There will also be two Saturdays available to vote, please call 260-358-4820 in order to verify the dates. If mailing your ballot, the deadline is October 29 for the Absentee ballots to be received by the County Clerk for the 2012 General Election.

The deadline is October 9 to become a registered voter. To become a registered voter, go to www.indianavoters.in.gov or go to the Huntington County Clerk/Voter Registration Office weekdays from 9 to 4.

Reviews of Commonwealth Engineers Planning Grant Report continues. A Public Hearing is set for September 24 and approval of the plan is expected to follow.

A discussion was held concerning the purchase of two properties, one at 120 East First St and one at 124 North Wayne St. Finalizing was expected within a week.

Due to an error on Ordinance 2012-3, Ordinance 2012-4 was introduced with corrections made. This Ordinance concerns water rate increase of twenty-five percent. This includes an increase of approximately four dollars on an average use.

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Ordinance 2012-5 was adopted. This Ordinance amends the Town Code and allows for one time notification per year that a nuisance exists on a property.

It was announced that Warren Area Chamber of Commerce has approved funds for support of the GED Program being set up in the Warren Area and support the Bread of Life Food Bank will continue.

Clerk-Treasurer Marilyn Morrison reported that the 2013 Budget has been published. A Public Hearing has been scheduled for September 24. Adoption is expected at the regular meeting of October 8.

Day reported renewal of the water and wastewater generator maintenance contract with MacAllister for three years in the amount of \$8,658.00. Council approved.

Requests for quotes have been submitted to area fencing companies for fencing around Schwob Field. Quotes are to be submitted by October 5 to be considered at the Council meeting on October 8.

Spraying for mosquitoes is expected to continue for at least two more weeks.

Day also asked Council to consider seeking quotes for replacement of the bed on the electric utility truck at an estimated \$6,500. Council concurred.

INDOT's plan to replace a culvert on State Road 5 at the north entrance of town will require the movement of water lines.

Fire Chief Poulson submitted the monthly report. He said Lee Smith has been added as a new member of the Department. Council approved.

The Department is set to hold a luncheon at KBC on October 8 as a fundraiser.

In his report, Town Marshal Spitler, said Officer Brent Beebe had requested a leave of absence. He asked for consideration of Cole Lahr to fill the vacancy. Council agreed.

Council agreed to a quote of \$2,029.34 for the purchase of camera equipment for the interrogation room.

Several trees are expected to be purchased by the town in the spring. There was a discussion about types and how they may

TIPS AVAILABLE

Purdue Extension specialists have put out a new publication to help homeowners and professionals answer some of the questions asked about drought stress. This publication called, "Lawns and the Summer of 2012 Drought/Heat Crisis: Now What" is available at the following on-line link: <http://purdueturftips.blogspot.com/2012/08/new-lawn-recovery-guide.html> or folks can contact the Huntington County Extension Office for a copy.

In many cases it comes down to answering this question: Do I reseed, or will fertilizing be enough to recover my lawn?

Purdue Extension specialists, Aaron Patton and Cale Bigelow, have this advice:

- * Seed or fertilize? It depends on the size of the damaged area. Patton advises that if an area between clumps of surviving grass is larger than your hand print, then it probably needs to be reseeded. Types of seed to buy will depend on whether the area is sunny, shady or a mix of both.

Fine fescues, such as creeping fescue, are good for shady areas. Kentucky bluegrass or tall fescue are ideal for lawns with full sun. "Tall fescue has gained popularity over the last few years in that it keeps its green color longer during drought," Patton said. A mix of tall fescue and Kentucky bluegrass works well in areas of high traffic.

Patton advised against buying products stating that the seed establishes itself quickly. Such seeds typically have a lot of annual ryegrass, which is not cold-hardy or tolerant of heat and drought.

There are many types of fertilizers available. It is important to read the label of

the product to understand the amount and type of fertilizer in the bag. There may also be a broadleaf weed control herbicide included in the product.

* Site preparation for seeding: Remove debris and patches of dead grass with a garden rake to ensure that the new seed contacts the soil. In addition, aeration is a good way to prepare lawns for seeding, and you also get the added benefits of reducing soil compaction and improving rooting and water infiltration.

* Starter fertilizers: Such fertilizers are high in phosphorus - good for new lawns established from seed. "It helps a newly seeded lawn to develop its root system and grow strong," Patton said.

* Herbicides: They can damage seedlings if applied too soon after seeding. Patton advises reading the product instructions to determine how soon you can apply after seeding, often after cutting the new grass three times.
