CLOSED FOR VETERAN'S DAY

Veteran's Day, November 11, falls on a Sunday this year. Therefore, the federal holiday will be Monday, November 12. There will be no mail delivery and the Post Office service counter will be closed.

Mail will be collected from the outside box in the parking lot at 6:30 a.m. only. There will be no evening collection or dispatch from the lobby collection drop. All mail should be placed in the outside collection box after 11 a.m. on Saturday.

PUBLIC HEARING

The Huntington County Property Tax Assessment Board of Appeals will convene on Thursday, November 15th at 7:00p.m. in the GAR Room (Room 207) Huntington County Courthouse to review land values for the 2002 Reassessment.

The Huntington County Property Tax Assessment Board of Appeals will review the land value basic rates set by the township and county assessors prior to these rates being used to assess. The Assessors hired Indiana Assessment Service as a technical advisor to establish land values for the general reassessment purposes according to the provisions of IC 6-1.1-4-17. Sales Disclosures were used to arrive at these values. The established value of this land represents the January 1, 1999 market value in use of improved land.

The values are based on summary sheets given to us by Indiana Assessment Service. The values are subject to change.

The city and towns land base rates will range from \$30 to \$300 a front foot rate using the new rates rather than the \$20 to \$155 a front foot rate used in the prior reassessment.

The Subdivisions will range from \$30 to \$131 a front foot rate using the new rates rather than the \$25 to \$35 a front foot rate used in the last reassessment.

The platted township lots will range from \$30 to \$340 a front foot rate using the new rates rather than the \$30 to \$155 used in the last reassessment.

Commercial platted lots will range from \$30 to \$374 a front

foot using the new rates rather than the \$20 to \$200 used in the last reassessment.

Commercial acreage will range from \$6702 to \$40598 per acre using the new rates rather than the \$5000 to \$33000 used in the last reassessment.

Industrial acreage will range from \$6702 to \$14985 rather than the \$5000 to \$8000 used in the last reassessment.

Residential home sites will range from \$2760 to \$32287 rather than the prior \$3000 to \$12000.

Landowners in rural areas that own farmland will now be assessed at \$1050 per acre instead of the \$495 used in the prior reassessment. The farm base price was set by the State of Indiana. It will still be based on the usage and the soil type per acre.

VETERANS DAY PROGRAM

The Veterans Day celebration begins on November 10th with a Veterans' Dinner at Roanoke's American Legion Post 160.

The Huntington County Veterans' Council recently announced that a Veterans' Dinner, free to all veterans (but veterans only, please) would be held from 12 noon to 3 p.m. on Saturday, Nov. 10th at American Legion Post 160 located at 1122 N. Main Street, Roanoke. No reservations are required and there is no formal program, so veterans should come when they can. Questions, call the post at 219-672-2298.

The Veterans' Day Program will be held on Monday evening, Nov. 12th at the First Church of the Nazarene located at 1555 Flaxmill Rd., on the Huntington by-pass behind RediMed.

The program, sponsored by local veterans' organizations and the Huntington County Veterans' Council, starts at 6:30 p.m. and, while honoring all veterans, will focus again this year on 62 specific local veterans who served during the Korean War period and 3 who were part of the Normandy campaign during World War II. The program will end with a special salute to the service members and civilians who lost their lives in the Sept. 11 terrorist attacks on the World Trade Center towers and the Pentagon.

The program is financed by contributions from American Legion

Posts 7, 85 and 160 and VFW Posts 2689 and 6671, and money appropriated into the Veterans' Service Office budget by both the Huntington County and City Councils.

TO THE EDITOR OF THE WARREN WEEKLY:

The horror of this fall's terrorist attacks has raised our sense of being connected to one another and the need to care for each other across social and economic classes. It has also raised substantial amounts of money for victim assistance funds, which is altogether filling and necessary. While extremely heartening to watch, it leaves us facing additional challenges as the weather turns colder and the holiday season approaches: How can we as a society maintain this level of caring? ADOPTIVE HOMES NEEDED

In an effort to generate awareness of the hundreds of Indiana children waiting for permanent adoptive families, Governor Frank O'Bannon has proclaimed November as Adoption Month in Indiana. His proclamation focuses on the need for adoptive homes for children waiting in foster care. This type of adoption is called "special needs." "Special needs" children are older, of minority racial background, or are members of a sibling group. Many are teens. Most have been placed in foster care due to backgrounds of neglect and abuse. All of them need and want a family of their own.

The proclamation also states that adopting a special needs child

does not cost a great deal, nor take a long time. Special needs adoption preparation classes are free and only take a few weeks to complete. In addition, in most cases, the state provides adoption subsidies to help provide for the needs of the adopted child.
