In it was several pages of short stories, the editorial page the subject being "Keep it Safe But Make Your Money Work", lots of adds the Sisters page for women with health tips and gardening sewing patterns for 15 cents each and that was postage paid.

What a bargain. Also recipes and letters from subscribers of matters of the home. There was also an add to name a new model home on the market and winner got \$100. Also the ladies could sell dresses 3 for \$1.89 and make potential of \$35.00 a week.

Garden seeds could be purchased from Shumway, Burgess, and Burbank which are still in business today. Tomato seeds were 60 seeds for ten cents at Luther Burbanks.

For the guys BFGoodrich had tires for \$2.20 to \$3.50 and tubes less than a dollar.

AG DAY

Did you know that Huntington County ranks in the top 25% of all counties in Indiana for sales of agricultural products and

cropland acres? The most recent U.S. Census of Agriculture (2007) reports the total annual value of Huntington County ag products sold was \$122,410,000. This census report also shows that there are 184,951 cropland acres in the county.

Agriculture is important to our local economy. Many people are employed in farm or farm-related jobs, including production agriculture, farm inputs, processing and marketing and wholesale and retail sales.

The Huntington County Extension Office has coordinated an Ag Day event each spring for many years to educate third grade students about agriculture. Individuals who work in agriculture-related fields have volunteered their time and talents to make this program a success.

Huntington County Ag Day will be held at Hier's Park on Tuesday March 29. Third grade students from public, private, and home schools in Huntington County will participate in this event. The material presented incorporates academic standards to allow this educational program to be taught outside the traditional classroom. Approximately 40 volunteers will be assisting Purdue Extension Staff with teaching the students.

learning stations - seven involve animal agriculture and an additional seven stations focus on ag-related topics such as food safety. Teachers are provided a question for each topic in advance to help prepare the students. An example of a question asked is, "How many pigs are born in a litter?" An activity book is also provided to each child and businesses contribute educational items that are put in a student bag.

Note that there are many different ways in which rural communities celebrate Ag Day across the U.S. However, the intent of every county Ag Day is to recognize and celebrate the abundance provided by agriculture.

This event is open to any child in the Huntington County community; you do not have to be enrolled at Pathfinder Kids Kampus. Any child participating will need written permission from parents to participate in the vision screening. Consent forms are available at Pathfinder Kids Kampus and can be completed by parents the day of the screening. No appointments will be necessary. The cost of the photo vision screening is paid in full by the Lions Club of Huntington County. The program is sponsored by the

Indiana Lions Clubs, the Indiana Lions Eye and Tissue Transplant Bank, Inc. and the Indiana University Department of Ophthalmology under the supervision of pediatric ophthalmologist Daniel E. Neely M.D.

The first few years of a child's life are critical in the development of normal vision. A child with vision problems often does not know that the way they see the world is not the way everyone else sees it. Vision deficiencies in a child's eyes are not always obvious and it is estimated that 3-4 % of children may have occult vision loss from undetected amblyopia or what is commonly referred to as "lazy eye". If some problems are not detected early, a child's vision may deteriorate to the point of irreversible blindness. Other research indicates that 70-80% of what a child learns is visually acquired and there is evidence to suggest that children with undetected vision disorders are more likely to fail in school.

The vision screening provides a digital / photo measurement of each child's eyes from a

comfortable distance of three feet to determine the presence of possible eye disorders, and is approximately 85-90% effective in detecting significant factors that can cause a decrease in vision. Operation KidSight screeners use the PediaVision SO-8 screening system. The volunteer takes a digital measurement of the child's eyes from a comfortable distance of three to four feet. Pass/refer criteria for the screening system is set using guidelines established by the American Association of Pediatric Ophthalmology and Strabismus as modified by Dr. Neely. Photo screening is a vision screening device - it is not a diagnostic tool. It is part of a comprehensive vision care program including regular eye exams by an eye care professional.

Everyone is feeling the pinch of the rising fuel prices. Did you know that when you are FLYing you are saving money? I want to discuss some of these money saving habits we can help you establish.

Decluttering 15 minutes a day! How can this save you money; I know you are thinking this? The act of decluttering makes you more particular about what you buy and bring into your home. This amazing thing happens because you begin to love yourself and the way your home looks. You have to really need something to buy it! Shopping becomes something you do because you don't need a diversion from being at home feeling guilty about your clutter and all the stuff you buy because it is on sale. If you did not spend \$20 a week on more clutter then you would have saved \$1040 a year.

Picking out your clothes as part of your before bed routine! This simple action will give you more time in the morning so you can fix your breakfast and a cup of coffee before you head off to work. No more stopping for expensive drive thru breakfasts and designer coffees. You have to pleasure of a peaceful morning with your life under control along with your finances. If you spend \$5 a day on a drive thru breakfast and a coffee then you could have saved \$1300 in a year.

Planning your menus for next week and preparing a grocery list before you go shopping can help too. This keeps you from going to the grocery store multiple times each week. This alone can save you \$50 a week. There is hardly anyway to keep from spending less than that each time you go to the store. That is \$176 a week. WOW! Now that will buy you a tank a gas with some money for savings and something simple for you as a celebration!

FLYing makes good financial sense especially when the cost of gas is robbing us. We have been stealing from ourselves for a very long time with our

SHEness.
