DEAR EDITOR

Breast cancer: Two of the scariest words a woman will ever hear. When I heard those words from my doctor in June of 2006, my world felt like it was about to come crashing down.

Without the support of my family and my faith, I don't think I would have been able to cope. I found hope for the future when I joined the American Cancer Society' Making Strides Against $Breast\,Cancer\,walk.\,\,I\,wanted\,to\,help\,raise\,awareness\,and\,funds\,to$ support the fight against breast cancer. I have met many breast cancer survivors in all stages of treatment, many of which have gone on to live long and fulfilling lives.

I have been cancer free for three years. When I talk to survivors that have been free of this disease for 15 and 20 years, it gives me hope that I too will have many more years ahead. That is why I feel so strongly about walking in Making Strides Against Breast Cancer

The chance of a woman developing invasive breast cancer at some time in her life is about 1 in 8 or 12 percent. In 2009, an estimated 192,370 women will be diagnosed with breast cancer and more than 40,000 will die from the disease. I feel very fortunate and blessed to be a survivor of this dreaded disease, and I walk because I have 3 daughters, a daughter-in-law, and 3 granddaughters. It is my greatest hope that they never have to hear the words "you have breast cancer."

On Saturday, October 3, 2009, I plan to walk beside my daughters, friends, colleagues, and fellow survivors at the Making Strides Against Breast Cancer walk at Headwaters Park East. I urge everyone in Northeast Indiana to join our community as we make strides toward a future where breast cancer is no longer a lifethreatening disease. Several years ago, a man 75 years of age was killed in an accident. His wife in her bereavement kept saying over and over again, "You know he was never sick a whole day in his life." However, when they performed an autopsy, they found he had hardening of the arteries, cirrhosis of the liver, a tubercular lung and a chronic kidney condition; any of which was so bad they could have killed him at a moments notice.

It is that magic word attitude again. It is the difference between the hypochondriac who feeds his fears while enjoying the meal and the person who says, "So I am a little sick...so I hurt a little...I'm walking aren't I?"

In 1915, Ty Cobb stole 96 bases. Seven years later, in 1922, Max Carey of the Pittsburg Pirates stole 51. Was then Ty Cobb almost

Purdue University **Huntington County Extension** Office will be offering a Dining With Diabetes Class beginning Monday, September 28 at 11:00 at Heritage Pointe in Warren. Dining with Diabetes is a two

for two hours for two weeks. Class dates are September 28, and October 5. The first hour is instructional with the second hour giving participants a chance to taste the simple, but tasty recipes. The class is open to those with diabetes, their family members and caretakers, and anyone who would like to learn more about healthy cooking. The classes cost \$25 per person and pre-registration is required. Scholarships for participants over the age of 60 are available. Please sign up for class by September 23.

You will learn how to prepare meals that are healthy, easy to prepare and taste good. Recipes will be demonstrated, and participants will have the opportunity to taste each one. Participants will also learn up to date information on nutrition, meal planning, exercise and how to understand common diabetic related medical tests. Recipes and handouts will be given to each participant.

Nov. 1935, the Sanitary Market, Floyd Turner proprietor, was robbed. \$214.50 in cash was taken by two unmasked men, shortly before 11:00 on a Saturday night. After emptying the cash register the men backed out of the store and ran to an automobile, whose motor was running and rode away. The last anyone saw them is when they turned on Second Street and headed for the rail road bridge.

When the two men entered the store, a man with a gun ordered Mr. Turner, his wife and clerks to the back of the store. The other man went to the cash register. At that time Mrs. Frank Minnich enter the store. The man on guard was standing so close to the door that he was shoved aside when she opened

the door. While this was happening Mr. Turner moved to the rear door, went out, and ran to the I.G.A. store to summon help. The clerks in the I.G.A. store was close to the front and was able to get the license number but the state police discovered the plates were stolen.

The men were seen at a number of places during the half hour before the robbery. They bought coffee at Bert Denton's eating stand. Edward Brown saw the gun the one man was carrying. Brown crossed the street to the filling station he and his brother owned and told his brother a holdup might be happening. The men were seen in the I.G.A. store and the Kroger store studying the situation and found the Sanitary best suited their purpose.

In Nov. 1937, James Dalhover was captured in an operation by the F.B.I. in Bangor, Maine. His companions in crime, Alford Brady and Clarence Shaeffer, were killed in the gun fight which occurred. State officer Robert Clevenger, son of Mr. and Mrs. Ty Clevenger of Warren, was a member of the state police guard, who guarded Dalhover during the trial. Mr. Clevenger had several opportunities to talk confidentially with the gangster during the trial. During one of

those talks Dalhover freely admitted his part in the Warren holdup and described in detail how the robbery was accomplished. Dalhover was on trial for the murder of a state policeman in a bank holdup in Goodland, Indiana.

Dalhover was allegedly the triggerman and said he was the one who stood by the door with the gun. Brady cleaned out the cash register and Shaeffer was keeping the motor running in the car. They were known as the Brady gang.

Oral health means more than just an attractive smile. Poor oral health and untreated oral diseases and conditions can have a significant impact on quality of life. And in many cases, the condition of the mouth mirrors the condition of the body as a whole. Recent reports indicate a relationship between periodontal (gum) disease and stroke, heart disease, and pre-term low-birth weight babies. Likewise, more than 90 percent of all systemic diseases have oral manifestations, meaning your dentist may be the first health care provider to diagnose the problem.

What problems can poor oral health cause?

According to the recently released Surgeon General's report on oral health in American, a large percentage of the population suffers from reduced quality of life due to oral and facial pain. This pain is largely due to infections of the gums that support the teeth and can lead to tooth loss. Some type of the periodontal disease or gingivitis affects more than 75 percent of the population.

Recent reports show that infections in the mouth can affect major organs. One example is bacterial endocarditis, a condition in which the lining of the heart and heart valves become inflamed. 






He hit 851 home runs during his magnificent career and was known as the Home Run King, but he struck out 1330 times. However, he didn't concentrate on his strike outs, only on his home runs. And so did his fans.

These athletes tried to learn from their failure. They did not back away from the challenges even if they offered more failure than successes. They lived with their eyes on the pluses rather than on the minutes.

Or, as Ben Franklin answered when asked why he came to the Constitutional Convention in Philadelphia when he could have stayed at home because of illness, "If I stayed at home I would just be sick and tired, so I decided to be sick and tired in Independence Hall."


