APPLICATION DEADLINE

Purdue Extension Master Gardener Basic Training is planned for Huntington and Wabash Counties for 2021. Classes will be on Thursday evenings from 6:00 p.m. to 9:00 p.m. - March 4 through June 3. The deadline for submitting applications is February 5. The location of the sessions will alternate between the Huntington County Fairgrounds and at the Wabash Heartland REMC Building. There will be a wide range of subjects covered in the training including soil and plant science, diagnosis of plant problems, pesticide safety, and culture of vegetable, flower, landscape, and fruit plants. Many possibilities for volunteer service exist for those willing to help teach others through their knowledge of taking the class. The assessment forms for business & farmer's personal property are due to the County Assessor's Office on May 17, 2021. This applies to Churches & Exempt Entities as well.

Farmer = Form 102 (State Form: 50006), and form 104 (State Form: 10068) Business/Exempt Entities = Form 103 short (State Form: 11274) or 103 long (State Form: 11405), and a form 104 (State Form: 10068)

The forms may be picked up in the County Assessor's Office Monday through Friday from 8-4:30. Blank forms can also be found on the county website www.huntington.in.us

through the Assessor's page or from the Department of

Local Government Website www.in.gov/dlgf/4971.htm.

All forms must be completed, signed, and mailed or dropped off to the County Assessor's Office on or before May 17, 2021. No extensions will be granted.

If you need assistance filling out these forms, someone from the County Assessor's Office will be available to help you. Questions, please call 260-358-4800.

The Assessor's Office will be OPEN, but per commissioner's request we are limiting access to our office. We ask that if you are able to mail or email your forms for this year, please do. If you would like to visit the Assessor's office, we ask that only one person be in our office at a time, as well as patience as we sanitize between each person. There will also be a drop box right outside the office for your convenience. Please wear a mask and if you have been sick or are not feeling well, be considerate of others and stay home. We are more than willing to email forms to you or to make other arrangements upon your request. No extensions will be granted. All forms are due 5/17/21.

ACCEPTING APPLICATIONS

Indiana Farm Bureau is now accepting applications for its student scholarship program for the 2021-2022 school year. Each year, INFB awards 13 scholarships to incoming or current college students who are pursuing a career in agriculture.

Farm Bureau offers one Marion Stackhouse Memorial Scholarship, two Collegiate Farm Bureau scholarships and 10 Carolyn Hegel Memorial scholarships, one winner from each INFB district. In addition, some districts also may provide individual scholarships. The scholarship money can be applied to tuition, housing, books and other educational expenses.

The Marion Stackhouse Memorial Scholarship is a \$1,000 scholarship named after the former INFB president, who served from

1976 to 1987. The Carolyn Hegel Memorial Scholarship is a \$1,000 scholarship named after the longtime INFB 2nd vice president, who served the organization for 26 years.

Applicants for the Marion Stackhouse Memorial Scholarship and the Carolyn Hegel Memorial Scholarship must be incoming or current college students pursuing a degree in agriculture and members of INFB.

For existing Collegiate Farm Bureau members, INFB awards two \$1,000 scholarships annually. Winners of these scholarships must be members of an INFB collegiate chapter at Purdue University, Vincennes University, Huntington University or Ancilla College.

"Indiana Farm Bureau is proud to support young men and women pursuing a career in agriculture through our annual scholarship program," said Isabella Chism, INFB's 2nd vice president and chair of the state's women's leadership committee. "It's a great honor to be able to award these scholarships each year. If you know a student who meets the criteria, please encourage them to apply."

To apply for a scholarship, visit INFB's scholarships and grants page. The deadline to apply is March 1. The application asks students to detail their educational successes and answer several

questions about their future educational and career goals.

The British meal included sausage, rashers (pork loin which resembled Canadian bacon), eggs, tomatoes (pronounced, toe-mah-choes), toast, juice, tea, and corn flakes. The small tomatoes were halved and grilled. In addition to the dining room, the guest house had a living room/lounge section and a small pub where the local residents gathered each evening to visit, sing, and imbibe.

Our planned destination for the remainder of the morning was to visit Windsor Castle. At the bus stop, our mistakable choice of transportation ended up being the one that stopped in every neighborhood before we reached the Uxbridge suburb. We changed buses there for one to Slough and then boarded the Windsor bus to finally reach the castle. I never felt that we were lost, but did begin to wonder where we might end up.

It was a very warm 88 degrees as we toured the Windsor Castle grounds, viewed the exquisite doll house and the State Apartments. A lunch of tuna salad sandwiches with cucumbers was consumed

across the street from the castle at the train station. No rain in London today. Seemed unusual, but welcomed!

Being quick learners but not fast on our feet, we took the faster-traveling train back into London proper rather than the snail-traveling bus.

We parted ways with the train at Paddington Station and boarded the "Tube" again for a short ride to Baker Station. Wanting to see as much of central London as possible during our abbreviated visit, we hopped on a red, double decker bus for a guided tour. The tall vehicle maneuvered past St. Paul's Cathedral, Tower of London, L 15,000,000 apartments for sale, Tower Bridge, London Bridge, Buckingham Palace, Hyde Park, Westminster Abbey, Sherlock Holmes' house, Baptismal location of Wm. Penn, and many private parks.

Another "Tube" took us to Westminster Station and onto a River Thames cruise. The boat was detained near London Bridge while the royal family boarded a yacht for Queen Mary's 90th birthday party. Returned to Fountain House for dinner and enjoyed the local accented voices in the pub. Leaving for Ireland tomorrow.

attire. By working from home, you can "dress down," reducing your clothing costs and dry-cleaning bills.

As you can see, it may be possible for you to save quite a bit of money by working from home. How can you use your savings to help meet your long-term financial goals, such as achieving a comfortable retirement?

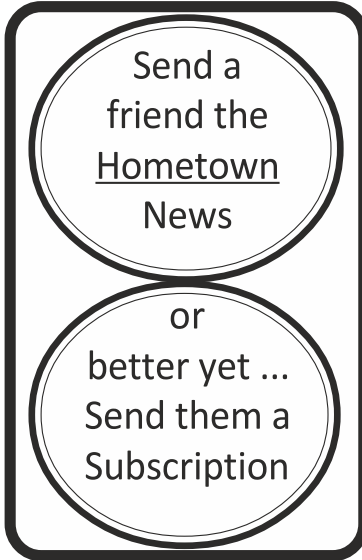
