Attorney General Steve Carter is alerting senior citizens to beware of a direct mail solicitation from the "CENSUS OF SENIOR CITIZENS" requesting that recipients fill out a survey and provide their credit card information for "donations". The mailing may trick seniors into thinking it comes from the U.S. Census Bureau but in reality the solicitation may be nothing more than a scam to obtain recipient's credit card information.

"This mailer is devious because some people may mistakenly

think it's an official survey from the federal government," Attorney General Steve Carter said. "Our senior population is particularly vulnerable to these types of solicitations because they take their civic duty seriously and might be less likely to question it."

The mailer purports to be from the "The Council of Seniors" and is titled, 2007 Census of Senior Citizens. It tells the recipient "vou have been selected as a representative of your voting district to take part in the official **CENSUS** OF **SENIOR** CITIZENS".

It claims that the survey "will make it crystal clear to our leaders in Washington what our priorities are" and "it's the best way to build a strong and united agenda that accurately represents the views of Senior Citizens across America.'

The "census" asks recipient's opinions on hot button issues such as health care, immigration. and taxes. It requests that they make a donation to "The Council of Seniors" by sending a check or providing their credit card number. It also asks for reimbursement for printing and mailing costs even if recipients choose not to participate.

"Seniors might think that by participating in the 'census' they will make an impact on national policies," Carter added. "In reality all they may be left with is a financial headache."

Senior citizens who would like to express their political opinions should contact their state and federal representatives directly.

EXTREME HEAT CARE

With the recent forecasts calling for more extreme heat in Indiana, state health officials offer hot weather tips to cope with the rising temperatures.

"Heat advisories should be taken very seriously," said State Health Commissioner Judy Monroe, M.D. "I encourage all Hoosiers to take the necessary precautions to protect themselves during these hot summer days."

To avoid heat related health problems, the Indiana State Department of Health recommends the following:

- Drink plenty of cool
- Avoid prolonged exposure to high temperature.
- Attempt to get in air conditioning, even for brief periods. If you do not have air conditioning, move to a location that is airconditioned.
- Fans are a source of relief when there is low humidity. Cool down with cool baths or showers.

- Wear loose-fitting, light colored clothing.
- Slow down from your normal pace.
- Avoid alcohol.
- Draw shades, blinds and curtains in rooms exposed to direct sunlight.

When temperatures reach 90 degrees (Fahrenheit) or greater, health officials caution that overexposure to the heat can be a concern. Young children and the elderly are at greater risk for such heat-related illnesses as heat stroke or heat exhaustion. Children should never be left in parked cars, even with windows cracked open.

Heat cramps are muscular pains in the abdomen, legs, and arms that occur from strenuous activity and increased sweating. Heat exhaustion can develop after several days of high temperatures and low fluid intake. Heat stroke, also known as sunstroke or hyperthermia, is a life-threatening situation in which the body is unable to regulate its temperature and cannot cool itself down.

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if I really needed them. Coats, hats mittens and boots were usually hand me downs.

Our books rarely was new as they traded with families back and forth. If a book had a page missing or a newer printing that was a bit different, no big deal you shared what was different with the person you sat next to. A Golden Rule tablet, pencil and crayons (16 colors) and a ruler was the supplies. Oh yes we had to take a small jar with a lid to put paste in that the teacher scooped out of a gallon jar she kept in her room. What new books we had were workbooks to supplement the text books. I can remember standing in line at Barnharts Book store in Huntington to get what was needed. Sometimes we came to Warren to, I think it was Rexall Drug store to get books. That was a big deal because we would then go to Ditzlers to get ice cream. The big cement ice cream cones guarding the door was something to see.

We did not have all the modern things the kids have today, but we were taught well and have a lot of happy memories of the 12 years spent in the Andrews School. The school is gone and a new one has replaced it, it was sad to see it torn down, the new one is nice and if it lasts 50 plus years like the old one it will have a lot of memories echoing the halls.

This past week at the market a couple asked about tomato preserves. I told them I would have some at the market next week. It is something you don't hear of much anymore. We had it at home and was pretty good on fresh baked bread or biscuits.

Here is the recipe I found in Moms 1927 Farmers Guide Cookbook. I am sure it is the one she used.

Tomato Preserves

2 pounds red or yellow tomatoes. 7 cups sugar 2 lemons sliced very thin 1/2 tsp salt, 1/2/ tsp whole cloves 1/2 tsp. whole allspice 1 stick cinnamon 1/4 tsp ground ginger. Scald and skin tomatoes, coarsley diced, cover with sugar and let set overnight. Next morning drain off the juice add lemon, salt and spices tied in a bag and bring to boil 10 minutes. Add tomatoes stir often to keep from sticking and cook till they are transparent and slightly thicken. Remove spice bag and pour in sterilized jars and seal. Makes about 3 half pints.

There was a note added if you didn't care for the spices it could be omitted and if using yellow pear tomatoes just cut them in half

Enjoy, this was not really my favorite but we ate it anyway.
