The Hillcrest Church of the Nazarene invites you to help welcome Rev. Keen and his family.

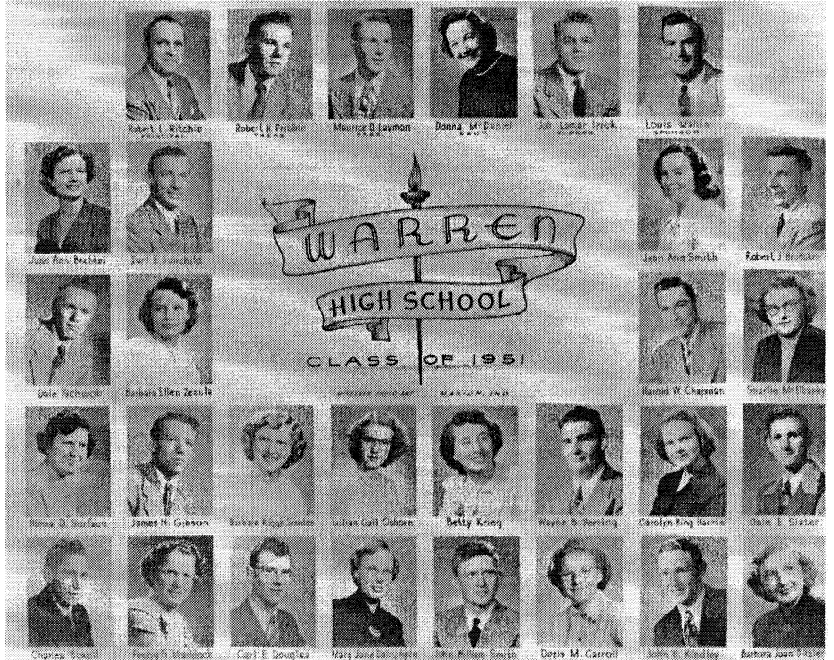

EASTER IN AMERICA, A CELEBRATION OF LIFE

Now comes Easter in the beautiful season of spring. Celebrated by all, it has come down to us as a melding of traditions, customs, religious observances, and unique events.

From the views of sun-rise and the Resurrection, to Easter lilies and colored eggs, its symbol-ism is virtually unrivaled in the calendar year.

VB TOWN COUNCIL

A number of people were in attendance at the April 4 meeting of the Van Buren Town Council. President Tony Manry opened the meeting at 7 p.m. and all in attendance repeated the Pledge to the American flag.

Minutes of the previous meeting were approved as submitted.

Council received a new quote for pagers for the Fire Department. Council agreed to pay their share in the amount of \$4767.60.

The International truck owned by the Fire Department was reported to now be certified.

Members of the Fire Department were scheduled for TB shots.

Officer Pat Collins reported on activities of the Police Department. Both vehicles were reported to be running well.

Also, there had been two burglaries last week.

Ed Kidston from Ohio, representing Artesian Company, talked about the local water project expected to get underway in the near future. He told about his company which could do the project. He said his company had been in business for 41 years and would install and service equipment. He compared the quality of their work to a Cadillac.

A representative from a competitive company made comments in response to Kidston's presentation. He stated his company would also construct the project in a like manner.

One bidder had responded for painting the South water tower. Council agreed to award the bid to Max Kor with alternates 1, 2 and 3 at a cost of \$145,800. Council agreed pending receipt of IDEM approval.

Council decided to wait until the next Council meeting April 18 to decide on a water project. Keith Sullivan had given a bid of \$133,136.03 for which Council tentatively gave this ok.

Superintendent Jim Webb reported to Council on projects by his department.

Pigeon control people are expected to be contacted about painting of the water tower, due to devices on top of the tower to help control pigeons.

Van Buren Clean-up Day has been set for Saturday, May 5.

The next Council meeting will be held Wednesday, April 18.



TRICARE SENIOR

PHARMACY

The new Tricare Senior Pharmacy Program began on April 1 for some 1.4 million potentially eligible military retirees age 65 years and older.

To use the Tricare retail and mail order benefit, beneficiaries must be eligible for Medicare Part A and be enrolled in Part B. (Exception: Those who turned 65 before April 1, 2001, are eligible, even if they are not enrolled in Medicare Part B.)

Beneficiaries also must be registered in the Defense Enrollment Eligibility Reporting System. To ensure this, the military retiree and dependents need only keep their ID cards current. If unsure about your DEERS enrollment status or eligibility, call (800) 538-9552 for assistance or call Tom Applegate at the Veteran's Service Office, 358-4863.

The Department of Defense offers the following four dispensing options listed in order of cost/value to the retiree and dependents:

Military Treatment Facility (MTF) Pharmacy. These are pharmacies within the hospitals located on military bases and posts. MTF pharmacies will continue to fill prescriptions written by either military or civilian prescribers for medications listed on the MTF's formulary. There is no co-payment or out-of-pocket expense when veterans use these facilities. The closest MTFs to the Huntington County area are located at Fort Knox, Kentucky and Wright Patterson Air Force Base, Dayton, Ohio.

National Mail Order Pharmacy. Prescriptions filled through the NMOP are \$3 for up to a 90-day supply of most generic medications, or \$9 for up to a 90-day supply of most non-generic medications. Other than using a Military Treatment Facility pharmacy, this is, by far, the most cost-effective method. To receive a National Mail Order Pharmacy brochure, call (800)903-4680.

Retail Network Pharmacy. These prescriptions are \$3 for a 30-day supply of most generic medications or \$9 for a 30-day supply of most non-generic medications. The Retail Network Pharmacies in the Huntington County Area are located at K-Mart, Wal-Mart and Walgreen Pharmacies. To prove eligibility, the veteran simply shows his/her military retired D card on the first visit to the

pharmacy. A list of other pharmacies in the Wabash, Marion and Fort Wayne areas is available from the Veteran's Service Office.

Retail Non-network Pharmacy. At non-network pharmacies, beneficiaries pay either \$9 or 20 percent of the total cost (whichever is greater), for a 30-day supply of a medication after they have met the Tricare annual deductible (\$150 per individual or \$300 per family). Both deductibles and co-payments are applied toward the beneficiary's Tricare catastrophic cap.

These pharmacy benefits have been available for military retirees under age 65 for many years. It is just this year that the benefits have been extended to retirees over the age of 65. For further details contact the Veterans' Service Office at 358-4863.

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
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
