When Mike and Stacy Haggerty made the decision for Mike to leave his employment to start their own business, that vision entailed placing it in Warren, their Hometown.

The purchase and renovation of the historic original Warren Light Plant started he and Stacy on a path they might not have ever envisioned. Starting the proverbial shoestring with location on one side of town, the duo grew that vision and that effort into what was and is known as Heartland Aluminum on the other side of town, a complex of buildings. held at a projects meeting with Ben Adams, Engineer, Greg Guerrettaz, Financial Consultant, Lee Poulson, and Marilyn Morrison on June 15th.

Wayne Street Project – due to boring results, full reconstruction of Wayne Street from SR 5 to Eleventh Street must be done which adds up to \$400,000 to the project. The project must be bid by the end of July and Contract must be awarded by August 11 as the project has funding of \$1M from the **INDOT Community Crossings**

# **MERCURY REMAINS** PROHIBITED IN THE MAIL

INDIANA The Postal reminding Service is customers that metallic mercury and devices containing metallic mercury are always prohibited in the mail stream. This includes antique items such as thermometers, barometers blood pressure monitors and similar devices. However, compact fluorescent lamps, which contain small amounts of mercury in vapor form, are mailable domestically but not internationally.

Here's what you should do:

- 1. Review USPS Publication 52, Hazardous, Restricted, & Perishable Mail, to find out if your item is mailable.
- 2. Follow U.S. laws and U.S. Service Postal hazmat guidelines.
- 3. Ship items securely with required labels and markings. Customers can take their package to a Post Office location to make sure it is

Improper, undeclared, or prohibited hazmat (hazardous material) shipping can have serious consequences for everyone involved.

Full responsibility rests with the mailer to comply with all Service and Postal Postal Service laws and regulations in the mailing of hazardous material. Anyone who mails, or causes to be

mailed, a nonmailable or for packaged improperly hazardous material can be subject to legal penalties fines (i.e., and/or imprisonment), including but limited to, those specified in 18 U.S.C. The transport hazardous of materials prior to entry as U.S. Mail and after receipt from the Postal Service is subject Department Transportation regulations.

If a person knowingly mails items or materials that are dangerous or injurious to life, health, or property, they may face a civil penalty of at least \$250, but not more than \$100,000 per violation, the costs of any cleanup each associated with violation, and damages. They may also face criminal penalties.

The Postal Service is committed to the safety and security of its employees, its customers, and transportation networks and will remain vigilant in safeguarding the mail stream against any article that might pose a hazard to health, safety, property, or the environment.

Reminder: Effective July 9, USPS will require Electronic Indicators when shipping Hazardous Materials (HAZMAT) and Dangerous Goods (DG). Publication 52, Hazardous, Restricted, and Perishable Mail (Pub 52) will be revised to incorporate requirements mailers to use unique Service Type Codes (STCs) and extra service codes (ESCs) within the tracking barcodes and electronic data submission

package containing HAZMAT or DG.

# **STEM LICENSE ASSISTANCE OFFERED**

The Indiana Department of Education (IDOE) announced a partnership with the Education Service Centers of Indiana (ESCI) to strengthen Indiana's STEM teacher pipeline by helping fund coursework leading to full licensure.

The new partnership, called the Indiana STEM (I-STEM) Educator Expansion initiative, will fund tuition, books and material fees for both currently licensed teachers in non-STEM areas, as well as prospective teachers who are not licensed but hold a bachelor's degree, become licensed to teach a STEM subject.

"Building off the success of I-SEAL (special I-TELL education) and (English learner) initiatives, I-STEM will allow us to expand focus our strengthen our teacher pipeline in additional high-

shipments need areas, including science, technology, engineering and mathematics," said Dr. Katie Jenner, Indiana Secretary of Education. "In today's technology-driven world, it has never been more important for every Indiana student to have access to high-quality STEM instruction, and this starts with ensuring we have the very best and brightest educators in the classroom."

\* For prospective educators a \$1,000 enrollment stipend to help support childcare, licensure fees, books and other related expenses the participants may incur, a \$1,000 commitment stipend upon being hired in an Indiana school district in a STEM-related position, as well as an additional \$1,000 commitment stipend if hired in a rural district.




