EVEN "SINGLES" NEED ESTATE PLANS

If you don't have a spouse or children, you might think you don't need to do much estate planning. But if you have any assets, any familial connections, any interest in supporting charitable groups – not to mention a desire to control your own future – you do need to establish an estate plan.

In evaluating your needs for this type of planning, let's start with what might happen if you die intestate – that is, without a last will and testament. In this scenario, your assets will likely have to go through the probate process, which means they'll be distributed by the court according to your state's intestate succession laws, essentially without regard to your wishes. Even if you don't have children yourself, you may have nephews or nieces, or even children of cousins or friends, to whom you would like to leave some of your assets, which can include not just money but also cars, collectibles, family memorabilia and so on. But if everything you own goes through probate, there's no guarantee that these individuals will end up with what you wanted them to have.

If you want to leave something to family members or close friends, you will need to indicate this in your last will and testament or other estate planning documents. But you also may want to provide support to one or more charitable organizations. Of course, you can simply name these charities in your will, but there may be options that could provide you with more benefits.

One such possibility is a charitable remainder trust. Under this arrangement, you'd transfer appreciated assets – such as stocks, mutual funds or other securities – into an irrevocable trust. The trustee, whom you've named – in fact, you could serve as trustee yourself – can then sell the assets at full market value, avoiding the capital gains taxes you'd have to pay if you sold them yourself, outside a trust. Plus, if you itemize, you may be able to claim a charitable deduction on your taxes. With the proceeds, the trust can purchase income-producing assets and provide you with an income stream for the rest of your life. Upon your death, the remaining trust assets will go to the charities you've named.

Aside from family members and charitable groups, there's a third entity that's central to your estate plans: yourself. Everyone should make arrangements to protect their interests, but, in the absence of an immediate family, you need to be especially vigilant about your financial and health care decisions. And that's why, as part of your estate planning, you may want to include these two documents: durable power of attorney and a health care proxy.

A durable power of attorney lets you name someone to manage your finances should you become incapacitated. This

We hope to see you at these two events sponsored by the Warren Sportsman's Club.

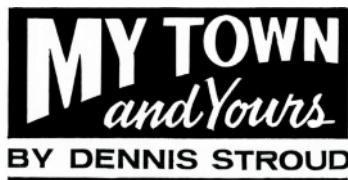

SCHOOLS 3

There was an available cabin on the farm which Lewis W. Purviance had bought, and this was selected for school purposes. The exact location of this cabin is not known, but it was down the river from where Warren now stands. If there were any way of finding where it stood, the spot should be marked, for it was there that the first school ever held in Huntington County. John McGrew was the teacher. Not much has been recorded about Mr. McGrew or the old cabin. It was likely that the school was held in the fall of 1834, although there is no sure record to verify this.

David C. Little taught at the second school in one of Samuel Jones cabins donated for that purpose. The next school is that of 1840, held in a building erected especially for that purpose near the "Mounds." These were

mounds which had been left by Indians of the mound builders. These were located between Mitchell Cemetery and the highway. They have since disappeared, having been leveled off to make it easier cultivation of the fields. It is known that an Indian camp had been in that vicinity. From 1840 to the present, it has been possible to trace the schools with some degree of certainty, but before that date, for about six years, not much is known about the ones taught by McGrew and Little.

This first solid ground in the history of schools in Salamonie Township was in 1842 when Fleming Mitchell wrote in the minute book the minutes of the first meeting of the schools' trustees. He wrote the following. John Dillon, William Crum and Fleming Mitchell, being appointed school trustees for township 26 north range 10 east, being legally sworn into office, we met on the 23rd day of April, 1842 and proceeded to divide the said township into districts three miles square commencing at

the northeast corner of said township.

A TRIP TO ALBERTA & BRITISH COLUMBIA DAY 5

We were hardly awake yet upon leaving Valemount, B.C. Jasper, Alberta was our day's destination. Highway # 5 quickly dead-ended at the junction of the east-west National Canadian Highway # 16 near Tete Jaune Cache, B.C.

This latter roadway either starts or ends at Prince Rupert, B.C., which is located on an island next to Chatham Sound near the southern tip

of Alaska and adjacent to the Pacific Ocean. There will be a geography test! This transcontinental Highway # 16 serpentine through Terrence and Prince George, B.C. as well as Jasper and Edmonton, Alberta and into Saskatchewan Province. It finally reaches Montreal.

But back to today's journey. The small town of Tete Jaune Cache was located on the southern bank of the Fraser River whose watery origin is in Mount Robson Province Park and nestled near the Continental Divide.

However, I again leave the story and go on an informative tangent. Fraser River flows north alongside the "Yellowhead Highway" (# 16) for 200 miles before finally turning directly south and passing through Prince George (the town) and Williams Lake communities.

Our vehicle stopped at different intervals along the Fraser River as we slowly made our way towards Jasper. The result of the stoppages was memorable. We experienced continuous, near-deafening, turbulent, turquoise-colored water currents crashing against and over large boulders lodged in the river bed. The sounds mimicked the noise that echoes from a gigantic waterfall. The unusual pigmentation of the water was due to moraine (muh-rayn), which is sediment scraped from mountain walls by receding glaciers.

At a distance to the north of the highway in this location was Mount Robson rising above the terrain. This solid piece of granite was a whopping 12,972 feet in height and the tallest mountain in the Canadian Rockies.

Since we were out of peanut butter sandwiches, the thought of reaching Jasper for lunch was foremost on our minds. Our rented automobile navigated Yellowhead Pass, elevation: 3,760 feet, at the Continental Divide. And then Jasper, Alberta was discovered. We had arrived at our two night destination. Our reservations for sleeping space were made in a private home.

After lunch, exploration of the town was imperative. Also my wife had not had much of an opportunity to satisfy her avocation to shop for several days, due to our traveling schedule. She took full advantage of the slow down and practiced her penchant. A few small purchases occurred, keeping in mind that they had to be packed in a suitcase for a later, air trip return to the USA.

After dinner was consumed, two tired adventurers turned in for the night.

CRISP RIDE
A total of six Indiana state park properties will take part in the Charity Ride Indiana State Parks (CRISP) on June 26. Motorcycle riders can pick one of seven volunteer-led routes between Hardy Lake and Charlestown, Spring Mill, Versailles, Clifty Falls, and Whitewater Memorial state parks, or choose their own route.

Hardy Lake is having an all-you-can-eat breakfast buffet from 7 a.m. to 10 a.m. Versailles is having a 50/50 poker run just after the breakfast. Clifty Falls and Spring Mill state parks will have 10 percent off lunch specials at their restaurants for riders. Charlestown will have a vintage motorcycle skills challenge among other activities.

Cost of the ride is \$40 per rider and \$35 per passenger through June 21 and \$42 per rider and \$37 per passenger after that date. The price includes Hardy Lake's breakfast buffet, the lunch discounts, and the poker run. The ride is sponsored by the Friends groups at each state park and proceeds will benefit park projects. connected to care and loved ones, many low-income older adults were left behind by the sudden need to understand and access technology and internet services.

However, among those who could stand to benefit the most from these services are 22 million older adults (ages 65 and above) in the United States who don't have broadband access at home. What's more, older adults (ages 62 and above) with an income below \$25,000 are 10 times more likely to be offline at home. Many older adults lack the technological literacy needed to leverage digital resources for health and social support.

New efforts are helping to address these inequities. CITRIS Health, an organization dedicated to advancing the well-being of older adults and family caregivers with enabling technology, recently launched "Lighthouse for Older Adults." This project is offering one-on-one training, in-language support and peer-based technical support to equip older adult residents of affordable housing communities with high-speed broadband access, user-friendly devices and digital literacy training.

Following an initial pilot, participants reported both an increase in device usage as well as confidence in using their

devices. Technology helped to connect them to loved ones they were isolated from, and improved their overall health and wellbeing by reducing social isolation and loneliness.

When asked about their favorite part of using a Google device, one participant stated, "Being able to connect visually with family and friends. And visually means a lot."

Those at the helm of the project say they hope its success will serve as a model for other such programs.

"Older adults have so much to gain from the connections and health care opportunities available with internet access and a basic understanding of technology," says CITRIS Health director and Lighthouse project lead David Lindeman. "We're eager to see this program replicated to improve equity in telehealth."

The COVID-19 pandemic has made it clear that technology literacy and access are more crucial for older adults than ever before. When it comes to improving the health and wellbeing of communities, addressing this gap is essential.

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
