TAX BILLS IN JUNE

Property Tax Bills will not be sent out until June, 2004 with a deadline in July, 2004. No definite date has been established as we are waiting on a tax rate from the State before we can proceed any further. The second installment will be on time for November 10, 2004. Last year's reassessment has put our tax cycle behind and that is the reason we will be late this year. We should be back on normal schedule for tax deadline in 2005

Currently, all corners on alleys and streets in the downtown area are being replaced to meet accessibility code for the handicapped. The resurfacing portion of the project will begin the week following the Art's Festival and is to be completed prior to the Salamonie Summer Festival. That project will include milling and resurfacing of the highways.


MAMMOGRAMS FOR MOM

This value includes a digital mammogram with computer-aided detection and radiology fee or a film mammogram screening and radiology fee. MammoPad breast cushions are used with each mammogram for a softer, warmer mammogram with less skin pulling. No physician referral is required and certificates are valid through September 30, 2004.

According to the American Cancer Society, the earlier breast cancer is found, the better the chances for successful treatment. It is recommended that women age forty and over should have a mammogram every year. A mammogram can often identify breast abnormalities that may be cancerous before physical symptoms develop.
