

The past week has been busy and have hardly thought of the holiday coming. So it is time I get my thinking cap on and get more organized. We are celebrating

the holiday at our home and will be anxious to have all the family home except for our grandson in Texas. We will surely miss him.

At our gathering I also pass out the "Black Friday " dollars to everyone to do their own shopping. As I have probably said last year I give each the same amount of cash and they shop for themselves and bring it home for Christmas so Wayne and I can see what we have bought. It works really well since Mom and Grandma (being the same person) does not like to shop. I go to the bank convert some cash and walk out with shopping all done. Most of all the kids have a good time spending the money.

Our Thanksgiving dinner I just need to furnish the dressing and cranberry salad and of course the place to gather, so I luck out again. We have great kids and are also great cooks. Thank you! VB COUNCIL NEWS

November meetings of the VanBurenTownCouncilwere heldNovember9and17. Both meetings were held in the Council Room at Town Hall with President Tony Manry conducting the meetings.

Ken Eckerle, Grant County Economic Growth Councilwas in attendance at the November 16 meeting. He submitted Resolution 2-2011 to allow tax abatement for Modern Machine and Tool of Van Buren. Les Korporal, owner of the firm, was also in attendance and announced plans to expand the business.

Council had received two sealed bids for trash pick-up in Van Buren for 2012. The bids were from Wabash Valley and A&A Disposal. Council will study the bids and announce their decision later.

Officer Pat Collins presented the Police report. At the November 9 meeting he said there had been more kids in town than normal on Halloween night. No incidents were reported at that time.

Superintendent Jim Webb gave an update on Ordinance Violations.

Royal Lunch


On one of the last beautiful autumn days in November the **Real Elegant Dames traveled** to the stately Hostess House in Marion, IN for a lunch that made us feel like royalty. We $we reascort ed to a room of \ our$ own overlooking the outside patio and yard. After lunch we toured the rest of the mansion and also did some shopping in the gift shop. What more could Real Elegant Dames, Cris Lee, Mary Palmer, Freddie Couch, Kitty Throop, Marian Hoffman, Joyce Shepherd and Becky Parker ask for. Good food, a beautiful place to enjoy it and most of all being with friends. Perfect!



In the spring of 1888, a new structure was finished and it was called the Contesse Building. This building was located from the north end of the Pharmacy Building to 3rd Street. In one of the rooms a newly painted sign was hung over the door and it bore the inscription, W. D. Bonifield M. D., Physician and Surgeon. The young doctor had been attracted to Warren because there were only three doctors intown, Dr. John S. Sprowl, Dr. Elbridge Palmer and Dr. Mackay. During the preceding winter, there had been a great deal of sickness in the vicinity and it looked like a promising field to the young doctor.

On the first of April, 1888 there were three doctors, but by the next spring there were eight experienced practitioners. For many months it was tough going, but he had the grit to stick it out until patients began to multiply and things began to look better. Perhaps the most important reason he stayed was the young lady who was employed at the Larrimer and Huffman general store. Her name was Emma McClure and she became his bride October 28, 1891.

Dr. Bonifield doctored well over fifty years and was associated in practice with his

A farmer panel will follow these presenters to discuss experiences with growing cover crops. There has been an increasing trend of producers planting cover crops in the area due to the many benefits of including them in a croprotation. The Huntington County and Wells County SWCD held a field day in September in the Warren area to show the growing cover crops and to educate growers on proper management techniques.

The public is invited to attend the upcomingworkshop. Note that the program has been approved for private pesticide applicator recertification credit (PARP). A \$10 fee is required for those who wish to obtain PARP credit for attending the program. Attendees who wish to obtain credit are reminded to bring their Indiana Private Pesticide Applicator license number with them. Those applicators who have already renewed their license in 2011 (2016 expiration year) will NOT receive credit for attending this program.
