VACCINES AT SWHS

ON FARM RESEARCH

Purdue University specialists are seeking assistance from area farmers. On-farm research trials are very important to them in providing recommendations for corn and soybean seeding rates as well as nitrogen fertilizer application rates for corn fields.

A Web site (http://www.agry.purdue.edu/ext/ofr/) has been developed to serve as a hub for on-farm research collaborations between Indiana crop producers, Indiana Certified Crop Advisers, county Purdue Extension educators, and campus Purdue Extension field crops specialists. Current on-farm research protocols can be found at this Web site.

Bob Nielsen and Shaun Casteel, Purdue Extension specialists, are involved in seeding rate trials for corn and soybeans. Nielsen is also collaborating with other specialists for a nitrogen rate trial. Casteel is currently setting up trials to study soybean row width, as well.

Another on-farm trial involves the impact of foliar fungicide use on soybean yield. Kiersten Wise, Purdue Extension Specialist in the Department of Botany and Plant Pathology, has set up plot widths etc. for farmers who would like to participate in the study. Note that foliar fungicides sold under brand names such as Headline, Quadris, or Stratego are used widely to prevent the spread of disease in soybean fields.

There are additional studies being set up across the state which are not listed on the aforementioned Website. One Indiana county Extension educator, David Smith from Johnson County, is looking for corn growers who have twinrow planters (corn rows are 7.5" to 8" apart on 30" centers). He is interested in comparing four to five seeding rates in a trial. Smith and other Purdue campus specialists would like to compare these twin-row plots to standard 30" rows (preferably in the same field).

So what results are possible from on-farm research? Agood example is the general nitrogen rate recommendations for

Indiana corn growers. Additional region and soil specific recommendations are being developed from research that has been on-going since 2006. This information is detailed in a publication, "Nitrogen Management Update for Indiana," that was released in January 2010. The publication can be found at this link: http:/ /www.agry.purdue.edu/ext/ corn/news/timeless/ NitrogenMgmt.pdf.

Currently the researchers are finding that poorly-drained soils of northeast and east central Indiana require about 30 lb. Nitrogen per acre more than the average nitrogen rate recommendation. More field research in several areas of Indiana is needed to determine if other regional recommendations of Nitrogen application rates are warranted. On-farm trials set up with local dealers, who sell fertilizer, seed and chemicals are also important. Any properly structured research can help farmers to make decisions which affect their bottom-line. Varying weather conditions from year-to-year can impact results quite a bit, so replication in any trial remains important.

As the old adage goes, "One year does not a trend make."

SHOTGUN SIGN UP

The Wells County 4-H Shot Gun Safety Club will hold its first meeting Saturday, April 17, 2 -4 PM at the Wells County Gun Club, 2555 E., 400 N., Ossian.

Youth may become members when they enter third grade and may continue their membership through the completion of grade 12. A member may continue membership for a maximum of ten (10) years.

One of the requirements in the 4-H Shot Gun Safety Club is the ability to physically handle a shot gun. The club will be using 12 and 20 gauge shot guns. The leaders with parents will determine if the youth can safely handle the weight and size of the gun.
