

When you decide that someone is a remorseless ierk, back off. Normal things such as trying to talk things out or asking him to reconsider rarely work. Never smile at a jerk Elliot recommends.

If you decide to confront him, you need co-workers to back you up. Even then, don't count on a big change. Outline the workrelated behavior that you and your colleagues want changed.

John Hoover, author of How to Work for an Idiot (Career Press), says it's best to admit that you are "powerless" over the jerks in your life. Pledge that you won't let them rattle you.

One seminar attendee admitted he could only be nice until 9:15 am. After that, it was "every man for himself."

Ten Boom (author of "The Hiding Place"), he became a courier for her, distributing food ration cards to the Jewish families in hiding. He also took small children to area farmers for seclusion so they wouldn't be killed by the Nazi soldiers.

After the arrest of Corrie Ten Boom, Bill (then age 13) was also captured and was sent to **Vught Concentration Camp** which was for people who aided the Jews.


FORMS DUE

500 New Jobs

Indiana Governor Mitch Daniels joined Marion city officials and Dollar General executives to-day to announce the company's plans to build a distribution center in the city and create 500 new jobs for Grant County.

"This is an important economic win for Marion and Indiana. A lot of people combined to make this happen, but the biggest selling point is the great work force available in Grant County," said Governor Daniels. "This is a great day, but we need dozens more announcements like this all over Indiana before we can begin to celebrate."

Dollar General plans to build a 1.1 million square-foot facility on a 188-acre site on State Route 18, near Interstate 69.

The total cost for the distribution center and transportation shop, including equipment and fixtures, is expected to exceed \$70 million. At full capacity, the Dollar General facility will employ about 500 people. Additionally, Dollar General's third-party transportation provider has indicated that it expects to employ approximately 90 people. The company expects to begin site work by the end of the month and to complete construction by the fall of 2006.

"To reinforce our service to customers and to support our company's network of stores, we're expanding the distribution network to include a ninth distribution center," said Lloyd Davis, senior vice president, supply chain operations. "We are excited about our decision to build in Marion. We are attracted to the quality of Marion's work force and its proximity to our service area. Governor Mitch Daniels and Mayor Wayne Seybold are enthusiastic partners, and we are grateful for their collaboration."

The Indiana Economic Development Corporation (IEDC), in partnership with the City of Marion and the Grant County Economic Growth Council, worked together to provide an incentive package that helped secure the \$70 million distribution center project for Dollar General.

"We are pleased that Dollar General recognizes the value of doing business in Indiana and wants to increase its presence here," said Patricia R. Miller, Secretary of Commerce and chief executive of the IEDC. "We hope this is a trend other companies in the state will model."

Dollar General operates more than 270 stores in Indiana, including three stores in the Marion
