June25 will mark 50 years since the beginning of the Korean War, one of the bloodiest and most bitterly fought wars of this century. An estimated 5 million people lost their lives in this war, including civilians, military people from U.S. and United Nations forces, and their wartime enemies from North Korea and China.

Today, we remember those who fought. If they survived, they are retired now and out of danger's way. Many of us remember the Korean War stories told to us by our fathers, grandfathers, aunts and uncles. We thank God that America fights no large-scale, active war today.

## RAISING UNSPOILED KIDS - TOUGH JOB IN GOOD TIMES

In an era of comparative affluence, how do you keep children from growing up to be self-centered and spoiled?

Here's the advice of psychologists on some common concerns:

What do you say when a child asks how much money you have, whether you are well off or rich? Be honest, says one Beverly Hills psychotherapist. Don't be afraid to say you are well off, but note that others in the neighborhood probably have more things than you do. Make an age-appropriate answer

How much allowance should children get? It depends on what the allowance is supposed to cover. A survey of affluent families by Cambridge Connection, Inc., a financial planning company, shows that more than 40 percent gave children allowances of between \$2 and \$10 a week. Many kids were required to do chores for their allowance, and older children with more expenses received a more appropriate amount. About 40 percent with children under age six gave no allowance

One recommended way to boost kids' incomes is to post various jobs and what you will pay to have them done. These should not include normal activities like making one's own bed or helping with dinner

All experts interviewed say older kids should get summer jobs, which

## COUNCIL NOTES

The Warren Town Council met on Monday evening, June 12 at the local Fire Station. In the absence of president, Chod Boxell, Harold Jones called the meeting to order at 6:30 p.m. with the Pledge to the American Flag.

Approval was given to the minutes of a regular meeting May 22. After some discussion, Council agreed to a survey of residents before a final decision is made for an additional stop sign at Salamonie Heights.

Quotes were not all in for water tower maintenance at Tower Park. It was learned that Warren is in the first filing of the AEP settlement agreement. A refund would be expected in 60 to 90 days.

Council agreed that in compliance with the local Code, properties in violation, and if grass is more than 12 inches high, town employees mow vacant, lots at a cost of \$100 to the owner, pending discussion with the Town Attorney.

Warren is scheduled to host W.H.A.R.M.M. on July 10. A cookout is scheduled to be held at Tower Park at 6 p.m.

Dumpsters are to be available at the City Barn for the clean-up day. It will be scheduled for July 15th if T&C Disposal has units available. A resident requested sanitation waiver due to a trash dumpster. Council granted the waiver.

## SUMMER WEATHER ADVICE

The National Weather Service has announced that many areas of the United States will continue to endure a prolonged HEAT WAVE this summer. To be better prepared during the hot weather -KNOW WHAT THESE TERMS

- \* Heat wave: More than 48 hours of high heat (90' F or higher) and high humidity (80% relative humidity) or higher are expected.
- Heat index: A number in degrees Fahrenheit that tells how hot it really feels with the heat and humidity. Exposure to full sunshine can increase the heat index by 15° Fahrenheit.
- Heat cramps: Heat cramps are muscular pains and spasms due to heavy exertion, They usually involve the abdominal muscles or legs. It is generally thought that the loss of water and salt from heavy sweating causes the cramps.
- Heat exhaustion: Heat exhaustion is less dangerous than heat stroke. It typically occurs when people exercise heavily or work in a warm, humid place when body fluids are lost through heavy sweating, mild loss causes blood flow to decrease in the vital organs, resulting in a form of shock. With heat exhaustion, sweat does not evaporate as it should, possibly because of high humidity or too many layers of clothing. As a result the body is not cooled prop-
- \* Heat stroke: Heat stroke is lifethreatening. The victim's temperature control system, which produces sweating to cool the body, stops working. The body temperature can rise so high that brain damage and death may result if the body is not cooled quickly.
- Sunstroke: Another term for heat stroke.
- DURING A HEAT WAVE...
- Slow down. Avoid strenuous activity. If you must do strenuous activity, do it during the coolest part of the day, which is usually

the morning between 4 a.m. and 7

- Stay indoors as much as possible. If air conditioning is not available, stay on the lowest floor out of the sunshine. Remember that electric fans do not cool, they just blow hot air around.
- Wear lightweight, light-colored clothing. Light colors will reflect away some of the sun's en-
- Drink plenty of water regularly and often. Your body needs water to keep cool.
- Drink plenty of fluids even if you do not feel thirsty.
- Water is the safest liquid to drink during heat emergencies. Avoid drinks with alcohol or caffeine in them. They can make you feel good briefly, but make the heat's effects on your body worse. This is especially true about beer, which actually dehydrates the body.
- \* Éat small meals and eat more often. Avoid foods that are high in protein which increase metabolic heat.
- \* Avoid using salt tablets unless directly told to do so by a physi-
- 3. SIGNALS OF HEAT EMER-**GENCIES**
- Heat exhaustion: Cool, moist, pale or flushed skin; heavy sweating; headache; nausea or vomiting; dizziness; and exhaustion. Body temperature will be near normal.
- Heat stroke: Hot, red skin: changes in consciousness, rapid, week pulse, and rapid, shallow breathing. Body temperature can be very high-sometimes as high as 105° F. If the person was sweating from heavy work or exercise, their skin may be wet; otherwise, it will feel dry.
- TREATMENT FOR HEAT EMERGENCIES.
- Heat cramps: Get the person to a cooler place and have him or her rest in a comfortable position. Lightly stretch the affected muscles and replenish fluids. Give a half glass of cool water every 15 minutes. Do not give liquids with alcohol or caffeine in them, as they can make conditions worse.

\* Heat exhaustion: Get the person out of the heat and into a cooler place. Remove or loosen tight clothing and apply cool, wet cloths, such as towels or sheets. If the person is conscious, give cool water to drink. Do not let them drink too quickly. Give a half glass of cool water every 15 minutes. Do not give liquids that contain alcohol or caffeine. Let the victim rest in a comfortable position, and watch carefully for changes in his or her condition.

Heat Stroke: Heat stroke is a life-threatening situation. Help is needed fast. Call 9-1-1 or your local emergency number. Move the person to a cooler place. Quickly cool the body. Immerse them in a cool bath, or wran wet sheets around the body and fan it. Watch for signals or breathing problems. It the victim refuses water, is vomiting, or there are changes in the level of consciousness, do not give him or her anything to eat or drink.

# CANNER TESTING

The garden is planted and now is the time to prepare for preserving the bounty. A pressure canner is used to preserve most fruits and vegetables. The dial gauge should be checked every two years, according to Beverly Morgan, Extension Educator in Consumer and Family Sciences. This is a free service by the Purdue Extension Service of Huntington County. The testing will be done from 9 a.m. to noon on June 27 and July 11. The Extension Office is located in Room 209 of the Courthouse. Bring the canner lid to the Extension Office the day before or early on the morning of

A dial gauge or weighted gauge is essential to control the pressure. The accuracy of the weighted dial is constant, unless damaged in some way or clogged with food particles. However a weighted gauge cannot be tested.

A dial gauge needs to be tested for accuracy. If the gauge is inaccurate more than two pounds, it should be replaced. Why take chances with the safety of the foods that you preserve for your family? Make certain that your pressure canner gauge is accu-

Now is also the time to check your canning equipment and supplies. Check the rubber gasket and the safety plug on the canner lid. If the rubber gasket has become stretched or brittle over the vears, it should be replaced. Be certain there is no dust, dirt, food particles, or oil around the safety plug or the pressure gauge.

The Huntington County Extension Office has numerous publications on canning and freezing. Be certain to use current recipes, in order to prevent food borne illness. Food preservation techniques were updated a few years ago. There are several reasons for the changes in canning procedures. One there are newer varieties (hybrids) with lower ph levels of some foods; and two there is newer technology about food preservation safety

These categories are eligible for State Fair competition. Two categories are county categories only. They are Sewing for Others/ Adult and Wearable Art. Friday, July 9 is also the entry deadline for the Open Class Adult Exhibits. There is a \$.50 entry fee for each exhibit. Any resident of Huntington County, age 18 and older may enter.
