#### Nursing Program

The Indiana State Board of Nursing has approved Huntington University's application to begin offering a Bachelor of Science in Nursing degree program in the fall of 2007.

"Nursing will be a very strategic addition to our academic programs and will expand our ability to educate students to impact the world for Christ," said Dr. G. Blair Dowden, president of Huntinaton University.

This state approval process involved providing extensive evidence of the appropriateness of the curriculum, the faculty, the nursing director and resources to support the program.

"I want to congratulate Dr. Pat

Pierce, who authored our lengthy application to the State Board of Nursing and has worked tirelessly to lay the groundwork for our nursing program," Dowden said.

Pierce is the university's interim director of nursing. In January, Huntington announced that Margaret Winter had been hired as the director of the Department of Nursing.

Next, the university will seek professional accreditation for the new program from the Commission on Collegiate Nursing Education. CCNE is an independent accrediting agency recognized by the U.S. Secretary of Education as a national accreditation agency. CCNE assesses baccalaureate and graduate nursing programs.

Meanwhile, construction on the university's nursing facilities will be completed in the coming weeks. The program will be housed in the lower level of the state-of-the-art, 93,000 square foot Science Hall. Equipment and supplies will be moved in before classes begin in the fall.

equipment.

American agriculture is doing such an efficient job that each American farmer feeds about 144 people. U.S. consumers spend roughly 10 percent of their income on food, compared with 22 percent in the United Kingdom, 26 percent in Japan, 28 percent in South African and 51 percent in India. U.S. Farmers account for 46 percent of the world's sovbean production, 41 percent of the world's corn production, 20.5 percent of the world's cotton production and 13 percent of the world's wheat production.

#### GOOD FRIDAY SERVICE



#### FOREVER STAMP

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind. — A new Forever Stamp, shape-based pricing and a two-cent price increase for First-Class letters are some of the changes U.S. Postal Service customers will see beginning May 14, according to the Warren Postmaster.

The Forever Stamp will sell at the new 41 cent First-Class Mail one-ounce letter rate. The value on these stamps will always be the one-ounce letter rate and can be used for any future one-ounce letter mailing without extra postage.

"This new stamp is a consumer innovation that delivers convenience and value," said Warren Postmaster Stephanie Bauman. "It will help ease the transition for mailing letters when prices

change.

The Forever Stamp will be good at the current price for mailing a typical one-ounce First-Class letter—forever—regardless of future rate increases.

"We will have it on sale about a month before rates change to 41 cents," Bauman said.

The Forever Stamp will be available a number of different ways. These include sheets of 18 in Automated Teller Machines, booklets of 20 at usps.com, by calling 1-800-STAMP-24, through Post Office vending machines and Automated Postal Centers, and in Post Office lobbies nationwide.

The Postal Service will also continue to honor the people, places and events that have shaped our country through the highly popular commemorative stamp program.

The Forever Stamp should not impact this popular program, the Warren Postmaster added.

Customers can also purchase two-cent Navajo jewelry stamps now to use with their 39-cents when rates change.

The new prices also reflect differences in the costs of handling letters, large envelopes and packages. Mailers are encouraged to consider options available to reduce postage costs.

For example, if the contents of a First-Class large envelope are folded and placed in a letter-sized envelope, mailers can reduce postage by as much as 39 cents per piece.

Not all prices are going up either, Bauman said. For letters over one ounce, the new prices are actually lower than the current price.

For example, the cost to mail a 2-ounce wedding invitation is going from the current rate of 63 cents to 58 cents.

The cost for the Postal Service to operate, like any other business, continues to rise, according to AI Eakle, a spokesman for the Greater Indiana District of the U.S. Postal Service. The Postal Service receives no tax dollars for operations and relies solely on the sale of its products and services to cover all operating costs. This is the first increase to cover operational expenses since 2002.

"As one of the nation's largest transportation and delivery organizations," he said, "we're extremely sensitive to rising energy costs."

Also, like other businesses, the Postal Service has experienced significant growth in health benefit payments for its nearly 700,000 career employees.

#### **NEW KIDS EQUIPMENT**

Each of Parkview Huntington Hospital's five ambulances are now equipped with new equipment to help EMTs and paramedics respond to the emergency needs of children, thanks to the generosity of two local Kiwanis service clubs, Huntington Metro Kiwanis and Kiwanis of Huntington

The Kiwanis service clubs donated a total of \$1,950 to purchase five new pediatric bags and the medical equipment stored in each bag.

Inside each bright red bag are seven color-coded kits and a wide Broselow pediatric resuscitation measuring tape. The tape, which itself is color coded to correspond to the different color kits, is used to measure the child from the head down. Whichever color on the strip reaches the bottom of the child's foot determines the color of kit to use to treat the child. On each colored panel on the measuring tape, treatment information is provided that corresponds to the length and weight of the child.

"The color coding makes it easy for us to determine and access what we need," said Penny White, a paramedic for Parkview Huntington at its Warren, Ind., station.

Kiwanis International's Indiana District began the program three years ago, and local Kiwanians Jim and Rita Dinius, both members of Huntington Metro Kiwanis, were responsible for introducing the program to their club as well as Kiwanis of Huntington.

"As local Kiwanians, we are happy to help the children of Huntington County through this program," said Rita Dinius, secretary-treasurer for Huntington Metro Kiwanis.

"We are very grateful for the generosity of Huntington Metro Kiwanis and Kiwanis of Huntington," said Darlene Garrett, Parkview Huntington Hospital COO. "That these organizations care enough about the welfare of our children to make this substantial donation says volumes about the integrity of Huntington County's Kiwanis members."

# Turn Around, Don't Drown

March 19-23 is National Flood Awareness Week

The Indiana Department of Transportation (INDOT) is participating in National Flood Awareness Week by reminding motorists to "Turn Around, Don't Drown" when they encounter flooded roadways.

National Flood Awareness Week is March 19-23, 2007. This important annual campaign raises awareness about the serious dangers of flooding. Flash flooding is the leading cause of weather-related death in the United States, killing nearly 200 people a year. More than half of these deaths are vehicle-related.

Few motorists realize the serious dangers posed by just a few inches of water. Most cars can be swept away in 18-24 inches of moving water, and trucks and SUVs do not fare much better. Many people believe their 3,000-pound vehicle will remain in contact with the road surface when driving through flood waters, but

this isn't the case.

Once swept away, a vehicle will often roll to one side or flip over entirely. The driver and passengers will have only a few seconds to escape their vehicle. The few motorists that do escape are often swept away by flood waters, pinned against objects or overcome by hypothermia. Even the strongest swimmers do not fare well fully-clothed in swiftly flowing water.

Even roads you are familiar with can become deadly in an instant during flooding. The water may be much deeper than it appears because the road bed may be washed out. Drivers should be especially cautious of flooding at night, when it is harder to recognize flood dangers.

Most flood-related deaths can

be prevented with this simple advice: Turn Around, Don't Drown. Here are other important safety tips to remember during flooding:

· Never drive through flooded roadways

·Never drive around the barriers warning that a road is flooded

- · If your vehicle stalls in flood water, leave it immediately and get to higher ground. Water only two-feet deep can cause most vehicles to float away.
- During flooding, monitor the weather conditions with a radio or tune into your local news
- $\cdot \text{If flooding occurs, get to higher ground} \\$
- During a storm, resist the normal urge to rush home immediately; staying where you are is often the safest alternative. You won't know how bad things are until it's too late.
- Do not camp or park your vehicle along streams and washes.
- ·Be especially cautious at night when it is harder to recognize flood dangers.
