SHIRER SIMULCAST



NICKNAME FOR SCHOOL

There is a basketball team who set a scoring record. That team was members of Warren High School, 1911-1912 basketball team. On January 12, 1912, Warren High School whipped Converse 162 to 4. The Warren team was a powerhouse and racked up a record 20 wins and 2 defeats. Included in the list were two over Huntington High School. Warren beat Huntington 77-11 in the first meeting and 58-13 in the second game.

In the game against Converse, the loser picked up their 4 points on free throws all made by one player. High scorer, for the winners, was Clifford R. Wright who had 40 field goals or 80 points. The team captain was Merrit Tam, who after graduating owned the local drug store in town. The other members of the Warren team were Merlin

Bradford, Raymond Huffman, Archie Smith and Dean Freck. Merlin Bradford lived around Warren after graduating and Raymond Huffman lived around Liberty Center.

Charles C. Stech, a teacher at Warren High School, despite his technical limitations, was drafted by the school superintendent to coach the team. Stech said his boys were not necessarily great natural athletes but had tireless enthusiasm. One of the sports writers wrote in the paper the 5 team members moved like lightning and that is how the nickname "Warren Lightning Five" came about.

Dubuque, IA has a population of 60,000. It was founded in 1783 by Julien Dubuque (1762-1810), a French Canadian trader. After breakfast in the hotel's Tony Roma room, a shuttle took us to a Methodist Church to see its spectacular stained glass windows. The next stop was the Fenelon Place Elevator Company, a two-track, 40 yard, tram ride up to overlook the city. There was no cost to travel up, but \$4 dollars to return! Gottcha!

The shuttle dropped us at the National Mississippi River Museum and Aquarium. All was very interesting. A sign stated that 75 % of the earth is covered by water, but only one percent is fresh water! The mighty Mississippi empties 200 million gallons of water into the Gulf of Mexico every minute. Wow!

The Twilight boat return trip to LeClaire departed at 11:15 am. We located rocking chairs forward on the second deck and enjoyed these accommodations until the

wind chased us to more comfortable surroundings. A railroad on the Iowa side kept us company for several miles.

After lunch and passing through Lock and Dam # 12, rain chased us inside. Outside seating was slightly damp afterward. More bald eagles were spotted in riverside trees. They have better luck hunting for their river meals right after a rain. Smart birds; they cannot be classified as "bird brains!"

The captain informed us that some of the provisional Mississippi River dams were built under the direction of Lt. Robert E. Lee in 1860. That name rings a bell in history. Our vessel passed a water pumping station which supplies the liquid to an adjacent plot of land that grows rice in the Spring season.

After maneuvering through Lock & Dam # 13 and dropping to a lower downstream level, we passed Clinton, IA at 4:40 pm. and Camanche, IA at 5:15 pm.

Dinner was served onboard in the very cool, A/C dining quarters. We docked at 6:30 pm. and were bussed to the Cambria Hotel in Bettendorf, IA. Tomorrow our group is

heading to Dyersville, IA and the "Field of Dreams!"

But for both male and female patients, advancements in technology are significantly improving detection and disease management.

Cystoscopy, the gold standard diagnostic tool for bladder cancer detection, has historically been performed using only white light for visualizing suspicious lesions. "I never expected to be diagnosed with bladder cancer at 28. It's so important to pay attention to the signs and symptoms, no matter how old you are," says Mary Beth, who was also diagnosed using BLC.

REDUCE YOUR RISK OF FALLING BY TAKING THESE SIMPLE STEPS

(StatePoint) A fall can result in unwanted outcomes, including injury, loss of independence, and a decreased ability to do the things that are most important to you or a loved one.

Each year, 3 million older adults are treated in emergency departments for fall injuries. Even falls that don't lead to injury can provoke a fear of falling that causes you to avoid the activities that keep you healthy, strong, and ultimately less likely to fall. While falls are dangerous, the good news is that experts say they're largely preventable.

"While many factors can contribute to our chances of falling as we get older, falling is not a normal part of aging," says physical therapist and American Physical Therapy Association spokesperson Greg Hartley, PT, DPT. "Working with a physical therapist can empower you or a loved one to regain balance and strength."

The American Physical Therapy Association offers the following tips to help you reduce your risk of falling:

1. Get moving. For older adults, physical activity reduces the risk of falling and fall-related injuries. Stay active to maintain the strength, flexibility, coordination, and balance needed to prevent falls. From swimming to yoga to walking, take part in a variety

of physical activities that you enjoy. Talk to your physical therapist to determine which activities are safe for you.

2. Know your risks. A physical therapist can help you assess your risk factors and develop a plan to address them so you can remain independent. Tell your doctor or physical therapist if you have any dizziness, loss of balance, or trouble seeing. Be sure to tell them whether you fell in the last year.

3. Check your medications. Many drugs can cause dizziness, loss of balance, blurry vision, and more. If you have any of these symptoms, review your medications with your pharmacist or doctor.

4. Assess your home's safety. Assess your home to fix or remove anything that could cause trips or slips, such as throw rugs, clutter, poor lighting, and wobbly furniture or handrails. It's also a good idea to install a secure grab bar in the shower and next to the toilet for sturdy support on slippery floors. If you can't make these safety improvements yourself, ask a friend or family member to help. Check with your doctor, physical therapist, or area agency on aging for local programs that offer home safety assessments.

5. Work with a physical therapist. Physical therapy (with exercise) focused on balance, stability, and the ability to perform common tasks is recommended and can prevent falls, according to the U.S. Preventive Services Task Force. Physical therapists are able to help you avoid a fall in the first place, as they are movement experts who can work with you to assess your fall risk factors and develop a plan to address them. They will advise you on making your home safer, educate you about medical risk factors linked to falls, and design a safe balance training program specific to you.


