HOLIDAY TRASH SCHEDULE

NEW POSTAGE STAMP

Military veterans will be honored by the U.S. Postal Service with a new commemorative stamp, available at the Warren Post Office and nation-wide May 23, 2001.

The Honoring Veterans stamp recognizes the vital and varied roles veterans have played to ensure peace, stop aggression, and provide logistical support during crises. More than 25 million Americans, or almost 1 in every 10 adults, are veterans.

Many veterans continue to serve their country, their fellow veterans, and their communities as members of veterans service organizations. These organizations provide aid to veterans and their families, including assistance with benefit applications, transportation to Veterans Affairs medical facilities, and burial and memorial services. Local communities also benefit from the work of veterans service organizations through scholarship programs, youth sports activities, and other programs designed to promote civic pride.

Designed by Carl Herrman, of Carlsbad, California, the stamp features a photograph of the United States flag. The phrase "Honoring Veterans" appears at the top of the stamp, and the phrase "Continuing to Serve" appears at the bottom.

HYDRANT FLUSHING

The water utility of the Town of Warren has scheduled hydrant flushing for Wednesday through Friday, May 16-18, weather permitting. The extension to three days is necessary to allow for pressure testing of hydrants. Each user of water from the Town system should check before using as slight discoloration may result from the flushing and testing which would make it necessary to run water a short time before using.

MEMORIAL DAY SERVICE

The honors rendered there are for all area veterans. The ceremony, hosted by Champion Hill, Camp #17 of the Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War, will begin at 5:45 pm. The ceremony will include welcoming remarks by Sean McConnell and a historical address by Steve Williams, a laying of a wreath by Jim Perry, a gun salute, taps, and two songs by the company singers. Chaplain Rich McConnell will offer the prayer. The ceremony is scheduled to last about 25 minutes.

COAST GUARD OFFERS SAFE BOATING CHECKLIST NATIONAL SAFE BOATING WEEK: MAY 19-25, 2001

Whether your boat is large or small, an outboard, inboard, or oar powered, safety must be a primary concern each time you step on board. The U.S. Coast Guard makes these recommendations:

- Carry all safety equipment required by federal and state law. In addition, carry a first-aid kit, manual pump or bailer, paddles or oars, anchor and line, and drinking water. A cell phone can be very useful.
- Handle fuels carefully to avoid fires and explosions. Consult your owner's manual for proper fueling and ventilation. Test and inspect for fuel leaks periodically. Keep fire extinguishers handy and in good condition.
- Fuel all portable tanks on the dock. Moor the boat securely. Extinguish cigarettes and all other flames on the boat. Wipe up any spilled gas or oil, and have a fire extinguisher ready.
- Before starting, leave a float plan with someone reliable.
- Distribute weight evenly, especially on a small boat. Do not overload. Most capsizing occurs on small boats because of weight shifts.
- Personal floatation devices (PFDs) should be worn by children and non-swimmers at all times. Everyone should wear them if conditions become hazardous. Most boating deaths are caused by drowning and hypothermia. The victims might have survived by wearing a PFD.
- Don't operate a boat if you are fatigued, stressed, or intoxicated. These factors cause over half of all boating accidents. Remember, reaction time is slower after being in the marine environment for a few hours.
- Post a lookout in order to avoid collisions.
- Travel at safe speeds, and give skiers and divers a wide berth.
- Head for shore if the weather turns bad.

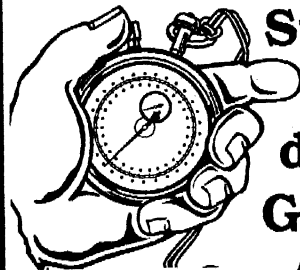
