Tortoni is, naturally, an Italian dessert that my family makes during the holiday season. Why we never made them any other time of year I still can't figure out. My mother used to make double recipes because we would always go into the freezer and sneak them before Christmas dinner. Folks, this is it...My favorite holiday recipe! Tortoni

1 cup plus 1/4 cup ground hard macaroons
2 cups heavy cream
2/3 cups confectioner's sugar

2 eggs whites, stiffly beaten
2 Tbsp sherry
Beat the heavy cream then fold in 1 cup of the macaroons, sugar, egg whites and sherry. Line cupcake tins and pour mixture into cups. Sprinkle with remaining macaroon crumbs and freeze. To serve, defrost for five minutes. Makes 24 tortonis. However, I advise you to make more. And if you need someone to sample, you know where I'm at!

GRANT APPLICATIONS DEADLINE

The Huntington County Visitor & Convention Bureau (VCB) is again accepting applications for their next grant round due November 30th, for events occurring between January 1st and June 30, 2006. May 31 is the deadline for events held between July 1st and December 31, 2006. The Tourism Promotion Grant is a matching grant awarded up to \$1,100 and is available to non-profit organizations in Huntington County for the promotion and encouragement of events that have a viable attraction for out-of-county visitors.

Grant monies awarded to successful applicants shall not exceed 50% of the total costs for promotions. Monies are available for promotional brochures, radio advertising, increased participant registration, billboards, advertising in trade or specialty publications, or any related promotions that will encourage overnight visits. "The funds come directly out of the VCB's advertising budget as part of their overall marketing plan to help attract out-of-town visitors to our community and ultimately create more overnight guests at our county's eleven lodging properties", says Rose Meldrum, Executive Director of the VCB.

The tourism grant committee, composed of Bob Smyth, Ellen Prange, & Rose Meldrum, recently awarded four not-for-profit entities in Huntington County tourism grants during their previous grant round.

\$1,000 went to the Markle Wildcat Festival Committee for promotions for their 2005 three-day community festival.

\$1,100 was awarded to the Roanoke Fall Festival Committee.

RECOGNIZING THE PLYMOUTH THANKSGIVING

HOW THE PILGRIMS BECAME AMERICA'S FOREFATHERS

The town of Plymouth in Massachusetts has not always been well known. The town and the Pilgrims who created it were largely forgotten for 200 years until December 22, 1820.

On that day, the great orator Daniel Webster traveled to Plymouth from Boston to take part in the bicentennial celebration of the Pilgrims' landing. So great was his speech that it became known as the "Plymouth oration."

Before 1,500 people seated on wooden benches in the meeting-house, he said, in part:

"We have come to this Rock to record here our homage for our Pilgrim Fathers; our sympathy in their sufferings; our gratitude for their labors, our admiration of their virtues; our veneration for their piety, and our attachment to those principles of civil and religious liberty."

"We listen to the chiefs in council... We are filled with reverence and admiration for the mild dignity of Carver and Bradford, the decisive military air of Standish, the devout Brewster, the enterprising Allerton..."

Webster's oration started the elevation of the Pilgrims to the status of forefathers of the nation. At that time, the recently independent America needed an event and a place that rooted the country to its founding history.





They needed a founding location. Jamestown in Virginia was a candidate as was Plymouth in Massachusetts. Jamestown had an advantage because it was founded 13 years before the Pilgrims landed. But Plymouth offered a moral authority, thanks to the words of Daniel Webster.

Though the great Thanksgiving feast occurred 385 years ago, we still follow the Pilgrims' lead in being thankful for our blessings on Thanksgiving Day.

COUNCIL NOTES

President David Schieb conducted the Nov. 14 meeting of the Warren Town Council. The meeting was held in Assembly Hall and opened at 6:30 pm with all in attendance repeating the Pledge to the American Flag.

Minutes of the regular meetings of Oct. 10 and 24 were approved as submitted.

Council approved adoption of Ordinance 2005-22, rezoning of 446 West Eleventh Street.

Council also approved Wage and Salary Ordinances, Ordinance 2005-23, 24, 25 and 26.

Council accepted a Street Sweeping contract with Dogwood Villa. The agreement included sweeping of the streets by the Town of Warren at Dogwood in the amount of \$450.00. The streets are to be swept four times a year.

Chamber of Commerce had purchased more Christmas lights for Warren in the amount of \$800.00. Council will match the amount. The Public Library and one side of the Civic Center are to be included in the town display this year.
