**529 PLANS: MORE VERSATILE THAN EVER**

If you have children or grandchildren, you may already be somewhat familiar with the 529 plan, a popular education savings vehicle. But you may not have kept up with some recent changes in the plan's capabilities and in the educational environment in which the plan might be used.

Let's start with the learning environment. During the COVID-19 pandemic, colleges and universities switched to online classes, or at least to a hybrid of in-person and online. And even before the pandemic, many schools offered remote classes, though obviously not to the same extent. But after COVID-19 subsides, it's likely that the online component will remain an important part of higher education. What does this "new world" mean for you, when you're saving for college? Will a 529 plan still be relevant?

In a word, yes. First of all, a 529 plan can offer tax advantages. Earnings in a 529 plan are federally tax-free, provided the money is used for qualified educational expenses. And if you invest in your own state's 529 plan, your contributions may be tax deductible. (Withdrawals used for expenses other than qualified education expenses may be subject to federal and state taxes as well as a 10% penalty.) Because tax issues for 529 plans can be complex, you'll want to consult with your tax advisor before investing.

Online learning costs are eligible for a 529 plan's tax benefits just as much as those incurred from in-person classes. Tuition, textbooks, supplies, computers and services – all of these should qualify, assuming the school meets certain criteria. Also, students enrolled half-time or more don't have to live in a dorm for room and board expenses to be covered by a 529 plan – they can live in off-campus housing. However, these room-and-board costs typically must equal the cost of living on campus. Some schools identify a specific cost for "commuters" or "at-home students," so you will need to contact the college directly to determine qualified room-and-board costs.

Now, let's take a quick look at what some changes in the rules governing 529 plans over the past few years might mean for you. Eligible expenses from your 529 plan include the following:

K-12 expenses – Parents can withdraw up to \$10,000 per student, per year, from their 529 plan to pay for tuition expenses at elementary and secondary schools. So, if you intend to send your children to a private school, this use of a 529 plan might interest you.

Apprenticeships – 529 plans can be used to pay for fees, textbooks, equipment and other supplies connected to apprenticeship programs registered with the Department of Labor. These programs, typically offered at a community

### ELECTION POSTCARDS

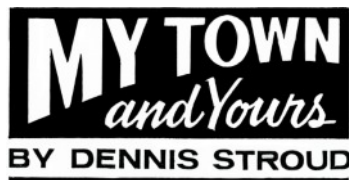
Hoosier voters are beginning to receive postcards in the mail from the Secretary of State’s office. The office is mailing these postcards as part of a statewide voter list refresh. The goal is to identify outdated and inaccurate voter registration information to improve the accuracy and integrity of Indiana’s voter registration list.

“These mailings help us identify records that need updating or are no longer

valid. This helps us create a more accurate picture of voter turnout for the state and helps ensure our elections remain safe and secure. Hoosiers deserve to know we have accurate voter lists,” Secretary of State Holli Sullivan said.

Postcards that are returned to the office as undeliverable will be used to identify outdated voter registration information. If the first mailing is returned as undeliverable, a second postcard will be sent to the forwarding address on file with the U.S. Postal Service. The second postcard will ask the voter to confirm or update their residence address or cancel their Indiana voter registration using a postage pre-paid voter response card.

Hoosiers should use the postcard as a reminder to verify, update or start a voter registration online at www.indianavoters.com. Voters may also visit their local county clerk’s office. Voters who need assistance can call the Hoosier Voter Hotline at 866-IN-1-VOTE.



### ROAD 3

The road continued to be used for probably twelve or fourteen years, until the cost of upkeep began to increase to a point where the income would not justify further operations, and it was discontinued. After a few years, the planks rotted, so that a force of men was constantly employed in that work. A few years after it was abandoned a gravel road was built by another company, which maintained the toll gate at Huntington for some time. The pike extended from Huntington to the Salamonie township line while the south end of the road continued in its original condition to about 1882 when it was extended into Warren and became a free pike throughout its entire length.

When the plank road was first built, and for many years afterward, it was not an uncommon sight in the fall to see great processions of wagons loaded with wheat, moving in a continuous

stream along that road. The elevators in Huntington stood on the canal and many times it would happen that farmers, from the south end of the county, would form a line which would extend from the mill to a point far south of the present city limits. It sometimes happens that the last man in line would have to wait all day and far into the night before he had a chance to unload his grain. The road gave an outlet to farmers living several miles to the south and east of Warren and added very much to the trading strength of the Huntington merchants.

### YOUR MOST PRESSING ASTHMA QUESTIONS

#### ADDRESSED

(StatePoint) More than 25 million people in the United States are living with asthma, amounting to about 1 in 13 people. Asthma is a lifelong chronic lung disease that causes difficulty breathing and often limits regular daily activities.

But it doesn't have to be that way. It's important to understand that asthma is a chronic (long-term) disease that causes inflammation and narrowing of the airways in the lungs, and that asthma can cause a variety of symptoms, making breathing difficult.

**Q:** How would someone know if they're asthma is in control?

**A:** Patients should talk to their doctor about how well their asthma is controlled and what signs or symptoms they should track. Lack of control may limit daily activities, participation in strenuous activity or even sleep, making a discussion with one's doctor essential. Signs of good asthma control include:

- \* No shortness of breath
- \* No need for rescue medication

\* No asthma symptoms while waking or at night

\* No urgent care, emergency department or hospital visits due to symptoms

\* No missed days from work or school due to symptoms

**Q:** What's the best way to identify a patient's type of asthma?

**A:** Patients should schedule an appointment with their doctor, keep the physician updated on symptoms, and ask if a referral to a specialist would be helpful. This may be necessary for severe asthma, for example, because symptoms may be hard to control with standard therapy.

**Q:** What can a patient or caregiver expect at office visits?

**A:** It's very important for patients to partner with their doctor to manage symptoms. A patient should be prepared to give a health history with details of their condition, including respiratory symptoms, exacerbations, reoccurring and additional health problems, such as allergies or gastroesophageal reflux disease, current medications, frequency of rescue medication use, personalized emergency instructions, their asthma

action plan, etc. Doctors should be able to educate patients on treatment options. The more a patient is actively engaged, the more likely they are to get maximum benefits. Patients should let their doctor know what's important to them and ask their healthcare team about resources and websites providing accurate medical information.

**Q:** What additional resources and support groups are helpful?

**A:** Asthma patients should know they're not alone. Every new patient can take action and talk to their doctor about asthma, its impact on their life and how to align their goals for treatment. It's important they create an Asthma Action Plan with their healthcare provider, find support groups, and participate in educational seminars, like those offered by the American Lung Association. While asthma can't be cured, it can be managed, particularly with support from family, a healthcare team and by connecting with other patients.
