PANCAKE/SAUSAGE BOOTH

4-H officials are once again preparing for a busy week at the 4-H Pancake & Sausage Booth at this year's Bluffton Street Fair, September 17 – 21. In fact, this will be the 70th year for the popular and unique food stand.

This year the booth will be at the edge of the new completed Courthouse Plaza which will provide a much different view to fair visitors.

Through the years the menu has remained the same, buttermilk pancakes, locally grown whole hog sausage, and ham. More recent additions to the menu have included grilled cheese sandwiches and the sausage / ham sandwiches.

Proceeds from the booth help to sponsor award ribbons at next year's 4-H fair and send youth on educational trips such as 4-H Round-Up, 4-H Academy at Purdue, 4-H Camp and the 4-H Leadership Summit.

The Pancake Booth could not exist without the efforts of numerous 4-H parents, youth, and other volunteers who give of their time and talents to work in the booth.

COUNCIL MEETING

The Town Council of the Town of Warren met Monday, September 9, 2019 in a Regular Meeting at Assembly Hall, Council Meeting Room, 131 N. Wayne Street, in accordance with rules of Council and applicable law.

Those present were: Town Council, Steve Buzzard, Carrie Miller, Julia Glessner; Ethan Stivers(Absent); Clerk-Treasurer Marilyn Morrison; Employees, Lee Poulson, Dennis Spitler and others.

President Glessner announced the opening of the meeting at 5:00 and announced the opening of a scheduled public hearing on the 2020 Municipal Budget.

Following review of the budget and asking for public comment and hearing none, Glessner closed the public hearing. Consideration of adoption of the 2020 Municipal Budget is scheduled for the October 14th Regular Meeting of Council.

As scheduled, a submitted bid for demolition of residential buildings at 614 N. Nancy was opened from DIRT Inc in the amount of \$9928.00.

Glessner moved, seconded by Buzzard to accept the quote and to sign the Record of Hearing and Continuous Enforcement. The motion was approved unanimously.

In another matter, Miller moved, seconded by Buzzard to move forward with the demolition of building at 907 N. Main Street as the owner has not responded to any notifications. The motion was approved unanimously.

Poulson reported that he did not have a schedule for the work on INDOT replacement of handicap ramps at State Road intersections. Some cuts have been made in the corners downtown but no further work has been done.

Morrison reported that discussion is still being held with representatives of Golfo di Napoli Dairy regarding the disposal of Solid Waste and Sampling of the flow. The matter has been forwarded to the Town's Civil Engineer.

Morrison submitted Rate Reports for Water and Wastewater from Financial Solutions Group, the Town's financial consultant.

Recommended was that there be no increase in Wastewater Rate and a ten percent (10%) increase in the water rate. The average increase would be just over \$3 per month for residential users. Following discussion and review of the submitted data, by consensus, Council directed that the information be forwarded to the Municipal Attorney for an Ordinance to be prepared. At a September 16th Work Session of Council, a public hearing will be set and a review of the draft ordinance will be done with the Financial Consultant.

A representative from INDOT has requested a schedule of festivals for 2020 as SR 218 and SR 5 will be resurfaced in the Town in 2020.

Submitted for Council review was a bid package to request bids for the Collection of Trash and Rubbish within the Town as the present Contract expires in 2019. Opening of bids was scheduled for November Council Meeting.

A service contract with CINTAS was not approved pending receipt of further information.

Morrison reported that Auditors from the Indiana State Board of Accounts had begun an audit of the past four years of Town records.

Submitted to Council and reviewed were the August Financial Reports. Also submitted for Council review were the current Employee Wage and Benefit schedules in preparation for the 2020 schedules.

Marshal Spitler submitted the July Activity Report and reported that the local Veterinarian had agreed to provide discounted service to reduce the feral cat population. The charge would be \$50 per male and \$75 per female. The report

was taken under consideration.

Fire Chief Poulson submitted the August Monthly Report. Both pumpers are scheduled for pump testing in October.

Poulson, as Utility Manager, submitted the August Monthly report. Testing on the newly installed water main on Third Street has been completed including pressure testing and IDEM required testing. Laterals will now be installed to users in the area. Poulson reported that he had not heard anything from VTF in regard to replacement of the seeding on Eleventh Street. The company has until the end of September to act or retainage being held will be used to complete the landscaping. While two bids have been submitted for inspection of Electric Utility Poles, consideration was delayed pending a bid to be submitted within the week. The Pole Replacement Project should be underway within the month and includes entrance poles into the Town. Poulson continues

to solicit bids for replacement of the large pavilion at Tower Park.

The next Regular scheduled meeting of Town Council is October 14th.

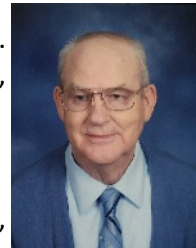

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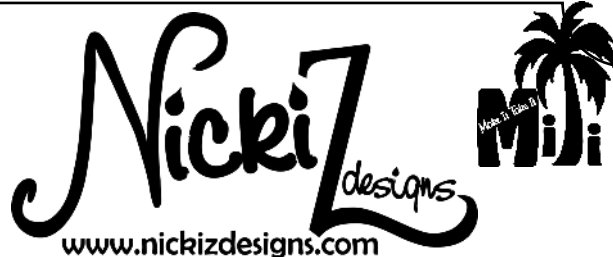

A TRIP TO RHODE ISLAND

Our day began with breakfast at the hotel overlooking Newport Bay which had too many boats docked or moored to be counted.

The guide started his dialogue by saying that Newport was founded in 1639 and that very poor Irish soon followed, but then flourished.

The area is still about 25% Irish. His first story was about an early Irish police captain who started to write his very first report about a horse that died on Wellington Avenue. He couldn't spell that

street name so he dragged the horse over to Lee Street!

Andy announced that in 1720, more Quakers lived in Newport than in Philadelphia. Also, 75% of Portuguese descendants still live within 75 miles of this area currently.

Our main attraction this morning was a tour of the "Breakers Mansion." It was built by Cornelius Vanderbilt who made his fortune in the banking business.

Of course the very large home, with its gilded(glitter) furnishings and beautiful lawn, overlooked the Atlantic Ocean. It was opened to the public in 1931. The word, gilded was coined by Mark Twain.

TV personality, Anderson Cooper's mother, Gloria was the daughter of Reggie Vanderbilt. He was a son of Cornelius. A genealogy insert. The news reported that Gloria, who lived in Manhattan, passed away today at age 95.

Other information dispensed by the tour guide included: John Kennedy married Jaqueline here in 1953, her childhood home; the reception was held at the Hammersmith Mansion; John Brown, founder of Brown University, had a home here, it is now the NY Yacht Club; Robert Redford spent a summer here; Jay Leno and Judge Judy have homes here; President Eisenhower had a summer home and played golf here; Tiger Woods won his first amateur golf tourney here; the Belmont Horse Race Track owner had a home here, he bred "Man-O-War" here but sold him; J.P. Morgan's cousin had a yacht club here - he was the sole member.

The phrase, "Keeping Up With The Joneses" originated in Newport, appropriately!

The heir to the Campbell Soup Company has an endangered animal sanctuary in this area. And the movie, "The Great Gatsby" was filmed here.

After lunch, some travelers toured the "Rosecliff Mansion" where the movie, "High Society" was filmed. During the Revolutionary War, the president of Ireland hid out in Newport. There was a price on his head. Nearby Fort Adams was not fired upon during that war nor did it fire its cannons. The British knew that the Fort's, 18 pound cannon balls could sail all the way across the bay to Jamestown! The last naval battle of WW II was fought offshore here.

In the evening, our tour group was treated to a cruise on Newport Harbor and Narragansett Bay. We passed Ted Turner's yacht; another was the "Columbia"-the 1958 American Cup winner, and the "Intrepid"-the 1969/70 American Cup winner. Also present was a recently moored 5-level, \$80 Million, "Scout" yacht from Europe. We were really close to the "Rich and Famous!"

Two interesting notes presented by our local guide were that the Rose Island Lighthouse is available for rental at \$2,100 per week.
