Of the 2,250 hours of summer, countless are spent vacationing, watching baseball or enjoying the sun. But by taking just one of those hours to give blood through the American Red Cross, you can help save the lives of up to three people, and give them the gift of summertime, too.

"We're asking you to set aside one hour of your summer to give blood and help others in need," said Sharyn Whitman, CEO for the Indiana-Ohio Blood Services Region of the American Red Cross. "Every 24 hours, 21,000 people receive a blood transfusion from a Red Cross donor. We need everyone who can to donate and make an appointment to give."

While all blood types are needed, Type O is in high demand since it is the only type that can be transfused to patients with other blood groups such as A, B and AB. Hospitals, too, use Type O-negative blood in most

emergency trauma cases when a patient's blood type isn't known. In fact, nearly half of all the blood ordered by hospitals is Type O.

The Red Cross urges Type O donors to optimize their donation by making a double red cell donation. Donors who meet certain criteria may be eligible to safely donate two units of red blood cells through an automated donation process. This involves drawing blood and channeling it through a sterile, single-use collection set to an automated machine. The machine separates and collects red cells from the donation, and then returns the platelets, plasma and a saline solution to the donor. Double red cell donation is beneficial to hospital patients – the risk of a transfusion reaction is reduced when a patient receives multiple units of blood from the same donor.

"Depending on your schedule, a double red cell donation may be ideal for you since you can give twice as much in just one visit," said Whitman. "Whatever your blood type, whichever way you give, someone needs you."

Give blood or platelets June 29 – Sept. 7 and enter to win a \$500 Meijer gift card. A winner will be drawn each week!

### DON'T DUMP AQUARIUMS

Aquarium owners who are moving and can't take their aquarium's contents with them should avoid dumping the contents in local waters.

Most of the fish won't survive the winter, and the plants can thrive and cause serious environmental damage.

Dumping aquarium fish into public waters without a stocking permit is a Class C misdemeanor that can carry a fine of up to \$500 and 30 days in jail, plus court costs.

If an aquarium owner cannot find someone who will take the fish, the DNR recommends sealing the fish in a plastic bag, putting them in a freezer, and then disposing of them in the trash. They should never be flushed down a toilet or dumped into local lakes, ponds, streams or rivers.

Alternatives for those who don't want their fish to die as a result of their move include:

- Giving the fish to another aquarium owner
- Donating the fish to a local aquarium society
- Contacting aquarium stores for possible return

The plastic-bag technique also is the best option for getting rid of unwanted aquarium plants. Unlike the fish, many aquarium plants thrive in local waters, crowding out native plants and adversely affecting fishing,

boating and the water's appearance; and can cost thousands to eradicate.

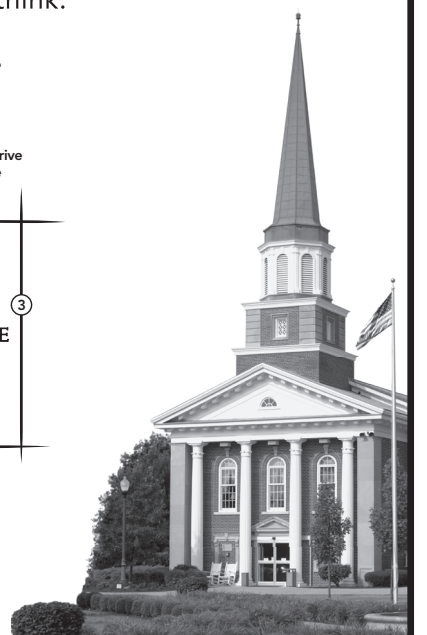
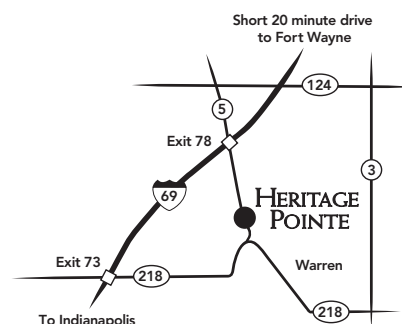

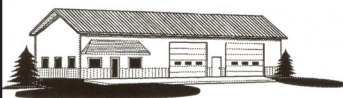

Or, as Ben Franklin answered when asked why he came to the Constitutional Convention in Philadelphia when he could have stayed at home because of illness, "If I stayed at home I would just be sick and tired, so I decided to be sick and tired in Independence Hall.

Be like the violinist who, when his string broke in the middle of a concert, transposed and kept on playing. Be like James Whistler, the famous painter, who never meant to be a painter, but when he flunked out of West Point just switched gears. Be like Sir Walter Raleigh the great novelist who admitted the brilliant poetry of Lord Byron

was better and simply seeking another goal became renown for the tales he wound.

Longfellow said it:

"Not in the clamor of the crowded street,

Not in the shouts and plaudits of the throne

But in ourselves are triumph and defeat."

The worse can be made better and the better can be made worse. It all depends on whether we concentrate on remembering all our times of suffering rather than our times of joy or pursue the bringing up time and time again all our failures rather than our triumphs. It is such a foolishness to concentrate on all the times we have been hated while forgetting all the times we have been loved.

It is easy to claim our pains, frustrations, irritations and

heartaches are worse than those of anyone else. To find the worst and make it more so. To be a poor mathematician and never add up life's blessings. We've all done it.

But it makes so much more sense and rids ourselves of nonsense if we take the crab apples of life and make jelly rather than each day just get more crabby. Some mine silver from the clouds in their lives and therefore daily grow richer. Some tarnish the silver with perpetual tears.

Yes, better can be made worse. Worse can be made better. It is always up to us.
