#### HISTORIC PRESERVATION **GRANT APPLICATION PACKETS AVAILABLE**

The Indiana Department of Natural Resources (DNR) is now accepting applications for the Historic Preservation Fund (HPF) (https://www.in.gov/dnr/his toric-preservation/financialassistance/grants/), provides funding to support rehabilitation of sites listed on the National Register of Historic Places.

"Indiana's historic places represent an important part of our Hoosier identity," said Beth McCord, director of the DNR Division of Historic Preservation and Archeology. "Through this grant, we can infuse funds to preserve more of our history for future generations."

Grants can support Echo Bay, and Garden River architectural and historical part by a grant from the U.S. professors projects, archaeological projects, and acquisition and development (rehabilitation) eligible for applicants must be tax- Division exempt educational organizations, government. within listed historic districts.


