The Town Council of the Town of Warren met Monday, John Woodmansee, Purdue September 9, 2019 in a Regular Meeting at Assembly Hall, Council Meeting Room, 131 N. Wayne Street, in basics of selecting, accordance with rules of Council and applicable law.

Following review of the budget and asking for public comment and hearing none, Glessner closed the public Consideration of hearing. adoption the 2020 of Budget Municipal scheduled for the October 14th Regular Meeting of Council.

As scheduled, a submitted for demolition residential buildings at 614 N. Nancy was opened from DIRT Inc in the amount of \$9928.00. Glessner moved, seconded by Buzzard to accept the quote and to sign the Record of Hearing and Continuous Enforcement. The motion was approved unanimously.

In another matter, Miller moved, seconded by Buzzard to move forward with the demolition of building at 907 N. Main Street as the owner has not responded to any notifications. The motion was approved unanimously.

Poulson reported that he did not have a schedule for work on INDOT the replacement of handicap ramps at State Road intersections. Some cuts have been made in the corners downtown but no further work has been done.

Morrison reported that discussion is still being held with representatives of Golfo di Napoli Dairy regarding the disposal of Solid Waste and Sampling of the flow. The matter has been forwarded to the Town's Civil Engineer.

Morrison submitted Rate Reports for Water and Wastewater from Financial Solutions Group, the Town's financial consultant.

Recommended was that there be no increase in Wastewater Rate and a ten percent (10%) increase in the water rate. The average increase would be just over \$3 per month for residential users. Following discussion and review of the submitted data, by consensus, Council directed that the information forwarded to the Municipal Attorney for an Ordinance to be prepared. At a September 16th Work Session of Council, a public hearing will be set and a review of the draft ordinance will be done with the Financial Consultant.

A representative from INDOT has requested a schedule of festivals for 2020 as SR 218 and SR 5 will be resurfaced in the Town in 2020.



During the Revolutionary War, the president of Ireland hid out in Newport. There was a price on his head. Nearby Fort Adams was not fired upon during that war nor did it fire its cannons. The British knew that the Fort's, 18 pound cannon balls could sail all the way across the bay to Jamestown! The last naval battle of WW II was fought offshore here.

In the evening, our tour group Newport Harbor and Narragansett Bay. We passed Ted Turner's another yacht; was 'Columbia"-the 1958 American Cup winner, and the "Intrepid"the 1969/'70 American winner. Also present was a recently moored 5-level, \$80 Million, "Scout" vacht from Europe. We were really close to the "Rich and Famous!"

Two interesting notes presented by our local guide were that the Rose Island Lighthouse is available for rental at \$2,100 per week. However, there are duties such as switching the light ON & OFF, ON & OFF all night!! Actually, it is automated so you can get a full night's sleep, unless a misguided ship tumbles on shore arrives! His other statement was a joke: If someone from Tennessee moves to Newport, they always want to name their home, Chateau Noo
