Friday and Saturday shows are at 8:00 p.m. Sunday shows are at 4:00 p.m. The theatre is located at 127 ½ Wayne Street in Warren. 

College Goal Sunday is so important since completing this required form correctly and by the deadline is sometimes perceived to be complicated and time consuming. Now in its 28th year, College Goal Sunday has helped more than 90,000 Indiana students and families
