### CARNEGIE GIFT

Warren Public Library has received a \$10,000 gift from Carnegie Corporation of New York, the foundation established by Andrew Carnegie. The award is part of Carnegie Libraries 250, a special initiative celebrating the upcoming 250th anniversary of the signing of the Declaration of Independence and honoring the roughly 1,280 Carnegie Libraries still serving their communities across the United States.

Scottish immigrant Andrew Carnegie funded the construction of 1,681 free public libraries nationwide between 1886 and 1917. Approximately 750 of them continue to use their original buildings, while others have moved to new locations. Opened in 1920, our library is one of 106 active Carnegie Libraries in Indiana that were built through this historic program.

"Communities that would not have a library otherwise, are so thankful for the original grant from the Carnegie Foundation", said Robert Neuenschander, director of Warren Public Library. Warren Public Library is a welcoming, inclusive space where patrons of all ages can feel at home. The small staff are always brainstorming ways to make the library more relevant and helpful to their community, and this current grant will go a long way towards those goals. "We are proud to be a fixture in Salamonie Township, and we want our patrons to be proud of their library in return," said Sarah Conner, library assistant.

"Our founder, Andrew Carnegie, who championed

the free public library movement of the late 19th century, described libraries as 'cradles of democracy' that 'strengthen the democratic idea, the equality of the citizen, and the royalty of man,'" said Dame Louise Richardson, president of Carnegie and former head of the University of Oxford. "We still believe this and are delighted to celebrate our connection to the libraries he founded."

Warren Public Library received the gift in February 2026, and we may use the funds however we wish to celebrate the 250th anniversary, further our mission, and benefit our community.

The Cincinnati, Bluffton, and Ohio Railroad ran from Cincinnati to Portland to Markle. Then it continued to Huntington, Rochester, Hammond and finally, Chicago. The talk will present the

history of the railroad including its infamous accident involving the Mayne grocery store.

Northeast Indiana native Craig Berndt has been researching railroads in southern and northeast Indiana, including Huntington County, for over 40 years. He is a long-time member of the Northeast Indiana Railroad Historical Society. Craig has written short histories of several "ghost railroads" that no longer operate. One of his most recent research projects is the subject of this talk.

### FARM SUCCESSION MEETING

**WHY OLDER ADULTS SHOULD FOCUS ON EYE HEALTH NOW**

(StatePoint) As you age, it's important to keep an eye on your vision. While some vision changes can be expected over time, others may signal something more serious, such as cataracts, glaucoma or age-related macular degeneration (AMD), which can result in vision loss, blurred vision and glare.

According to one study, one-third of all cases of cataracts, open-angle glaucoma and early AMD occur in those 80 years old or older.

"Older adults with diabetes are especially at risk of developing eye-related issues over time, including cataracts and glaucoma, as well as diabetic retinopathy," said Dr. Grant Tarbox, senior executive medical director with HealthSpring, which offers Medicare plans across the country.

In fact, more than half of people with diabetes eventually develop diabetic retinopathy, according to the National Eye Institute. This is a serious condition that can cause blindness if left untreated.

Vision screening recommendations for older adults vary by organization based on health status and medical history. Nevertheless, if you have a vision benefit in your insurance plan, it's a good idea to take advantage of it in 2026.

While Original Medicare doesn't cover a routine annual vision exam, most Medicare Advantage (MA) plans, such as those offered by HealthSpring, do provide additional vision benefits, including annual screenings. These plans may even provide you with an incentive for getting an annual vision exam. To avoid surprise payments, always visit an optometrist or ophthalmologist in your network.

Many eye diseases don't present symptoms in the early stages, making screenings important. When conditions are caught and treated early, disease progression can be slowed. Both Original Medicare and MA plans generally cover treatment for various eye diseases. Beneficiaries may have to pay coinsurance or copays, depending on their coverage. Additionally, a Medicare Part D plan, which is often included in an MA plan, generally covers eye drops and other vision-related prescriptions.

"You should always ask your eye doctor to share information about your vision health with your primary care physician, including any prescriptions ordered, to better coordinate care," said Tarbox.

In addition to screenings, you can support healthy eyes with lifestyle tweaks. Tarbox added that the same habits

**WOMEN'S WILDERNESS WEEKEND**

Registration is open for Patoka Lake's Women's Wilderness Weekend, a women-only event for learning outdoor skills in a relaxed environment, May 15-17.

The event will start at the Patoka Lake Nature Center and includes overnight camping for the duration of the weekend. Women age 16 and older can participate in activities that include in-depth archery lessons, kayaking, Dutch oven cooking, basic wilderness survival skills, hunting 101, wilderness first aid, trap shooting, rifle shooting, boat operation, and more.

Meals will be provided on Saturday and Sunday, and camping will take place in Patoka Lake's modern electric campground. There is also the option to rent cabins, at the participants' expense, at a nearby private facility.

Advance registration is required by April 15, and the cost to attend is \$85. This year, priority registration will be given to women who have never attended this event.

A more advanced Women's Wilderness event is planned for Patoka Lake in September.

**BBB TRADES SCHOLARSHIPS**

The Better Business Bureau (BBB) Serving Northern Indiana is introducing a new scholarship program designed to assist students entering careers in skilled trades.

The Trades Scholarship Program aims to reduce the financial burden of starting a trade career, which often includes costs for tools, protective clothing and other essentials. BBB is partnering with local businesses to award students who are beginning employment with BBB Accredited Businesses.

"This program is about more than financial assistance; it's about investing in the future of our workforce in northern Indiana," said Steve Stepp,

BBB vice president of revenue. "By partnering with Accredited Businesses, we're helping students succeed in careers that keep our communities strong."

To qualify, applicants must be employed in the trades by a BBB Accredited Business for 12 months or less. They must reside within BBB's 23-county service area, be 23 years old or younger, and have entered a trade-related career. Eligible trades include construction (such as plumbing, electrical, roofing, and concrete), welding, landscaping, painting, HVAC, auto repair, machinery/tool and die, pest control, and tree removal. Other trades may be considered on a case-by-case basis. Applicants must also submit an application by April 26, 2026, explaining why they decided to work in their chosen field. Please note that submitting an application does not guarantee approval.

This initiative reflects BBB's mission to advance marketplace trust, support ethical business practices and strengthen the skilled trades workforce in Northern Indiana.

**NEW ROADWAY WORKER SAFETY**

The Indiana Department of Transportation announces a new work zone initiative to increase worker safety. INDOT is implementing Project Greenlight, a program to equip highway workers with Guardian Angel safety lights, to help bring awareness to workers in times of limited visibility.

Guardian Angel safety lights are wearable devices with flashing green patterns that increase worker visibility from all directions. When worn with a high visibility vest, these lights help workers become 89 percent more visible to the traveling public according to a study from Battelle Memorial Institute.

Bright green is the most visible color to the human eye and is the most visible from longer distances. The color

green is also easily distinguishable from the rest of INDOT's standard work zone lighting.

"Studies show drivers are more likely to move over and slow down when they see these green lights in work zones," said INDOT Commissioner Lyndsay Quist. "The safety of our team is always our top priority as they make improvements to Indiana's infrastructure, and we hope this small tool will have a big impact."

INDOT began piloting the green safety lights in fall 2025 within the three Hoosier Helper patrol areas – Northwest Indiana near Gary, Indianapolis metropolitan area, and Southeast Indiana near Louisville – and within highway maintenance crews in the Indianapolis Subdistrict and various crews throughout the state.

As the program moves forward, approximately 375 lights will be distributed across the state, starting with the INDOT Northwest District. INDOT Highway Technicians and Hoosier Helpers are encouraged to use the green lights during nighttime operations, as well as during times of inclement weather like fog, rain or snow, when visibility might be lower.

Green safety lights were brought to INDOT through its Innovation and Process Improvement Division. Innovation is one of INDOT's core values as the agency looks to challenge the status

Ask Rusty – My Friend is 65; shouldn't she be exempt from Medicare payroll taxes?

Dear Rusty: My girlfriend is 65 and she just enrolled in Medicare. She is still working full time as a nurse, but they are still deducting Medicare taxes from her paycheck. I thought as soon as you started Medicare, that they would no longer take any Medicare taxes from her paychecks. Is that not correct?  
Signed: Concerned Friend

Dear Concerned Friend: Your understanding about Medicare payroll tax is, indeed, not correct. Medicare taxes are levied on everyone who works and earns, regardless of whether or not they are currently enrolled in the

Medicare program. That is how Medicare has worked since it was first enacted in the mid-1960s and how it still works today.

FYI, everyone who works for an employer must pay "FICA" (Federal Insurance Contributions Act) payroll tax of 7.65%. Most (6.2%) of that payroll tax goes to support Social Security, but 1.45% goes to support Medicare Part A. Self-employed individuals must also pay this tax under the Self-Employed Contributions Act (SECA) which is equivalent to FICA, except the self-employed individual must also pay the employer portion of the payroll tax. The Social Security portion of the FICA/SECA tax has an earnings cap (\$184,500 in 2026), but there is no cap on earnings for the Medicare portion of the FICA/SECA payroll tax. FYI, employers pay an equivalent amount of Social Security and Medicare taxes, and the Medicare portion of the payroll tax is paid on all earnings (there is no cap on earnings from which the Medicare payroll tax is withheld).

To ensure understanding, Medicare Part A provides healthcare coverage for inpatient hospitalization services, and Medicare Part B provides coverage for outpatient medical services (doctors, medical tests, etc.). That 1.45% of the FICA (and SECA tax for the self-employed) is paid by those who work to help fund the Medicare Part A program, which is premium-free for most Americans after age 65. For Medicare Part B, there is a

separate premium which helps pay for Medicare outpatient healthcare services. The standard Medicare Part B premium for 2026 is \$202.90 per month, compared to Medicare Part A which is free to all who are eligible for Social Security benefits. But the 1.45% payroll tax which is being withheld from your girlfriend's paycheck is paid by everyone who has work earnings, even if they are enrolled in Medicare.
