40 Days to Spiritual Health

Lent is the 40 day period between Ash Wednesday and Easter. Traditionally, it has been a time when Christians re-examine their spiritual life and try to discern the quality of their relationship with God

There are many individual approaches to strengthening the spiritual life, including: choosing to fast, praying more often, reading the Bible and devotional literature, engaging more often in public worship, serving God more intensely in the world.

We miss the mark if we focus only on our desires. Lent ought to be a time of deeper dedication to God and seeking ways in which we can help to further God's kingdom on Earth.

A Cross Made by Ashes

The observance of Ash Wednesday, according to the Catholic Encyclopedia, dates from at least the eighth century A.D. The ancient custom was for the worshipers to approach the altar before the beginning of the Mass. A priest would dip his thumb into ashes made from the previous year's Palm Sunday palms and make the sign of the cross on each person's forehead.

Ash Wednesday is a time for repentance and the beginning of Lent. Ashes were used in ancient times, according to the Bible, to express penitence. Dusting themselves with ashes was the penitent's way of expressing sorrow for sins and faults. An ancient example of one expressing his penitence is found in Job 42:35. Job says to God: "I had heard of you by the hearing of the ear, but now my eye sees you: therefore I despise myself, and repent in dust and ashes" (v. 5, NRSV),

FORTY DAYS

In penitence I bow my head As we begin these days of Lent And in my mind I walk again The way that Jesus went

Those final days of His dear life Those weeks before He died The anguish that He lived thru And the bitter tears He cried

What can I give up in atonement For all he gave for me Will abstaining from my favorite things Ease His long path to Calvary?

No. I must do much more than that I must give - not give-up I must honor Him who saved me And drank that bitter cup

I must try to be more like Him Tune my ears to human cries Accept my fellowman with love And no longer criticize

Then when the dawn of Easter comes And the stone is rolled away May the empty tomb affirm my faith And be with me all my days



LIFE SKILLS LEARNED

Electric power has become such a necessity in our lives that many of us take this valuable discovery for granted. In the 4-H Electric project, young people are leaning project, young people are leaning project, young so this ever ready resource and the life skills associated with it.

According to Carl Broady, State 4-H Extension Specialist at Purdue University, members start off by learning about battery vs. wall based electric, how electricity makes things work, open vs. closed circuit and what are conductors and insulators.

Members can learn to make a circuit board, conduct an electric hazard hunt and learn about electric safety.

In the second division, 4-H'ers add to the basic knowledge acquired the first year. Members construct an extension cord or trouble light, learn more about conductors, practice the care and cleaning of electrical appliances, and learn about wire size and types of plugs.

With the basic skills achieved in the first two years, members move into more complicated areas. During the third year, members learn light bulb language and the various types of lights, how to make a lamp, and how to make portable lights. This division is designed for grade five and above.

In the fourth year of the Electric Project members learn about the basics of electric code, size of circuit needed for various items, what is grounding and what circuits need (Ground Fault Circuit Interrupters – GFCI). Members can also make sample wiring boards for exhibit.

The advanced division of the Electric Project is the most sophisticated and rewarding. By this level, the member has mastered the basics of electricity and learns more about heating and cooling, lighting, power, electronics, consumer buying and careers.

4-H members can also participate in the 4-H Electric Workshop, June 18 – 20 at Purdue University. At the workshop, youth get hands on experience with activities and computers to learn about electricity.

Statewide, the Electric Project continues to be popular with nearly 6200 youth in the project and 64 youth from Wells County participated in the Electric Project in 2003

Youth may become 4-H members when they enter third grade or become ten (10) years of age sometime during the calendar year (January 1 – December 31) and may continue their membership for a maximum of ten (10) years or through the calendar year they become nineteen (19), whichever comes first.

ARE YOU A GNASHER?

If you wake up with a headache or a painful jaw, schedule an appointment with the dentist to check for signs of excessive tooth grinding or clenching. As many as 23 million Americans grind or clench their teeth at night. This can also be a problem during the day (ex: stress at work). Aside from sore jaws, it can lead to eroded and shifting teeth and damaged gums. This damage requires dental attention. During a recent study nearly 25% of teeth gnashers examined needed dental work as a result of their nightly grinding. Once the damage is corrected, the dentist will likely recommend that the patient be fitter with a mouth quard that is worn at night or when severe gnashing occurs. This mouth guard helps reduce the risk of more damage being done to the teeth and gums. Also, loose teeth may be a sign of clenching or grinding. If you have this problem your dentist will be able to see evidence of it during your regular dental checkup. This is a good time to find out about night guards and other remedies.

CAREGIVERS TO BENEFIT

Physicians in Northeast Indiana are gaining increased awareness of the plight of family caregivers and learning about local services that can help alleviate caregiver burden. Aging and In-Home Services of Northeast Indiana (AIHS) is one of more than 200 area agencies on aging across the country participating in a national program that focuses attention on the reality that many caregivers ieopardize their own health when they care for their loved ones and provides a way for physicians to refer caregivers to support and

Because many caregivers do not identify themselves as such, physicians and their staff frequently interact with caregivers without knowing it. Caregivers often accompany an older relative to a doctor's appointment, or may see the doctor for their own health problems, which they mayor may

services in their community.

not associate with their caregiving responsibilities. By participating in Making the Link: Connecting Caregivers with Services through Physicians, physicians are able to identify their caregiving patients and refer them to helpful services provided by AIHS.

It is estimated that in 23 percent of households nationwide individuals are providing care for someone who is at least 50 years old and suffering from physical or mental limitations. Caregivers often need help for themselves. Research has shown that caregiving often results in increased stress, depression, illness, and even premature mortality. Yet caregiving experts report that physicians do not routinely recognize the stress that caregivers are under or provide them information that might be of help. Making the Link is designed to help remedy that situation.

"Caregivers give of themselves tirelessly to make life better for their loved ones, often at their own peril." said Diann Shappell. AIHS President. "With the help of our local physicians we hope to make life better for the caregivers as well " Shappell concluded.

Area Agencies on Aging across the country are increasingly providing services to caregivers as the result of the National Family Caregiver Support Program, enacted by Congress in 2000 as part of the Older Americans Act. Among the services available from AIHS are: Information about services; Assistance in gaining access to supportive services; Individual counseling, support groups and training to help caregivers


