This system is opt in. No one has the pay online!!!!

There are charges associated with paying online that will be posted and payment made in the office, by credit card, will also have a charge.

By November 1, payments will no longer be accepted by phone in the office, but, phone payments can be made online.

You can register into the system with name, account number, and email, even if you do not want to pay online.

The new system will allow newsletters, emergency notices, etc. to be sent through the email part of the system. Registering will also allow you access to your account for review or to check payments.

The system is secure and no one else can see your

information except for office personnel as usual.

While this has been a lengthy process to get to this point, we hope for some customers, this will be advantageous. All of us will be in learning mode for some time but, we will do our best to get answers for you if we cannot provide info.

The name of the system is Invoice Cloud. You will be able to access general information there.

### CAR SEAT SAFETY WEEK, SEPT 18-24

INDIANAPOLIS — Car crashes are a leading cause of death for children across the U.S. According to national data, an average of two kids under 13 were killed every day in collisions in 2020. Of the total fatalities that occurred, 42% were unrestrained. In Indiana, 20 children lost their

lives in passenger vehicle crashes that year.

Many times, injuries and deaths can be prevented with proper use of car seats, boosters and seat belts. When used and installed correctly, a car seat can reduce the risk of fatal injury by 71% for infants and by 54% for toddlers.

However, statistics show that nearly half (46%) of car seats are misused – leaving kids more vulnerable in a crash.

To address this, the Indiana Criminal Justice Institute (ICJI) is encouraging parents and caregivers to take time during Child Passenger Safety Week (Sept. 18-24) to make sure their child is properly secure in an appropriate car or booster seat.

"It's our job, as parents, to keep our kids as safe as possible when traveling," said Devon McDonald, ICJI Executive Director. "At minimum, this means being educated on car seat safety and making sure kids are buckled up correctly. If there's any doubt, get in touch with a certified professional as soon as possible."

With the amount of car seat choices on the market today, finding the right one can be challenging. Not all car seats fit in all vehicles, and there are important factors to take into consideration, such as

making sure the seat is age- and size-appropriate.

Parents and caregivers in need of assistance are encouraged to contact a certified Child Passenger Safety Technician. These individuals are specially trained in car seat installation, best practices and education, and offer support and guidance to motorists with children, free of charge. They can also register car seats and check for recalls.

Safety checks are available year-round on an appointment-only basis and typically take 20-30 minutes. Those visits can be conducted virtually or at one of Indiana's 100 fitting stations, which can be found by visiting: [on.in.gov/SafeKids](http://on.in.gov/SafeKids).

ICJI Traffic Safety Director Robert Duckworth, who was appointed to the National Child Passenger Safety Board earlier this year, recommends having an inspection done even if the car seat is thought to be installed correctly.

"It never hurts to get a second opinion or advice from an expert," Duckworth said. "Our technicians are highly trained, highly skilled and have years of experience, so even if you've done your research, you're guaranteed to walk away with some useful knowledge. That extra step could end up saving a life."

The National Highway Traffic Safety Administration provides a list of free, online resources to assist parents in finding the right seat for their child's age and size. The website also includes mistakes to avoid, with one of the most common being moving a child to the next seat or position too soon.

"Keeping kids in a car seat for as long as possible and in the back seat are two of the safest things parents can do, outside of never letting them ride unbuckled," McDonald said. "Even if it's a short distance, the consequences of that decision could be devastating."

Indiana law requires all occupants and children to be properly buckled in. For kids under the age of 8, that means riding in a correctly installed car or booster seat.

There's a common misconception that certain types of vehicles, such as a truck or SUV, may offer greater protection for child passengers. A bigger vehicle doesn't mean extra protection or that a child can ride unbuckled, according to ICJI.

It's also important, with colder weather around the corner, for parents to know that heavy coats can interfere with the proper harness fit on a child in a car seat. The best practice is to pick thin, warm layers and place blankets or coats around the child after the harness is snug and secure for extra warmth.

Parents should refer to their car seat manufacturer's instructions and vehicle owner's manual for installation assistance.

### A BUS TRIP TO CAPE COD DAY # 5, PART 1

We were up and ready for the complimentary breakfast by 7:20 am. The bus left at 8:30 for Nantucket Island. In the past, that location was known for its whaling industry. Now it is a major tourist attraction. Its summer population is 5,000-50,000, but only 500 hardy individuals stay during the winter months. We passed Old King's Coffee House before the bus turned towards Hyannis, MA.

Next in our sight was the Cape Cod Central Railroad Station. Where the railroad tracks cross the Cape Cod Canal, a vertical lift bridge was constructed in 1933-35. It spans 544 feet and is capable of lifting to 135 feet above the water for ships to pass under it. Counterweights are involved. The original Buzzards Bay Railroad Bridge of 1910 was only 160 feet long and pivoted with the help of a huge counterweight. On Cape Cod, street intersections join at various angles.

We boarded the Hi-Line High-Speed Ferry, nicknamed, the "Gray Lady" at the Hyannis port and set sail by 9:30. It was a catamaran vessel. The Kennedy Compound was on the right side of the boat. It rained during part of the one hour trip to Nantucket Island. Our boat's captain maneuvered the craft into Nantucket

Harbor where it docked at Straight Wharf. It gained its name because from the pier, Main Street led straight to the Pacific National Bank. The island, 30 miles south of Cape Cod, was first sighted in 1602 by Bartholomew Gosnold and settled in 1659. 95% of the island's trash is recycled. Nearly everything on the island is imported.

The tour group was divided into two sections with our portion assigned to the first sightseeing van ride around the island. It rained during part of the trip. Our group remained dry. The other individuals got wet while waiting their turn. It serves to be lucky sometimes. Nantucket was a famous whaling port. The Brant Point, Sankaty, and Great Point Lighthouses remain. Houses were limited to eleven different exterior colors with each having a distinctive, bright colored door. Many of them had lattice structures attached to the sides and continued onto the roofs for vines and flowers to climb. Why? Several buildings were outfitted with an upside-down horseshoe which was thought to be a sign of good luck.

We passed The Old Mill, which is the oldest functioning windmill operation in the US. The consistent wind currents power the grinding of corn into cornmeal and flour since 1746. It is operated now as a museum by the historical association. Our bus drove by the Quaker church & cemetery. Soon after 1700, the Quakers were the main denomination on the island. They chose to move from the Bay Colony to avoid persecution.

Overnight accommodations on the island are costly, so a day visit is economical. The median price for a home is \$

5,500,000. The lowest priced home would cost 1.5 million. I saw an Indiana license plate. Not everyone rides a bus. More Cape Cod later.

### MARKLE LOG HOME CROWDFUNDING

Lt. Gov. Suzanne Crouch and the Indiana Housing and Community Development Authority (IHCD) today launched a crowdfunding campaign to restore and revitalize a local historic site. If this crowdfunding campaign reaches its goal of raising \$24,000 by Oct. 29, 2022, the project led by the Markle Historical Society and their fiscal sponsor, Huntington Alert, will receive a matching grant as part of IHCD's CreatINg Places program.

"We are excited to help restore and preserve this historic Indiana landmark," Crouch said. "With help from our CreatINg Places program, the Markle Log Home will be transformed to a community space and public garden, right along the Wabash River. This home is a piece of Hoosier history, and I look forward to seeing how it is restored for future generations!"

In 2016, the Markle Log Home was uncovered and close to being lost forever. Since then, the Markle Historical Society has worked to save the home from demolition, restore the home, improve a town park and create a local heritage site. There is additional work to be done to make the building usable for the community, including cleaning and stripping the exterior logs, boring the home to deter pests and prevent rot, removal of deteriorating chinking and application of new chinking between the logs. Completing these tasks will ensure the log home is safely sealed and preserved.

"The Markle Historical Society has done an exceptional job of preserving their old pioneer cabin," said Paul Hayden, Director, Northeast Field Office of Indiana Landmarks. "This project is a community asset and the dollars invested in its restoration honors our past and ensures that this architectural treasure will survive for the benefit of generations to come."

The CreatINg Places program began in 2016. Projects have raised more than \$7 million in public funds and an additional \$5.8 million in matching IHCD funds. The program is available to projects located in Indiana communities. Non-profit entities (with 501c3 or 501c4 status) and local units of government are eligible to apply.

Eligible projects must have a minimum total development cost of \$10,000, where the recipient will receive \$5,000 in IHCD matching funds should it successfully raise \$5,000 through Patronicity. IHCD will provide matching grant funds up to \$50,000 per project.

### 5 STEPS EVERYONE
