## STATUE OF JESUS DEDICATED AT HERITAGE POINTE OF WARREN

On April 15, 2023 the lord provided a beautiful day for Heritage Pointe of Warren to dedicate a seven foot solid granite Statue of Jesus to honor the 377 individuals that are laid to rest in Heritage Pointe of Warren's Spring Hill Cemetery.

A revitalization project began back in 2020 when Lennis Ternet- a Villa resident at Heritage Pointe of Warren, visited the cemetery and noticed that it needed some loving attention. A clean up call was issued and volunteers started the process of revitalizing the cemetery that was established in 1909. The vision by the volunteers was to install a new entrance sign, document and create a catalog of those buried in the cemetery, install an 18 foot cedar cross, install benches for visitors and loved ones to sit on- and raise the funds needed to accomplish these projects.

A greater and larger vision then came from the volunteers to install a statue of Jesus. A \$30,000 fund drive was organized to make the statue a reality. The volunteers thought it may take two to three years to raise the funds- but to their surprise the funds were raised within a few short months! By April 2022 the statue was ordered and delivered

### S.R. 3 CONSTRUCTION

The Indiana Department of Transportation announces the closure of State Road 3 south of Markle.

Crews are scheduled to begin bridge construction between C.R. 500 S and C.R.

200 S starting on or after May 8. Work is expected to last until mid-June. All work is weather-dependent and schedules are subject to change.

During the closure, drivers should use the posted detour of State Road 124, State Road 5, I-69 and U.S. 224, or seek an alternate route.

Coosawhatchie, SC was 55 miles ahead. That created some spelling effort! Did Hilton Head Island disappear from the map??

We passed billboard signs advertising Shoney's and Cracker Barrel. I wasn't even hungry yet. A sign read, Savannah: 86 miles. Fortunately, it was still on the map. A corn field was spotted with 6 inch high plants while listening to a CD recording of "Davey Crockett." No connection! At 10:20, the bus passed another billboard suggesting that we stop at Dukes BBQ. Still not hungry!

Our entourage crossed the Salkehatchie River and passed the exit to Lake Warren State Park before bypassing the exits to Yemassee, Pocotaligo, and Beaufort. There will be a spelling test later. One year after the start of the American Revolution, Rhode Island ramped up its status and became the first colony to declare its independence from England.

According to History.com, Rhode Island's seaside access allowed it to develop a "lucrative" maritime shipping business with the West Indies and Africa, trading rum and slaves. Thus "because it had independent wealth and trade coming through the two vibrant ports of Providence and Newport, Rhode Island was the only small state that could theoretically survive independent of the proposed federal union in 1787. The state had no desire to lose income in the form of import duties to the new federal government. As a result, Rhode Island was the last state to ratify the Constitution in 1790, when it was finally confronted with

the prospect of the greater financial impositions it would suffer from being treated as a foreign country from the United States."

For decades after the Revolution, horses were the only method of bicoastal mobility; then in the 19th century that relationship was eclipsed by the Civil War, and progress was stymied until the conflict ended in 1865. By 1869 the Central Pacific Railroad traveling out of Sacramento, California on May 10, 1869, joined with the Union Pacific coming from Omaha, Nebraska at Promontory, Utah.

"For all the adversity they suffered," says History.com, "the Union Pacific and Central Pacific workers were able to finish the railroad—laying nearly 2,000 miles of track by 1869, ahead of schedule and under budget. Journeys that had taken months by wagon train or weeks by boat now took only days. Their work had an immediate impact: The years following the construction of the railway were years of rapid growth and expansion for the United States, due in large part to the speed and ease of travel that the railroad provided."

America's second President John Adams, and his First Lady, Abigail, were the first inhabitants of the White House. Although President Adams demanded that federal employees relocate from Philadelphia to Washington D.C. by May 15, 1800, he and Abigail didn't occupy the presidential mansion until November; they stayed four months—through the inauguration of Thomas Jefferson in March of 1801.

In a November 21, 1800, letter to her daughter, "Nabby," Abigail wrote: "You must keep all this to yourself, and, when asked how I like it, say that I write you the situation is beautiful, which is true. The house is made habitable, but there is not a single apartment finished, and all withinside, except the plastering, has been done since [White House steward John] Briesler came. We have not the least fence, yard, or other convenience, without, and the great unfinished audience room I made a drying room of, to hang up the clothes in ... Upstairs there is the oval

room, which is designed for the drawing room, and has the crimson furniture in it. It is a very handsome room now; but, when completed, it will be beautiful. If the twelve years, in which this place has been considered as the future seat of government, had been improved, as they would have been if in New England, very many of the present inconveniences would have been removed."

Betty L. Ferguson, 95, of Van Buren, IN, passed away Thursday, April 27, 2023.

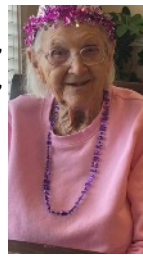

1999.
