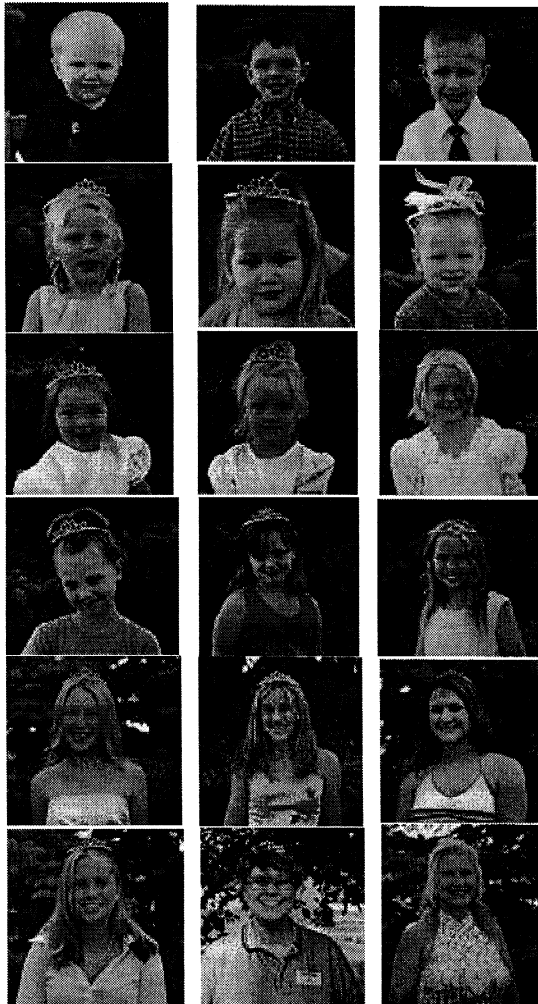

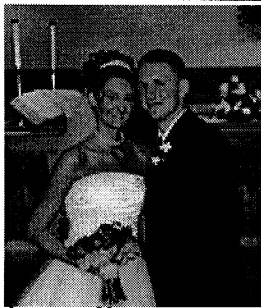

Fort Wayne, IN - A consumer has contacted the Better Business Bureau of Northeastern Indiana about a notice received in the mail claiming she won money. President & CEO Mike Coil said, "This scam is more vicious than others, because a check sent with the letter makes the offer seem real."

A check from the "First Hawaiian Bank of Honolulu HI" (the bank is a member of the BBB), and a postmarked envelope from Canada, was sent with a letter dated July 19, 2004 from the Desk of Managing Director of the INTERNATIONAL PAYOUT SERVICES PROGRAM held on March 24, 2004 reads:

"CONGRATULATIONS! Among the 126 participating finalist playing 6000 full tickets, from a pool of Fifty Million Dollars (\$50,000,000) in cash, your ticket number 698-45 drew the lucky numbers 16-23-36-39-41, that won a prize in that category. Your number has therefore been approved for a lump sum payment of Four Hundred and Seventy Thousand Dol-

lars (\$470,000.00) in cash credit to a file REF No: LDR2551256003/09.

Our credit department was recently notified that over the past four months there was no winner form submitted due to failed efforts to communicate with you or the agency taking care of your ticket. 
