


Some little children will actually tell you they have heard in the distance the high pitched "Ho, Ho, Ho's" of Santa's helpers. It is the season for miracles, so why not?

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Farmers Reminded To Check Corn in Storage

Grain quality specialists are reminding farmers to keep an eye on their recently harvested corn held in storage on their farms. There are basic grain storage principles including aeration and monitoring to follow every year no matter the moisture content of the shelled corn. Steps can be taken to minimize the chance of spoilage.

Many acres of corn were harvested this year when temperatures were 70 to 80 degrees Fahrenheit. There is a much greater risk that corn will spoil when placed in storage after harvesting at these higher than normal temperatures. According to Richard Stroshine and Matt Roberts from the Purdue Agricultural and Biological Engineering Department, corn at 16% moisture with a kernel temperature of 70 degrees can begin to spoil in approximately 30 days.

A producer might believe that he harvested his corn at 14% to 15% moisture. However, there may be pockets of stored grain at 16% moisture. Stroshine and Roberts have heard reports of grain already being out of condition as a result of improper aeration.

Therefore, they recommend moving air through grain bins to help cool the corn and move some of the moisture out of the wetter pockets. Cooling should then continue throughout the fall and into the winter as the outside air temperatures continue to drop. The length of time for adequate cooling to occur depends on the type of fan and the size of the bin. Ideally, the grain should be cooled in two to three cycles until the temperature of the grain is just above freezing.

Other recommended steps for producers include the following:

• "Core" the bins to level out the top of the grain mass by hauling loads out of the bin. Coring the bin removes the corn with higher fines that limits airflow.

 After aeration is completed for the year cover fans to prevent entrance of outside air and to keep out rodents and pets.

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• Observe the roof for any frost or current or past signs of condensation. Turning on the fans during this time will assist in detecting musty odors associated with spoilage.




