# FSSA ANNOUNCES END OF MDWISE PARTICIPATION IN INDIANA MEDICAID PROGRAMS

Indianapolis — The Indiana Family and Social Services Administration (FSSA) today announced that MDwise will no longer serve as a managed care health plan for Indiana Medicaid's Healthy Indiana Plan (HIP) and Hoosier Healthwise programs, effective January 1, 2026.

This decision follows a comprehensive review of MDwise's performance and its ability to meet FSSA's select standards for member assist services, provider support, and program accountability. FSSA determined that ending the contract with MDwise is necessary to ensure the long-term 9949 strength and sustainability of Indiana Medicaid.

"Indiana Medicaid exists to provide dependable, high-quality care for the Hoosiers who rely on it," said Mitch Roob, Secretary of FSSA. "Our review found that, of the four plans,

MDwise was both the most expensive and the lowest in quality. Federal rules require us to maintain at least three plans, and this decision allows us to meet those standards while safeguarding members' access to care."

What this means for members:

- \* Coverage continues: Members will not lose Medicaid benefits.
- \* New plan options: Members must choose a new health plan—Anthem, CareSource, or MHS during open enrollment.
- \* Automatic assignment: Members who do not choose will be assigned to a plan, with the option to change within 90 days after January 1, 2026.
- \* Continuity of care: Existing authorizations and treatments will be honored for a transition period.

Members will receive letters with detailed instructions on how to select a new plan. ## **BROWNED BUTTER PECAN PIE**

½ c. butter

¾ c. light corn syrup

¼ c. honey

1c. sugar

1 tsp vanilla

1/8 tsp salt

3 large eggs, lightly beaten

1 c. chopped pecans

1 unbaked pie shell

Cook butter in a pan for 6-8 minutes or till browned, do not stir. Remove from heat and set aside.

In a bowl, combine the next 6 ingredients, stir well. Stir in browned butter and pecans. Pour into

pie shell bake 425 degrees for 10 minutes, reduce heat to 325 degrees and finish baking for 40-45 minutes or till filling is set.

# TUTORING GRANTS NOW AVAILABLE

Eligible families can access \$1,000 grants, focused on English/language arts and math

Indiana families can now access tutoring grants through Indiana Learns, a statewide initiative that helps qualifying students strengthen their skills in English/language arts (ELA) and math. Enrollment is through Friday, December 19, and families begin scheduling can sessions tutoring immediately.

"As a state, we continue to make progress in both reading and math. Indiana Learns is just one example of our commitment to keeping our foot on the gas pedal and improving outcomes for students,' Dr. said Katie Jenner, Indiana Secretary Education. "Indiana Learns specifically focuses on our most struggling students and provides them the opportunity to receive high-quality tutoring support, regardless of their parents' ability to pay. This investment in our Hoosier families is an investment in the future of our state, and first and foremost, the future of our students."

To qualify for an Indiana Learns tutoring grant, a student must meet the following criteria:

- \* Student resides in Indiana;
- \* Student completed ILEARN testing and scored below proficiency in either ELA or Mathematics;
- \* Student is enrolled in and is attending a CSI, TSI or ATSI-designated school as a third through eighth grade student; and
- \* Student qualifies for the federal free or reduced lunch program.

Families can check their eligibility and enroll today at IndianaLearns.org.

Those who qualify can use their \$1,000 grant to access tutoring in ELA and math through approved Learning Partners statewide. Tutoring is available in-person, online, or in a hybrid format, giving families flexible options to meet their students' needs.

Indiana Learns is administered by The Mind Trust on behalf of the Indiana Department of Education (IDOE). Since October 2022, Indiana Learns has enrolled more 25,000 than students, funded over 280,000 hours tutoring, and maintained an attendance rate of over 80 percent with data showing that who engaged students frequently in more had tutoring greater academic gains. An external study comparing students who participated in Indiana Learns students to those who did not participate found significant statistically results in ELA and math proficiency.

"Indiana Learns has proven that when students receive consistent, highquality tutoring, they make real academic progress," said Brandon Brown, CEO at The Mind Trust. "We're proud to continue this partnership with IDOE to ensure more families have access to the resources their students need to succeed."

# ENOUGH IS ENOUGH WARNING PARENTS ABOUT 764

Enough Is Enough (EIE) is warning parents about an online group called 764 that is targeting children for exploitation through social media platforms, gaming sites like Discord and Roblox, and mobile apps.

The FBI recently issued a warning about this violent online network, and others, that are increasingly targeting and exploiting minors online. The FBI says victims are usually between the ages of 10-17.

A 21-year-old Arizona man – a reported leader of 764 - was recently charged with participating in a child enterprise, exploitation producing and distributing pornography, child coercing and enticing minors to engage in sexual cyberstalking, activity, among other charges. A Maryland man with "loose ties to 764" is facing federal charges for allegedly using Roblox to "blackmail young girls, befriending them before coercing them to record video sex acts, to cut themselves, and to commit violent crimes." The FBI says there are currently over 250 investigations related to 764 underway.

"Parents and caregivers need to know and understand that 764, a rabid online gang, is targeting children online on social media sites, online gaming platforms,

chat rooms, mobile apps. This group has demanded victims send them photos that are then used to extort them. It's been reported that 764 will even host online gatherings so others can watch them torment their victims in real time. This is an distressing extremely threat to children online that both parents and youth need to be aware of. We applaud the FBI and for aggressively dealing with this group and setting a precedent that depraved criminals like 764 will be hunted down under the leadership of AG Bondi," said Donna Rice Hughes, President and CEO, Enough Is Enough.

"The first step to protect children is for parents to know about this threat and other real and present online dangers to their children, as many are unaware of 764. It's critical that Congress passes online child protection legislation like the Kids Online Safety Act, which will give online tech platforms a legal 'duty of care' obligation to prevent harms to minors, and require strongest the safety settings for youth and guardians," Hughes.

Discord and Roblox are both facing lawsuits related to harms their platforms have allegedly caused children.

# DOWNTOWN TRAIL NETWORK OPENS IN THE CITY OF MARION

The Indiana Department of Natural Resources (DNR) and the city of Marion celebrated the opening of the Downtown Trail Network.

The 10-foot-wide, asphalt, multi-use trail was constructed by the city of Marion with help from a \$640,684 grant administered by the DNR.

"The Downtown Trail Network embodies the connections and spurred economic activity that come with trail development," said Gary Schultz, trails coordinator with the Indiana DNR. "By linking downtown Marion the Cardinal with Greenway, we gain more connections to downtown businesses and more connections to healthy transportation on the greenway. DNR is proud to support this project."

The Downtown Trail Network adds 0.57 miles trail of connecting Indiana's longest trail, the Cardinal Greenway, into Marion's downtown business district and its social and cultural landmarks. The trail is one segment of a larger city project identified in its 2019 Downtown Revitalization Plan that to extend the aims Downtown Trail Network northward and connect with the Mississinewa Riverwalk. These trails will encourage economic development and connect the Marion community to its various districts and existing city amenities.

DNR has led the largest infusion of trails funding in state history, with \$180 million in dedicated trail funding administered through DNR that facilitates critical trail connections within and between Hoosier communities. A total of 56 of the 89 projects are complete, with another 15 under construction. With this opening, more than 162 miles of trail have been built since the program's inception.
