The festival committee is enthusiastic about the addition of this addition to the festival itinerary. "We are convinced that this area of the festival will in spire members of the community to expand and develop their interests in the arts through a variety of mediums, said Brady Smekens, Festival Chair. These "make it, take it" sessions need to be pre-registered and pre-paid. This year's sessions include:

Basic Stained Glass Clinic - Location: Church of Christ 3rd and Wayne Streets, Downtown Warren Date: Friday, May 14 Times: 9-Noon and 1-4 pm Costs: \$35 Limited to 6 people per session

Learn the basis of building a stained glass suncatcher. Participants will learn handling and cutting the glass, assembly and finishing the project and will take the completed project home.

This glass clinic will feature the Tiffany method (copper foil) of stained glass fabrication.

Participants will have three design patterns from which to choose and will select the colors of glass for their suncatcher.

This clinic will involve cutting glass and use of a hot soldering iron.

Participants need to bring a pair of inexpensive cotton work type gloves, a small plastic film container or medicine bottle, eye protection and a shoe box or similar container.

GIRL SCOUT DAY CAMP

All Huntington County girls who are presently in grades Kindergarten through sixth grades are invited to attend the annual Girl Scout Day Camp which this year is being held from June 29 through July 2, 2004. The camp runs from 8:30 a.m. until 4:00 p.m. Tuesday through Friday except for third graders and above who may opt to spend the night on Thursday, July 1. Another exception is for Kindergartners who will only stay until 1 p.m. Tuesday through Thursday. On Friday, they will stay for the entire day to be able to participate in some special camp ending fun.

Those girls who are not registered Girl Scouts will have to pay an extra \$10 to cover the registration which will give them insurance protection and the right to earn two age level badges while participating in the camp program. This year's program will be enhanced by several community members who volunteer their time to share their particular expertise. Possible resource people include a librarian, archaeologist, naturalist, soil specialist, herbalist and gardener. Other camp activities include: swimming, crafts, nature activities, cookouts and campfires. Huntington County registered Girl Scouts should have received a flyer about the camp in last week's mail. The fiver includes all of the above information as well as the location and cost of the camp for each Day Camper, Overnighter and Daisy Girl Scout. It also explains that the fees include the cost of drinks, meals, snacks, craft materials as well as household, medical and program supplies. Most importantly, it includes a registration form on which to indicate a t-shirt size as well as more important information. All girls who get their registration in by June 1 will receive a especially designed Huntington Girl Scout Day Camp shirt. Those registering after June 1 will pay the same fee, but not get the t-shirt which needs to be ordered early. Non Girl Scouts can have a fiver mailed to them by calling the Camp Director, Sara Schnepp at 356-4356.

To make this camp successful

and safe, there is a need for many volunteers to help with various aspects of the program. To help encourage leaders and mothers of campers to help at camp, there will be a Tot lot available for their children who are preschoolers or boys up to the age often. Another reward for helping is a \$10 discount per volunteer family. To take advantage of this discount the parent must indicate her desire to help on the girl's application and have it turned in or mailed by June 1. If there are not enough volunteers by June 1, the camp will be cancelled.

Photographers Jamie Hahn and Summer Zimmer, both natives of Huntington, have spent the last several months capturing images of key historic landmarks throughout Huntington County to sell during the festival.

Hahn and Zimmer will join acclaimed watercolorist Sally Eckman-Roberts as Featured Artists for this year's event

Hahn and Zimmer will have a wide variety of photographic pieces available for sale in the Artist Market, Among them will be a diverse selection of notable buildings and landscapes from Huntington County.

The images will be available in a variety of mediums, including matted and framed pieces.

Eckman-Roberts, a native of Warren, will again sell her original and licensed work ranging from matted watercolor prints to dishes and other home interiors.

Jamie Hahn, a Huntington artist and photographer, set out to photograph rural Indiana with the idea of preserving our history for the future. In the last year, the artist has traveled around northern Indiana counties photographing the present landscape. The photographs portray scenes from the countryside and from the buildings of historical downtown dis-

Through a form of printing the images on unconventional surfaces, the artist has developed

images that represent our transitional landscape.

Currently, Hahn lives and works in Huntington, Indiana operating her business as a portrait and wedding photographer and as an artist. Her artwork is in galleries in Michigan, Ohio, Indiana and Georgia. After graduating from Huntington North high school in 1995, Hahn achieved a BA from Anderson University, Anderson, Indiana in 2000. Her two majors were art history and studio art with a focus in photography.

Originally from Huntington, Summer Zimmer graduated from Huntington College in 2002 and now lives in Winona Lake. She currently works as a freelance designer, while continuing to pursue her photographic work. She enjoys both color and black and white photography as well as alternative processes such as polaroid image transfers and hand coloring. Most of her recent photographic work focuses on the effects that light has on any image, how it affects the mood, accentuates form, and dramatizes the subject.

She hopes to create something dramatic or beautiful out of that which at first glance may seem too simple to require attention. Some of her images use light to explore value, form, and space, while others focus on the use of line and color. While many of her images involve the beauty of nature, her objective is to create a beautiful photograph rather than a photograph that is of a beautiful

A native of Warren, Sally Eckman-Roberts will return home as the Featured Artist for Festival of the Arts, where she will exhibit and sell her work in the Artist Market. Now a resident of Indianapolis, Sally's highly sought after originals are found in the permanent collections of many Fortune 500 companies and exclusive homes across the country. 



REACCREDITATION

The Commission on Cancer of the American College of Surgeons has granted approval to the cancer program at Bluffton Regional Medical Center. Approval by the Commission on Cancer is given only to those facilities that have voluntarily committed to provide the best in diagnosis and treatment of cancer and to undergo a rigorous evaluation process and a review of its performance

In order to maintain approval, facilities with approved cancer programs must undergo an onsite review every three years. Bluffton Regional's cancer program is supervised by Karol Poyser, a certified tumor registrar (CRT). Poyser is a member of the Indiana Cancer Registrars Association, as well as the National Cancer Registrars Association. She is currently vice president of the state association and has also served as both president and education chairman.

Established by the American College of Surgeons in 1932, the Commission on Cancer's Approvals Program sets standards for cancer programs and reviews programs to make sure they conform to those standards. Recognizing that cancer is a complex group of diseases, the program promotes consultation among surgeons, medical oncologists, radiation oncologists, diagnostic radiologists, pathologists and other canspecialists.

multidisciplinary cooperation results in improved patient care.

Receiving care at a Commission on Cancer approved cancer program ensures that a patient will have access to:

CT Upgrade

The upgrade allows the CT tubes to cool faster between scans. So, if a patient needs more than one scan, the entire process takes less time to complete.

Telerad System

Telerad enables x-ray techs to take an x-ray in the ER after hours, digitize it and sent it electronically to the radiologist on-call. The radiologist views the films immediately and e-mails the results back to the ER via a secure site, which allows for faster after-hours diagnosis.

Our New MR Suite

The MR Suite houses the latest in magnetic resonance imaging (MRI) technology, which not only performs routine procedures like brain and spine imaging, but also has the ability to perform advanced vascular applications. It was designed to be upgraded, so Bluffton Regional can continue to offer the latest in diagnostic services for years to come.


CardioRisk Enhancement

CardioRisk is a non-invasive cardiac screening that measures the amount of calcium (plaque) build-up in the coronary arteries. Following this CT scan, patients can now receive more detailed results. Rather than just receiving an overall score, patients receive a printout showing the score for each individual artery.

Major Renovation

The \$1.95 million renovation of two nursing units is the latest in a series of capital investments at Bluffton Regional. This renovation includes creation of a new intensive care unit (ICU) and skilled nursing unit. Skilled nursing is being relocated to the first floor, creating a more self-contained, inviting atmosphere that even includes an enclosed patio. The new area will also be more readily accessible to visitors.

The rendering below showcases the new state-of-the-art, seven-bed ICU. It will be designed with individual rooms that maximize privacy and glass doors that enable nursing staff to see each patient. This design, coupled with new telemetry equipment and other features, will enable staff to provide a new level of care in a private setting
