JEFFERSON ALUMNI

The 75th Annual Jefferson Center High School Alumni Banquet will be held on Saturday May 5, 2001. CIVIL WAR GROUP

Men and boys interested in the heritage of the American Civil War are invited to join The Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War (SUVCW). The local camp is Champion Hill Camp - #17.

The SUVCW is the legal heir to the Grand Army of the Republic, which was made up of veterans of the Union armies and navy. In 1954 the SUVCW was recognized and granted a charter by Act of Congress.

The purpose of the SUVCW is to perpetuate the memory of the GAR and the men who saved the Union, 1861-i 865. The SUVCW wishes to assist in the preservation and research on documents and records pertaining to the GAR, cooperate in doing honor to all whom have patriotically served our country in any war, and teach patriotism and duties of citizenship.

Membership in the SUVCW is open to all male descendants of soldiers and sailors of the Civil War. Males who do not qualify for hereditary membership but have genuine interest in the history of the Civil War may join as associates.

Champion Hill Camp - #17 meets bi-monthly in the GAR room of the county courthouse in Huntington. It was formed in April of 2000 and chartered in August. The 38 members have been given the honor of holding many historical items owned by the Department of Indiana — SUVCW for care and display in the GAR room.

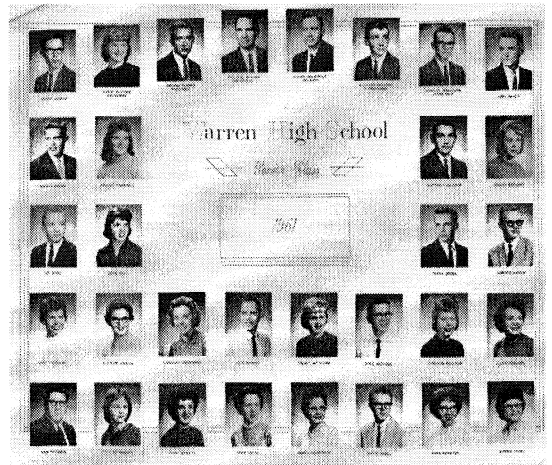
Broadway Babies is show-stopping Broadway tunes old and new featuring the regions top musical talent. The show is the Big Broadway Broadcast of 1944.

LETTER TO THE EDITOR:
 According to a draft report just published on EPA's web site, the risk of cancer from exposure to dioxin among individuals who consume large amounts of meat and dairy products may be 100 times higher than previously suspected. More than 36,000 cancer deaths per year, as well as developmental defects in children and altered hormone levels are attributed to such exposure.

One of the most potent chemical toxins known, dioxin is a waste product of paper pulp production and waste incineration. It enters the human food chain through consumption of meat and dairy products from animals eating contaminated forage and of fish in contaminated water ways.

First, came the warning about animal cholesterol and cardiovascular diseases, then the fast food industry and obesity epidemic, the "Mad Cow" disease, the "Foot and Mouth" disease, and now this. Is somebody trying to tell us something about our diet?

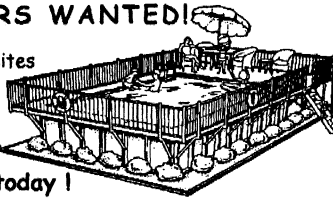
On the big day, let her observe you working at your own job, then let her go on to scheduled talks with others. Encourage her to take notes about requirements of various jobs.

VB COUNCIL NOTES

Following a lengthy executive meeting, the Van Buren Town Council held their regular meeting on Wednesday evening, April 18. President Tony Manry opened the meeting with all in attendance repeating the Pledge to the American flag.

Minutes of the regular meeting of April 4 were approved as submitted.

Council approved the purchase of three hand held radios for the Police Department at a cost of \$189.00 each and three microphones at a cost of \$49.00 each.

Council also approved the purchase of a complete package of software at a cost of \$2,250.00 for use in preparing the budget and annual report.

A citizen in attendance was concerned about a neighbor's dog which at times comes into a fenced in area of their yard. They reported the dog is not always chained up and when it comes into their yard poses a threat to their young children. Council suggested they try to contain the dog until officials get there.

Superintendent Jim Webb reported that due to heavy rainfall meters were read later this month.

Fire hydrants were being flushed and maintenance done. One meter had been changed.

Some work by Town Employees had been jeopardized due to weather conditions. Also, the Cable Company has failed to help locate their lines.

Some time ago it was reported a new manager was in charge of Cable. At that time it was indicated that everyone in Van Buren with Cable problems should report the problem and the matter would be taken care of. But thus far there has been no effort made to correct the problems.

Storm drain work was underway

on Jefferson Street.

May 5 has been designated as Town Clean-up Day in Van Buren.

It was suggested that owners of rental properties be advised if the renter does not keep the property clean.

The annual Community Service Award is to be made Aug. 5 at the Van Buren Legion. Local citizens are encouraged to submit local names for the award.

Council announced they had accepted a bid from Norman Noe for work on the South water tower.

Police officers were advised by Council to patrol an area where two dogs are reported to bark continuously at night. Officers were told to warn the owners that there is an Ordinance against barking dogs.

Both work on the water tower and the forthcoming water project are expected to get underway soon.

Council announced a decision to grant a bid by Liniger with alternates one and three for the water treatment plant. Work is expected to get underway as soon as contracts are signed.

The next Council meeting will be Wednesday, May 2.

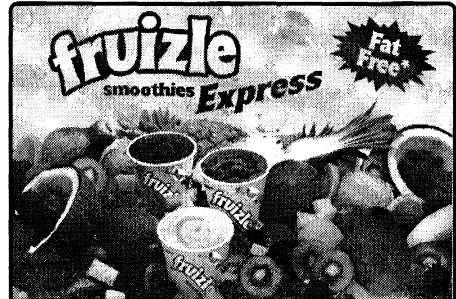

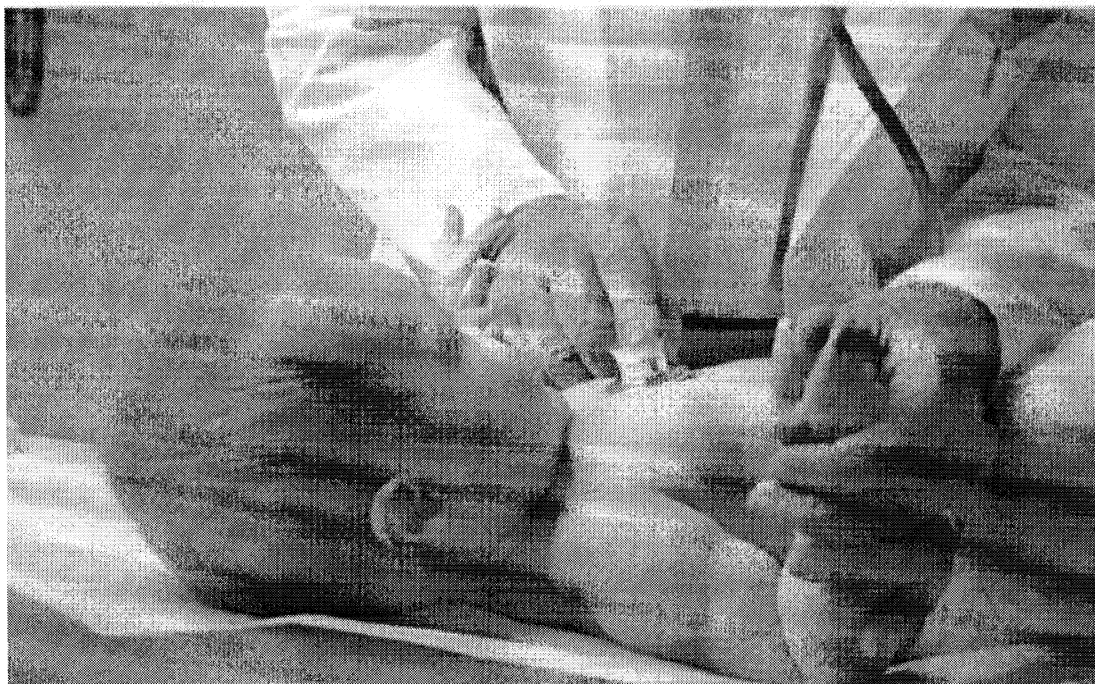
