

solutions to such situations, there are things that can be help family done to caregivers take better care of themselves.

In many cities, it is possible to find businesses, organizations or individuals who can provide what is called "respite" care. This is when someone comes in for a few hours, maybe once or several times a week, in order to give the primary caregiver a much-needed break. Such services, however, can be hard to find in many places, especially smaller towns and rural areas, and may be prohibitively expensive they are if available.

The alternative is for the individual providing the care to learn to care better for himself or herself, to essentially work out а "personal respite" program.

This can take a variety of forms, from just scheduling a short break to have a cup of tea or read a book, to turning to friends and other family members for their assistance in providing the help that will give the caretaker a few hours of personal time.

While family caregivers tend to be concerned, giving people, it's vital for them to monitor their own mental and physical well-being, too. Failing to recognize when the stress of helping is having a negative impact on their patience or ability to think clearly respond or appropriately can lead to and unexpected serious issues.




