The "FAS Bell Concordance" will mark the beginning of the WCTU's yearlong project to warn the public - Drinking ANY amount of alcohol during pregnancy places the baby at Risk for birth defects such as Fetal Alcohol Syndrome.

Fetal Alcohol Syndrome is the leading cause of mental retardation and is 100% preventable.

FAS Day was developed by FASWORLD. FAS Day was first observed on September 9, 1999. At 9:09 am., volunteers around the world marked the beginning of "FAS Day" by ringing bells. The bell ringing was named "The FAS Bell Concordance." Ringing of bells was chosen as a way to bring awareness to FAS because historically bells are often associated with announcements, warnings and alarms.

On Sept. 9, 1999, events were held in communities across Canada and the U.S., and in South Africa, New Zealand, Germany, and Sweden. There were also volunteers in Australia and Italy.

You could be a hero: give blood

Imagine the thrill and satisfaction of saving another person's life. You carry someone from a burning building. Or whisk a child from the path of a speeding car. Certainly, you would be a hero.

But you can be a hero without risking your own life - just by giving

blood. Actually, you could save several lives by giving blood just once. A single unit of blood can be separated into several components to be used by people whose lives depend on receiving them

To qualify for this heroism, you must be healthy, at least 17 years old, and weigh 110 pounds or more.

Giving blood is a safe procedure. It is not possible to contract HIV, the virus that causes AIDS, by donating blood. The American Red Cross emphasizes the fact that each needle used in the procedure is sterile and is disposed of after a single use.

People in good health can donate a unit of blood as often as every eight weeks. Some states may further limit the number and/or frequency of donations in a 12-month period.

You can even donate blood to yourself. When a blood transfusion is anticipated, such as for an upcoming

surgery, you can donate blood and designate it for your own use. It's called an autologous blood donation.

Besides, when you give blood you get a nice paid break from your job; a sympathetic nurse takes care of you and pats your forehead; you get a nice nap when the procedure is over, along with some delicious drinks and maybe a cookie or two.

There is probably a simpler way to get coffee and cookies, but no other way will make you feel so heroic or so satisfied.







SUPPLEMENTS MAY OFFER EARLY PROTECTION FROM **O**STEOPOROSIS

(NAPS)-The sooner, the better. That advice may help many women prevent, or reduce the onset of osteoporosis later in life. A recent study suggests that many women can benefit significantly from early treatment of osteoporosis, and that a widely available over-the-counter dietary supplement may help.

"The results suggest that women begin experiencing bone loss earlier than previously believed, even before menopause, during the perimenopausal stage," says Lila Nachtigall, MD, a leading authority on women's health and professor of Obstetrics & Gynecology at New York University School of Medicine

Perimenopause refers to the gradual period of change leading up to the final onset of menopause. During this stage, estrogen production slows and the ovaries stop the regular production of eggs. As estrogen levels decline. trabecular bone-the inner bone laver-is also lost.

The over-the-counter supplement, called Promensil, is made from plant estrogens (or isoflavones) extracted from red clover, and each tablet is standardized to deliver a proprietary ratio of the four important plant estrogens most commonly found in nature. The specific ratio of plant estrogens in Promensil appears to help provide protection against trabecular bone loss.

Hormone replacement therapy is frequently prescribed to women to help prevent osteoporosis, but generally, women do not take it until after menopause," explains Dr. Nachtigall. "Promensil is a safe, natural and convenient option, and has been clinically proven effective not only for reducing symptoms of menopause-

such as hot flashes-but now also for helping to reduce bone loss." The National Osteoporosis Foundation recommends that women continue to exercise and include 1,200 mg of calcium each day in their diet



SHRINERS OPEN NEW WORLDS FOR SPECIAL NEEDS KIDS

(NAPS)-When he was six years old, Francisco lost his voice and mobility to meningitis. For the next six years, he had communicated with his parents, brother and sister solely with eye gaze. Francisco's family would ask him yes-or-no questions and he would answer "yes" by looking up at the ceilling, or "no" by looking straight ahead

Recently, members of the Shriners Car Club in Seattle donated a portable computer to Francisco. With the support of the Portland Shriners Hospital for Children, he is learning to use the computer to speak the words his mind is thinking.

During therapy sessions at the hospital, Francisco reclines in his

wheelchair, looking at the computer on a table in front of him. His hands jut to his sides and his face trembles. A large, green button is positioned in front of Francisco's left foot.

The computer displays four fast-food outlet names and logos. Starting with Pizza Hut, the logos darken for five-second intervals. When the computer highlights the McDonald's logo, Francisco twitches his left foot to select it. Click. Then a McDonald's menu pops up on the screen. Small boxes on the screen display pictures and names of menu items, such as cheeseburger, apple pie, Coke and French fries. Other buttons display the words, "I want," "Please," and "Help me."

Speech therapist Mira Shah asks Francisco, "Do you want something to eat or something to drink?" Francisco sets the computer program in motion by tapping the button with his foot. The computer highlights words on the menu and says, in Spanish, "I want something to eat." The computer speaks in a deep male voice, which makes Francisco smile. His mother, who sits nearby, smiles with him.

Francisco is happy when he is in therapy with Mira, says his mother, Hermelinda. Before he came to Shriners, Francisco did not have a computer or a wheelchair. "We were always carrying him in our arms," said Hermelinda in Spanish

Francisco is one of many Shriners patients who use computers to help them communicate as well as play. Children who can't hold a paintbrush or a doll can touch a computer screen to create works of art, or play with "virtual" Barbie dolls.


