**MY TOWN AND YOURS**

The other day I was given a 1952 Warren Phone Book for the museum. Looking through the yellow pages I noticed Warren was thriving pretty good back then. See if some of these businesses bring back some memories.

Under Agricultural Implements we had five dealers in town. Harrison Farm Equipment sold Allis Chalmers and W.M. Clappitt & Sons ran the Warren Tractor Sales and sold Ford tractors and Dearborn farm equipment. Eckman Motors, besides Buick and Pontiacs, sold John Deere tractors and implements. They also, had Frigidaire Appliances. Daugherty Farm Equipment was your Case and Massey Harris Dealer and International Harvester was sold at Kriegbaum Hardware.

Warren had plenty of grocery stores in 1952. Boughner's Market, Breedlove Grocery, Nash Grocery, Shull Grocery, Snavelly Grocery and Sanitary Market. You sure would have found what you needed without having to go out of town.

Getting gasoline was not a problem, with a filling station at every corner. There was Beavans, Brianwood Inn on State Road 3, Brown Service Station, Christner Standard Service, Eckman Motors, Hites Service Station, Neel Motor Sales, Riverside Service Station, and Wilson Station at State Road 3. The good part was you didn't have to pump your own gas at any of these places.

Doctors in town that year included JB Bennett, CS Black, HF Bonifield and LW Smith. We also had WA Blair, a chiropractor, WM Mott and James Mott as our dentists and Mac Bonifield was the veterinarian.

Grain elevators consisted of Farm Bureau, McDaniel and McDaniel, Smith Coal and Supply Co., and the Warren Grain and Feed. Two drug stores in town were Coolman's and The Gold Seal Drug Store. There were several good places to eat. These were Mac's Café, Shultz Café, the Wagon Wheel Café and Ditzler Café, where you could add to your meal a scoop of ice cream.

All other needs were supplied by these stores: The Gamble Store, Minnich's Mens Wear, Myers Dept. Store, ClineClick Lumber, Warren Locker Plant, Holmes Jewelry, Myers Jewelry, Hi-Quality Hatchery, Hooker Glass Co., Ray's Radio and Duffy Stockyard.



Others were Shipley Welding and Repair Shop, Ware Monuments, Brown Furniture Mart, H Brown & Son, Ben Franklin Store, McFarren Store, Maries Style Shop, Craft Cigar Store, Cloud's Barber Shop and Fluhrs Cleaners. The three plumbers were Blachley, William Heating and Plumbing and Warren Service & Supply. A few of these businesses are still around today.

I have been changing the museum around and adding more things. We will have it open during the Salamonie Summer Festival. Stop in and see us. Hours will be: 9 to 4 Friday, 9 to 4 and 6 to 10 Saturday, and 12 to 5 Sunday.

tunity to tour with and open for some very well known national acts.

Members of the group have opened and toured with such great entertainers as TG Sheppard, Ronnie McDowell, Gene Watson, Connie Smith, Bobby Bare, Whispering Bill Anderson, The Kinleys, Shenendoah, Sawyer Brown, Exile, Helen Cornelius and more. In 1997 some of the members competed in a local radio contest winning a spot to compete in and perform at the 1997 Country Concert Hickory Hills Lakes, located in Fort Loramie, OH. The group was also chosen to perform at the National Law Enforcement Memorial Service in Washington DC in honor of police officers killed in the line of duty. This performance took place in front of thousands of people, one of which was the President of the United States.

The group combines a variety of different musical backgrounds ranging from gospel to rock-n-roll, to country. Change of Pace prides itself on providing a family oriented show playing not only top 40 country music but original country music as well. The group has and is presently working with Comstock Records. Past workings with Comstock Records include a CD release in both Europe and the United States. ### CANNER TESTING

The garden is planted and now is the time to prepare to preserve the bounty. A pressure canner is used to preserve most fruits and vegetables. The dial gauge should be checked every two years, according to Beverly Morgan, Extension Educator in Consumer and Family Sciences. This is a free service by the Purdue Extension Service of Huntington County. The testing will be done on June 28 and July 10 from 9:00 a.m. to noon. The Extension Office is located in Room 209 of the

Courthouse. Bring the canner lid to the Extension Office the day before or early on the morning of testing.

A dial gauge or weighted gauge is essential to control the pressure. The accuracy of the weighted dial is constant, unless damaged in some way or clogged with food particles. However a weighted gauge cannot be tested.

A dial gauge needs to be tested for accuracy. If the gauge is inaccurate more than two pounds, it should be replaced. Why take chances with the safety of the foods you preserve for your family? Make certain that your pressure canner gauge is accurate.

Now is also the time to check your canning equipment and supplies. Check the rubber gasket and the safety plug on the canner lid. If the rubber gasket has become stretched or brittle over the years, it should be replaced. Be certain there is no dust, dirt, food particles, or oil around the safety plug or the pressure gauge.

The Huntington County Extension Office has numerous publications on canning and freezing. Be certain to use current recipes, in order to prevent food borne illness.

Bluffton Regional Medical Center is offering a new CPR class. CPR for Family and Friends will teach CPR and choking techniques for adults, children and infants. This fee covers the class, a book for each participant and a participation card following the class.

### WATER REPORT

As required by law, the annual Drinking Water Quality Report has been mailed to users of the Warren Municipal Water Utility. The Municipal Water Utility has met all Federal and State Testing Requirements with that testing showing no violations for the past twelve month. If you did not receive a copy and wish to see the report, copies are available at the Clerk-Treasurer's office, 132 N. Wayne Street.

### ENCOURAGING THE ART OF CONVERSATION

Beginning in infancy, it's critical for parents to respond to a child's attempt to communicate, whether through sounds or gestures. That can be as simple as describing what you are doing, or naming an object a toddler learns.

Kathryn Hirsh-Pasek, co-author of How Babies Talk (E.P. Dutton), says it's best to build on the child's interests in a conversation. Let the child be the leader. Learn to tolerate a short silence instead of speaking up whenever there's a gap in conversation. Give them the time they need.

Mealtime conversation can get kids thinking about other places and times. Sometimes the child asks a question, and the parent answers. Or the child speaks and

the parent probes for details, asking "Why do you think that happened?"

Other useful tips:

- Extend the conversation. Link stories and experiences to other things that interest the child.
- Have the child's friends and other families visit so you can discuss new subjects and points of view.
- Listen to kids and talk to them without TV in the background.
- Read. Young children like to hear the same story over and over. Provide an explanation the first time. Next time, talk about what the child think' of the story. Later, talk about the child' life in relation to the story.
