Thought for the Week: Enjoy the 40th Annual Salamonie Summer Festival




AMARILLO

Fireworks are allowed only during the following times; Between 5pm and two hours after sunset on June 29, June 30, July 1, July 2, July 3, July 5, July 6, July 7, July 8, July 9 and between 10 am and midnight on July 4. In addition, fireworks are permitted between 10 am on December 31 and 1 am on January Penalties will be assessed through Town Code.

It all started on a street corner in Warren 40 years ago. Eva Mae Minnich and Mary Brandon was discussing world events and the subject of Warren's younger generation surfaced for discussion. They talked about so many of Warren's youth moving away and how nice it would be to have a weekend so they could come back to visit each other. Plans progressed and in May 1967 a committee was organized to plan for a summer festival. Dr. Donald Ping was elected chairman with George Huffman serving as vice chairman. Mrs. Raymond Shultz was secretary.

It was decided that each organization in town would have a representative at the meetings. Each organization was expected to put on some kind of event. All events were not used for money making. That is why there were so many free shows and events. Plans for a parade were discussed. The parade would start at Tower Park, down 3rd Street, through the business district and end at the river. The parade captain was Charles Winningham. It was expected to have a number of old automobiles as well as various other entries. A list of other chairmen were: Mrs. John Ehler and Bruce Laymonpublicity chairmen, Mrs. George Brandon-general chairman for exhibits, Paul Stucky-program chairman, Jerry Williams-contest chairman, Mr. and Mrs. Richard Bonham-theme development, Richard St. John-food and refreshment chairman, Mrs. Howard Minnichchairman of the fine arts display and Rovene Heaton-chairman of antique china and glassware.

The theme for the festival was "Blessings of Freedom." Some of the events were guided tours of some of the businesses in town, movie film shorts, craft and work shops, canoe races, pony pull, teen dance, horse show, and fishing derby. Teresa Eltzroth was the first featival queen.

The first Salamonie Summer Festival was one of the greatest events in the history of the town. Thousands of people came from near and far to view exhibits of antiques, works of art, and to participate in the various activities being held during the four day weekend. The festival was a huge success and has continued successful the past 40 vears.

LIBRARY DEDICATION

A public dedication ceremony for an Indiana state historical marker is scheduled for July 7, 2007. The state historical marker recognizing Warren's Carnegie Library will be dedicated on library property at 123 East Third Street, at 10 A.M. Eastern .Daylight Savings Time.

The text follows for the state marker entitled "Warren's Carnegie Library":

A Warren Public Library Board was organized in June 1916 after a public funddraising campaign to buy books and periodicals. In 1917, a grant of \$10,000 from the Carnegie Corporation was confirmed to support construction of a free public library. Library Board selected Samuel Craig as supervising architect 1917. Building is Neoclassical in design. Supply and transportation problems as a result of World War 1 halted construction temporarily. Warren Free Public Library was dedicated June 5, 1920 with over 1,500 books. Improvements completed in 1990s. One of 1,679 libraries built in U.S. with funds from philanthropist Andrew Carnegie. Indiana built more Carnegie libraries than any other state.

Everyone is invited to attend this dedication ceremony for the state historical marker honoring Warren's Carnegie Library and the library's contribution to literacy and education in the state.

Historical markers commemorate significant Indiana individuals, places, and events, and they help communities throughout Indiana promote, preserve, and

present their history for the education and enjoyment of residents and tourists of all ages. Via the Internet, that history reaches a worldwide audience. For more than 90 years the Indiana Historical Bureau, an agency of the State of Indiana, has been marking Indiana history. Since 1947, the marker format has been the large roadside marker, which has the familiar dark blue background with gold lettering and the outline of the state of Indiana at the top. There are approximately 500 of these markers across the state.

Officer Pat Collins presented the Police report to Council.


Plans are to draw up an Ordinance concerning Golf Carts.

There are no Council meetings scheduled for July at this time. If it becomes necessary, a meeting will be called.



- 2 1/2 pound chicken cut in guarters.

Mix the mustard, honey dill and orange together(can be made ahead of time and refrigerated). Brush the sauce over the chicken covering well. Place on preheated grill on high for about 5 minutes turning once. Reduce heat to med to low and continue cooking till test done basting

A nice dessert is an easy peach cobbler. Spray a 9x13 pan and add 2 quarts peaches with syrup. Mix the dry ingredients of 1 cup flour, 1 cup sugar,1 teaspoon baking powder with an egg and mix till crumbly, sprinkle over the peaches melt 1 stick of butter or margarine and pour over all and top with a sprinkling of cinnamon sugar. Bake at 350 for 45 minutes. If using fresh peaches: 2 quarts of sliced peaches 2 cups water and 1/2 cup sugar and simmer 15 minutes before putting in pan. Enjoy.
