ibbon As many of you know our area has been hit hard by cancer. This service is a way to help those in need. A cancer patient has to ides rely on family and friends to get them to their appointments. Sometimes this means that the caregiver has to take time off work, unpaid, causing another hardship.

Ribbon Rides is a fund for helping those in the Warren, Van Buren and Liberty Center area who are dealing with Cancer. Volunteers will sign up to give cancer patients rides to their doctors appointments, chemotherapy and radiation treatments when needed and be given a nominal fee to cover gasoline for these trips. Patients will contact Ribbon Rides with their requests for a ride and to be matched up with a driver. Ribbon Rides will give that patient someone to call for a free ride. Drivers will pick the patient up, take them to and bring them home from their appointments.

On May 28th and 29th there will be a Ribbon Rides Relay at Tower park from noon on Saturday to 6 am Sunday.

Events in the planning stages include a Softball Tourney, Cornhole Tourney, Relay Walk, Carnival Games, t-shirts, food and much more! Funds from each of the events at the Relay will go towards the Ribbon Rides fund.

We are reaching out to the community to ask for your help. Clubs, businesses, 4-H groups, FFA groups, church youth groups - we need your help. We need you to set up and sponsor a carnival game or a fund-raising project for that weekend. Individuals - we would love to have you participate in the Relay. filling you in on our exciting trip to visit my brother and family. Also got to see nieces and nephews who I had not seen for quite a long time. It was quite a reunion.






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
